Uniforms on agenda for trustees' meeting

School uniforms are back on the agenda for discussion at tonight's meeting of the Iowa Park school board.

Several parents appeared before the board at the May meeting, asking trustees to consider the possibility of having school uniforms.

They were told that a study would be made, and the board would see what input it gets from parents.

Five hundred and ten letters were sent out to parents of middle school students asking their opinion on the matter, and a self-addressed postcard was included for a response. So far, the response cards indi-

cate 65% support the issue, 21% are not in support, and 14% are unsure. School Superintendent Mike

Caplinger said they are still interested in having everyone's response and asks those who have not returned the survey card to do so within the next two weeks.

The Iowa Park Leader asked several parents of middle school students for their opinions on school uniforms and got the following responses:

"Done right, it would be a tremendous boost to the morale. If it's not done right, it would defeat the whole purpose." - - Janice Newman

City looks to improve fine collection method

If approved by the city council Monday night, two proposals could lead to a vastly improved program of collecting thousands of dollars in unpaid fines owed the city.

City Administrator will ask the council for authorization to enter a contract with American Municipal Services Corporation, and also authority to enter a contract with the Texas Department of Public Safety for participation in the "Failure to Appear" program.

Iowa Park and other entities have long suffered the problem of collecting fines which were levied in courts, until these new programs were introduced.

The American Municipal Services Corporation will serve as a collection agency to gain municipal court fines, along with costs and warrant fees.

The "Failure to Appear" program will, if approved, prohibit a vehicle owner from renewing his/her license until all fines are paid.

The council's meeting is to get underway at 7 p.m. Monday, in council chambers.

Two items on the meeting's tentative agenda relate to topics which have been discussed during previous meetings.

One concerns a request made by Stanley Wright for permission to allow the Church of Christ to install a walkway cover and handrails on a portion of North Bond Street right of way.

Action on that request was delayed, allowing aldermen to visit the location before making a decision. The other topic involves the

council's consideration allowing a fireworks stand at Lake Iowa Park during the Fourth of July celebration.

At issue is granting a lease to Fireworks Unlimited, which would provide the fireworks to be sold as well as insurance.

The stand, if approved, would be operated by the Iowa Park Police Officers' Association.

Three resolutions are included on Monday's agenda, including one that would result in a lease agreement concerning the right of way that would be used by the Church of Christ walkway cover and hand rails.

The second would authorize the city administrator to enter an agreement for the purchase of nine lots in the Texas Addition, "contingent upon the city receiving grant funds from the Texas Department of Economic Development through its Texas Capital Fund Real Estate Program."

Third among the resolutions would, if approved, authorize the city administrator to purchase replace-

ment portable radios for the police department with new equipment.

ABOUT WATER'S TASTE **Residents cry foul!**

Iowa Park's drinking water had a foul taste during the past week, but the problem is being corrected, according to Mike Price, city administrator.

Not since the city was forced to take water from the irrigation ditch back in the early 1970s, when the lakes were completely dry, has the city received so much criticism over the taste of its water.

The problem, Price explained, was an algie bloom that developed in Lake Iowa Park.

The city normally takes little or no water from that lake, relying primarily on Lake Buffalo for its source.

But workmen had replaced the pump at Lake Iowa Park, which forces water to the city's treatment plant, and it was put into action as a test. Workers at the time were un-

aware of the algie bloom problem. But it didn't take long, once the

raw water was treated and pumped into the city's system.

Price said Monday that the water department had flushed the system, and water that remained in pipes was mostly that which could not be flushed by the city.

Residents began commenting as early as Tuesday that the water was beginning to taste more normal.



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



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The two most-common topics of comments I receive, and there are a lot of them, concern the walking track around Lake Gordon, and "when are we going to get a golf course here?"

Hardly a day passes that someone doesn't stop to talk to me about them.

Concerning the walking track, the people are thrilled with it already, eventhough it is not yet completed.

They tell me they are using it -often with a spouse -- at least once, and even twice daily.

And, no, they're not worried about when it will completely encircle the lake. They are just highly appreciative that this major quality of life facility is being made available to them.


Most of them have been walking along the streets and roads around the city, which obviously is somewhat dangerous and not as good a surface as the track.

And of course, they are also interested in what future improvements will be made along the facility.

Well, as I understand, plans are in the making for numerous benches to be placed along the route, to allow for handy rest areas, a couple of drinking fountains, lighting and at least one restroom.

There also will be a lot of flower beds created, as if any beautification was needed to be added.

As to the track's completion, which includes the elevated walkway which will join the bridge that is already in place, that work will most likely be finished before fall, as I



understand it. And then there's the other major

quality of life topic -- the golf course. There's been little or no talk among the city leaders concerning this topic in recent months.

It was two years ago that local realtor Tommy Key announced his plans for a course in the northern edge of the city, but financing has been the big problem. He even had an 18-hole course laid out.

Then, a few months ago, contractor Jim Stevens told me he and a partner were considering a development with a golf course nearby, but I've not heard anything about that one since.

Think there's not a need for such a facility here? Think again.

We had a record number of people, 46, who took off work last Friday afternoon to play in the All-Iowa Park Golf Tournament -- at Burkburnett's River Creek Golf Course.

And the following day, there were almost that many who played at the same course in an event sponsored by the First Baptist Church.

We have a large number of residents who play golf, and are forced to travel elsewhere to do it. And there's no telling how many have told me they would play regularly, or take up the activity, if only we had a course here.

There are a number of areas in the immediate vicinity where a good golf course could be located.

I know the city has its hands full right now with the track and its development, but if the leaders were encouraged by residents to take an active look into its prospects, maybe something could come out of it.

Financing? How about bonds which could be paid off or financed with a half-cent sales tax? We are the only city in Wichita County with no such tax.

The issue could be put up for a

vote, possibly with the specification that the extra tax would be cut off after a five-year period. And if additional time were needed, another election on the issue could be held.

Yeah, I know, you are aware that I am a golfer. I'm going to continue traveling to play my sport, if we don't get a course here anyway.

But a golf course is the most significant quality of life facility not now offered by our fine and outstanding community.

What do you think about it?




Send me my paper and I'll try to take care of the rest. Sincerely, C.C. Anderson

And, no, they're not worried about when it will completely encircle the lake. They are just highly appreciative that this major quality of life facility is being made available to them.


Most of them have been walking along the streets and roads around the city, which obviously is somewhat dangerous and not as good a surface as the track.

There have been over 200 attempts to predict the time of the second coming Christ; at least twenty-one by the year 500. Widespread hysteria arose again due to predictions of the Lord's return on January 1, 1000, followed by no less than ten or eleven other guesses for the year. It is not surprising that another outbreak of predictions comes as we near 2000. There are about forty-five such predictions from August, 1999, to September, 2047. Who is right? Electronic evangelists claim to have it all figured out, but they differ! God said, "When a prophet speaketh in the name of the LORD, if the thing follow not, nor come to pass, that is the thing which the LORD hath not spoken, but the prophet hath spoken it presumptuously: thou shalt not be afraid of him" (Deuteronomy 18:22). And again in Jeremiah 28:9, "The prophet which prophesieth of peace, when the word of the prophet shall come to pass, then shall the prophet be known, that the LORD hath truly sent him." How many times must one fail before believing what God has said about it? "But of that day and that hour knoweth no man, no, not the angels which are in heaven, neither the Son, but the Father" (Mark 13:32) But what of the year? It is obvious from Jesus' statement that God along knows the time of Christ's return. The picture is well-painted by our Lord in Luke 12:36-48, where Christ speaks a parable concerning His return, urging constant readiness, "for the Son of man cometh at an hour when ye think not." If even the year could be determined, people would fulfill their sinful desired until the time came, then clean up their act, which violates the point of the parable-constant readiness. He will return when we are thinking He will NOT come! The careful student of the Word will consider other errors as well. How about the doctrine that we will not be judged according to what we have done, but whether or not we have believed that Jesus is our personal Saviour? Although faith is necessary, God says we shall be judged according to what we have DONE! In Matthew 25:31-46, Jesus elaborates on His judgment, condemning those who had not DONE for Him, and rewarding those who had. "For we must all appear before the judgment seat of Christ: that every one may receive the things done in his body, according to that he hath DONE (Emphasis mine, RTS), whether it be good or bad" (2 Corinthians 5:10). In John 5:28-29 Jesus said, "marvel not at this: for the hour is coming, which all that are in the graves shall hear his voice, and shall come forth; they that have DONE GOOD, unto the resurrection of life; and they that have DONE EVIL, until the resurrection of damnation." Part 1: 2 cups sugar 3/4 cup oil 3 eggs 2 small jars plum baby food 1 tsp. red food coloring 2 tsps. vanilla Part 2: 2 cups flour 1/4 tsp. soda 1/4 tsp. salt I tsp. cinnamon 1 tsp. cloves 1 cup chopped pecans Mix part 2 slightly and add to part 1. Beat for 3 minutes. Pour into Bundt pan. Bake at 350 degrees 1 hour. Take out of pan and cool on rack. Glaze.

Glaze: 1 cup confectioners sugar 1 Tbsps. lemon juice

Glaze cake while still warm. Sprinkle with chopped pecans.

Cook and drain sausage; crumble and set aside.

Separate crescent dough into 8 triangles; place triangles with clongated points toward center in a greased 12-inch pizza pan.

Spoon sausage over dough; sprinkle with hash browns and Cheddar cheese.

Combine eggs, milk, salt & pepper; pour over sausage mixture. Bake at 375 degrees 25 minutes. Sprinkle with Parmesan and bake an additional 5 minues. Yield: 6-8 servings.

Top with ketchup or picante sauce. Reheats well in microwave.

Pork Chops and Wild Rice 1 small green onion, chopped 6 pork chops 3 Tbsps. butter 1 pkg. long grain and wild rice 1 cup thinly sliced celery 1 can cream of chicken soup 2 1/2 cups water 1/2 tsp. salt 1/4 cup pimentos Brown chops on ONE SIDE

ONLY in 2 tablespoons butter, remove and add remaining 1 tablespoon butter. Stir in rice and seasoning package, celery, onion, soup, water and pimento. Heat til bubbly. Pour into shallow dish, top with chops, browned side up. Sprinkle with salt and cover with foil. Bake at 375 degrees 1 hour, uncover and bake about 10 minutes more. Can substitute chicken for chops.

Larry Oaks, executive director of the Texas Historical Commission (THC), and other THC staff members are holding a public meeting in Wichita Falls on June 10, to introduce a new agency initiative, the State of the State of Preservation. weather conditions. The turf problem is a Slime Mold. A common fungal growth associated with wet conditions. This is alarming, but poses no threat to your lawn.







Senior bike riders heading to the hills

Bike riding the mountains of eastern Oklahoma is a method being used by a group of senior athletes to train for the upcoming North Texas Senior Olympics, Sept. 9 - 12, in Wichita Falls.

An Iowa Park group will join about 1500 other bike enthusiasts to travel the 450 mile Oklahoma Freewheel, June 12 - 19, from Broken Bow to Baxter Springs, Kansas. The seven day trip averages 60 - 70 miles per day.

"This will be an extremely challenging route this year," according to Roger Scarborough who was reared in eastern Oklahoma. He says, "We will be crossing the Kiamichi Mountains and the Sanabois Mountains the first four days then the remainder of the route in northeast Oklahoma is extremely hilly. It will definitely be a great physical training experience. The journey also crosses into Arkansas, Missouri, and Kansas."

Local senior riders include Tim Donovan, Roger and Becky Scarborough, Dr. Benard Burton, and Don Decker. Other non-senior participants are Keith Kruger and Ed Poore.

Don Decker said, "With the spring weather pattern we are almost certain to hit some rain, wind, and or lightning storms." He added, "Everyone is water sealing their tents and carrying rain gear. The group will seek refuge in barns or buildings when lightning gets close."

This annual Freewheel bicycle ride across Oklahoma is sponsored by the Tulsa World Newspaper in cooperation with several bicycle clubs across the state. A different route is made each year. The sponsors provide a baggage truck, sag vehicles, clubs, and youth organizations in the bike repair van, medical support, severe weather emergencies, camping grounds in the overnight towns, police and highway patrol support, and route marking.
