Council okays funding for track's completion

Funding for the completion of Price said. the walking track around Lake Gordon was approved by the city council during Monday night's regularlyscheduled meeting.

Aldermen approved expenditure of up to \$60,000 for the project.

City Administrator Mike Price explained that slightly more than \$65,000 in tax money and donations had already been expended to date.

He told the council the original projected cost of \$82,000 would not be possible for two reasons: the increased price of concrete, and labor anticipated from prison inmates never materalized.

The city is collecting approximately \$650 monthly through donations from citizens who requested additions be made on their monthly utility bills.

No response has been received concerning a request that the military assist in moving a steel bridge from its location on South Peterson Road,

All preparatory work has been completed for the bridge's placement across the north end of the lake.

A list of work yet to be completed on the project that Price provided included, besides additional concrete, bridge bracing and decking, the approaching boardwalk and guard rail posts.

Future improvements planned for the project, also not yet funded, include benches and trash containers along the route, as well as drinking fountains, Price added.

In other business during the meeting, the council approved a proposal to sell surplus property, the Chaplaincy Program policy and revised Ride-Along Program policy, and also a resolution authorizing submission of a Texas Community **Development Program Application** for the Community Development Fund.

Numerous items, including vehicles and pieces of furniture, as well

as confiscated guns, will be offered for bids.

The guns, which have been confiscated by the police department. will be on display April 13-14 at city hall. Highest bidders will be subject to background checks by the police department before they can take possession, however.

The vehicles and furniture will be kept on display, from 9 a.m. to 5 p.m. weekdays, at the parks department and water treatment plant.

Deadline for bids has been set for 4 p.m. on Thursday, April 15.

The grant being sought is for \$105,340, which would be used for water system improvements. The city is pledging an additional \$20,000 for the project.

Also during the meeting, the council approved re-naming Don Kirkham for another term on the Nortex 9-2-2 Communication District board of managers, and tentativesly set April 12-18 as the dates for the annual Clean-Up Week.

Storm season gets attention of authorities

The Iowa Park Emergency Management Team met Monday evening for the yearly review and revisal of the emergency operation plan.

The plan is a guideline for the Emergency Management Team to go by in the event Iowa Park is struck with a major disaster.

There are a number of things that could cause a disaster in Iowa Park. However, the main focus of the team is train derailment, prolonged power failure, ice storms and tornados.

With Spring here, most residents main concern seems to be the threat of tornados.

Many of us reflect back to April 10, 1979, when one of the largest tornadoes in this part of Texas hit Wichita Falls. Tthis was only a short time after one had inflicted major damage to Vernon. In fact, many were preparing to travel to Vernon and help them with relief when the tornado ripped through Wichita Falls.

Since that time even more attention is paid to the Spring weather by many.

The Iowa Park Emergency Management Team and weather watchers have geared up and are ready for the possibility of severe storms.

Iowa Park Volunteer Fire Department members are trained weather spotters, as well as the local police. The Iowa Park weather spotters work with other area fire and police departments, weather spotters and Hamm Radio operators.

When a funnel cloud is sighted in the Iowa Park area, the Iowa Park Police Department is notified by the fire or police chief to sound the sirens. Sirens are only sounded when a tornado is spotted, excessively high winds hit or other extreme emergency situations.

Iowa Park has six sirens located throughtout the city and one to be installed at the south side fire department within the next month. The others are located behind the fire and police department on north side; South Wall and Garden in the alley; at the northeast end of the soccer field on Victoria; in the alley at First and Texas; in the alley at Emma and Joy; and on the water tower on the access road north of 287.

The sound to listen for in the event of a tornado warning is five to six one minute blast.

Residents can go to one of the public shelters located in the city. Included are Bradford Elementary gym, Kidwell Elementary gym and the high school basement. However, residents who need to go to one of these shelters should do so before the sirens are sounded. The doors are opened by the police when tornadoes are spotted in surrounding areas.

When the sirens are sounded, residents are reminded to stay off the streets and in their homes or shelters.

There is no all clear siren sounded.

Residents should also be aware the sirens are tested on the second Tuesday of each month at 7 p.m., weather permitting.

In times of severe weather, residents are encouraged to listen to local news stations or a weather radio for updates on area weather.

In the event of any disaster causing major damage, the emergency management team is assigned to various duties.

Mayor Tim Hunter, Emergency Management Director for the city, is responsible for assuring that coordinated and effective emergency response systems are developed and maintained.

Existing agencies of city government will perform emergency activities closely related to those they perform routinely.

Response activities will be coordinated from the Emergency Operating Center, which is located in the police station, or as directed at the time. The EOC will be activated by the City Administrator upon notification of a possible emergency.

Emergency management team members are the mayor, city administrator, city council members, police chief, fire chief, superintendent of schools, members of the volunteer fire department, city secretary, public works director, city health officer

and director of school transportation. There are ways that the resi-

dents of Iowa Park can help the Emergency Management Team in the event of a disaster.

Some of those ways are to stay off the streets unless you have an emergency; don't go sight-seeing immediately after a severe storm; and don't call the police department unless you have an emergency during severe weather.

Also, residents who have a storm shelter or who have special medical needs are being asked to list it with the city.

Iowa Park Police Chief Lynn Collins is asking that everyone with a storm shelter or with special medical needs that an extended power outage could affect, such as oxygen unit or kidney/ dialysis machine, etc., to fill out the form printed in the Leader and return it to the Iowa Park Police Department, P.O. Box190, Iowa Park, Texas 76367, or call the police department and arrange for an officer to pick the form up.

This information will only be used for emergency situations and there will be three copies, the police and fire department will each have

Maple-Baked Fresh Ham

with Raisin Sauce 5-7 lb. pork leg half (fresh ham) 14-16 cloves

1 cup maple-flavored syrup 1/2 tsp. ground ginger 1/4 tsp. ground nutmeg 1/4 tsp. ground allspice **Raisin Sauce**

Score fat on ham in a diamond design and stud with cloves. Place ham, fat side up, on a rack in a roasting pan. Insert meat thermometer, making sure it does not touch fat or bone.

Combine syrup, ginger, nutmeg and allspice; stir well and pour over 1-14 oz. can sweetened condensed ham. Bake uncovered at 325 degrees 2-3 hours or until meat thermometer registers 160 degrees (25-30 minutes per pound). Baste ham with drippings every 20-30 minutes. If ham browns too quickly, cover loosely with foil. Serve hot or cold with Raisin Sauce.

When you assume the role of family genealogist and historian, there are certain tools designed to help you go about the task in an orderly way.

There are dozens of forms to choose from. Some you will be more comfortable in using than others. As you go along with your project you may even design your own forms.

Even though you may computerize your family tree, the paper forms will still be needed when moving around in research and gathering more information to enter into your family tree computer program.

The personal history sheet is the primary working document and the information it contains is the background picture you want to develop about each one of your relatives and ancestors.


The personal history sheets (PHS) are what you carry with you whenever you visit a relative. Also, have these handy when you are gathering information on the phone, fill the sheets out in pencil the best you can and send to family members for missing names, dates, places etc. Always keep copies, and a stamped, self-addressed envelope may speed a reply.

You will find yourself using a great many personal history sheets just getting started. Begin with yourself, then each brother and sister, then your father and his siblings. Next your mother and her siblings and back through the generations as far as you can. At first this is rather tedious, but it becomes quite interesting as you add to the PHS's and find there is some data missing and that's when the detective work starts the finding and verification of family history.

Library receives technology grant

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Tom Burnett Memorial Library has received a \$20,000 Library Technology Advancement Grant from the Telecommunications Infrastructure Fund Board, a state agency in Austin.

The grant will allow the library to purchase the necessary equipment to upgrade and extend its existing internet resources. Grant funds will be used to purchase workstations, networking hardware, ISP costs, and other related telecommunications costs to assist the library in corporating high-speed internet access as a research, communications, and information delivery tool.

The local library is one of 163 libraries funded as part of the \$11million TIF Board non-competitive grant initiative for public libraries. Projects begin April 1, 1999.

The library applicants were required to complete a detailed application to receive funding, and Alan Seay, Iowa Park High School principal, and Lee Pelz worked together to write the grant.

The awarded libraries will continue to serve as a public arena for access to the internet. They have committed to developing and implementing internet access policies that will protect and encourage their patrons' internet use. The library staff will

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also attend scheduled internet training in order to continue to incorporate the internet into the library as a valuable information source.

"We are very pleased to receive thie award," said Librarian Sue Maness. "We will use TIF Board funds to extend our current internet capabilities. We'll use this opportunity to purchase the necessary advanced equipment for faster and better public access."

Since its creation by the 74th Legislature in 1995, the TIF Board has awarded approximately \$202million in telecommunications grants to 1,018 school districts and charter schools (out of 1,145), 57 community colleges (out of 57), 592 public libraries and branches (out of 789),



AUSTIN — Sweeping legislation to deregulate Texas' \$17 billion electric industry passed on a voice vote last week in the Texas Senate.

Consumers served by investorowned utilities would get a 5 percent rate cut when power providers begin competing for customers on Jan. 1, 2002, under Senate Bill 7 by Sen. David Sibley, R-Waco.

Sibley said consumers willing to shop for better rates might be able to lower their bills by another 10 percent, depending on their choice of a provider.

S.B. 7 - said to be on the "fast track" - will be heard next in the House State Affairs Committee. Carrying the measure will be Rep. Steve Wolens, D-Dallas, chairman of the committee.

Critics of the bill say it will benefit large power companies more than ratepayers.

That program has proven to have its downfall though. As a rule, I'm getting dressed between 4 and 5 a.m. Many times, I've left the house feeling rather good about the way I was dressed only to discover by light of day that it really didn't match or wasn't in fashion any longer.

One of the best things about fashion however is that what is in fashion today won't be in fashion

record. In fact, it's a track record that, at some point, will cause quality people to think twice before applying with the PPISD.

We may not be too far from reaching that point. After all, Sudbury came here after leading Whitewright High School to an exemplary standing in the state ranking system for three straight years. Whitewright also was a solid competitor in UIL academic competition, and Sudbury said getting Pilot Point to champion status would be a priority.

How can we top that?

Sudbury won't say why he's leaving. And board members won't say why they took no action on his contract a week before he submitted his resignation. (One board member did tell me this week that Sudbury is an excellent educator and is NOT leaving over any improprieties.)

So, it's pretty much the same old story. Once again, the public is kept in the dark about what's going on behind the schoolhouse doors. The Pilot Point ISD will never move on to the next level of academic achievement if it doesn't create a stable administrative team. Going though the process of hiring an administrator every year or two creates too much turmoil and uncertainty. At the very least, the PPISD now has a superintendent who can be expected to be here for many more years. Hopefully, Supt. Cloyce Purcell can find a way to solve this dilemma. **DAVID LEWIS Pilot Point Post-Signal**

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Applications from individual landowners interested in participating in the EQIP during the 1999 program year received before March 31 will be ranked for program eligibility during April and those received after March 31 will be ranked after the July 1 deadline. Producers who did not qualify for the EQIP program during the March 31 ranking period may request a deferment from their local Farm Services Administration (FSA) office and be eligible to be reranked during the July 1 ranking period. It should be noted that applications received afater the July 1 deadline, as part of the EQIP continuous program sign-up provisions, will be held until the 2000 program year ranking period.

Private landowners should be aware that EQIP provides technical, educational, and financial assistance to eligible farmers and ranchers to address soil, water and related natural resource concerns on their lands in an environmentally beneficial and cost-effective manner.





region look the same as your tree. to start a new plant? Browned needles over parts of the tree and in some cases the majority of the tree is brown.

The city parks department and I actually took numerous cuttings off of pines that show the same damage as you have described. We submitted these samples to our Plant Pathology Laboratory at Texas A& MUniv. The lab tested the tissue for any potential disease problems. The results were negative for any type of disease or insect pressure.

What did cause the damage to our pine trees, (mainly Japanese Black Pines) was weather related. The very dry and hot summer that preceded our up and down winter temperatures damaged numerous pines. The damage was evident following the frigid temperatures we experienced on the weekend following New Years Day.

That particular weekend we had temperatures around 10 to 12 degrees. This followed relatively mild temperatures. Hard, rapid freezes like this that follow dry conditions can be the most damaging to plants. Tips of needles on pines when examined closely look burnt, and brown from these extreme weather conditions.

For your information, most of the plant samples we ran through our Plant Pathology Lab end up being diagnosed as environmental stress as opposed to an actual disease problem.

There is no immediate cure, however, plain and simple good plant management practices will help. Water during dry periods, but never over-water a pine. Apply quality, slow-release nitrogen lawn food in

Q. I have a rather large pine tree tree, apply an insect control like oil

Q. I live in Wichita Falls and have several lovely rose bushes. They are beautiful, long-stemmed rose cuttings. Can I root these cut roses or A. Many of our pines across the maybe take cuttings from the bushes

> A. You will have a difficult time at best getting a cut rose from an arrangement to root. The rose bushes in your landscape are most likely hybrids which are grafted or budded onto a specific root stock.

Rooting these roses can be a possibility, but the old-time, antique roses which are grown on their own root stock are better suited to propagation from cuttings. Modern roses are grafted onto a root stock to make the plant more vigorous in growth and encourage overall better performance.

You will probably find out that a cutting will not perform as well as the mother plant. Another important note: most newer roses are patented and cannot be legally propagated without paying the royalty fee or receiving permission from the patent holder.

Rose patents are normally active for 17 years from the date of introduction. It would be much easier to simply purchase a healthy, containergrown rose from a local nursery or garden center.



to them are actually an insect. The insect is called scale. Scale insects effect a number of plants with prime targets being Euonymous, peach trees, and Elms.

Scale insects are sucking insects which results in the production of that sticky material we call honeydew. The cut branches you brought indoors had scale on them and the result was all the sticky material. This is very much like parking your vehicle under a pecan tree in summer and getting all of the honeydew on the paint. The only difference is that aphids cause the pecan sapping.







AG AGENT'S REPORT

Boll Weevil Eradication Voting

It was sure nice to get some rain. We didn't receive all we wanted, but maybe it is a start to future spring showers.

A lot of the wheat and native pasture sure needs some more moisture, one or two belly gushers would be nice to fill the new and cleaned out stock tanks.

Even though we still need more moisture around Texoma, I judged the San Angelo Stock Show last weekend and never have seen it so dry. Some of the pastures from Abilene, Robert Lee, and Angelo were nothing more than mesquite, pear, yucca and bare ground.

We didn't see any green. Not the best way to start out 1999.

The referendum voting in the Northern Rolling Plains Boll Weevil Eradication Zone will be this month. Commissioner Susan Combs has set April 22, 1999 as the last day for voting in the referendum to establish an eradication program in the Zone, set a maximum assessment rate, and elect a cotton grower to represent the zone on the Texas Boll Weevil Eradication Board of Directors.

Counties included in the zone are: all of Gray, Wheeler, Donley, Collingsworth, Hall, Childress, Cottle, King, Hardeman, Wilbarger, Wichita, clay and Foard Counties, and all of Archer county lying north of a line following FM 422 commencing at the Baylor County line running east to the intersection of FM 210, continuing east to intersection of State Highway 25, and continuing east to the Clay County line.
