

Nelms reflects on career

When the final seconds ticked off the clock in Sweetwater back in November, the Iowa Park Hawks realized their season was over.

They had just lost to Crane in the Regional Round of the playoffs. But Iowa Park lost much more

than a football game that night. They lost their head football coach.

Head coach and Athletic Director Weldon Nelms had announced before the season started that he was stepping down and taking an Administrative position in the High School and turning over the head coaching job to his long time assistant and offensive coordinator Chris

There's no doubt that Ellis will make a fine head coach and will continue to lead the Hawks into the playoffs, but when football season rolls around and you look on the sidelines that last week in August, something will be missing.

Nelms came to Iowa Park in 1994 from Wimberly, where he led the Texans to a 40-9-1 record over his four years as head coach there. His team made the playoffs all four years and in '93 advanced to the State Semi-Finals and were within three seconds of moving on to the Title game before losing to Omaha Paul Pewitt on a field goal at the buzzer.

In Iowa Park Nelms finished his

six-year stint with a 38-31 record, which included five straight playoff appearances, with the last two seasons ending in the Regional Round.

Nelms started his coaching career as a graduate assistant at Westem New Mexico State, then moved on to Springlake-Earth in 1980, where he served as an assistant coach for two years before moving up to the head coaching position for three Collins received preliminary autopsy seasons, finishing with a 16-14 mark. From there he went to Lubbock Estacado in '85 and served as the line coach and track coach.

In '87 he moved to Rotan and served as the head coach for three Police Officer, and his wife were seasons, compiling a record of 26-9-2 and three playoff appearances, advancing as far as the Quarter Finals. Jan. 4.

In all, his record stands at 120-63-3 and his teams have qualified for the playoffs in 12 of his last 13 years as a head coach. The only exception was his first year at Iowa Park when he finished 0-10.

"It was a given up front," said Nelms. "The board and the superintendent said there was a lot of rebuilding to be done, and in all fairness and honesty that was the main reason I took the job. I saw it as a challenge and that's one of the parts of the job that I love. A lot of people I knew told me that I couldn't win here and when we lost our first 15 games I thought they might be right.'

That's when Kerry Maroney, the city's engineer, discovered the problem. He was preparing specifications for soliciting bids for a new coating when he discovered the problem.

City Administrator Mike Price quoted Maroney at the meeting as saying negative comments had been received from many paint suppliers, pointing out that their new application likely would not last more than five years.

Council members instructed Price to go ahead and get bids for a new coating, after they were informed that the removal of the alkyd base and new paint coating could cost as much as \$250,000.

Pecan Patties

- 1 1/2 cup uncooked oatmeal
- 1 tsp. salt
- 1 tsp. sage
- 3 eggs
- 1 cup chopped onion 1 cup chopped pecans

Mix oatmeal, salt and sage; add beaten eggs, onions and pecans. Let stand for 1 hour. Drop by spoonful and brown in hot oil.

Make a gravy of 1 can cream of mushroom soup and 1 soup can of milk. Pour over patties and bake 1 hour.

Pecan Pie

- 4 eggs, slightly beaten
- 1 cup sugar
- 1 cup light corn syrup
- 1 tsp. vanilla Dash of slt
- 3 Tbsps. margarine
- 1 1/2 cups whole pecans 1 - 9-inch pie shell, unbaked

Mix eggs, sugar, corn syrup, vanilla, salt and margarine together. Stir in pecans and pour into pie shell. Bake at 325 degrees 50-55 minutes or until filling is almost firm.

Popcorn Balls

- 2 cups sugar
- 1 cup white Karo
- 1 tsp. vanilla
- 1 cup milk 1 Tbsp. butter
- 2 cups pecans
- 2 gals, popped com

Cook and stir sugar, Karo, and milk to softball stage - 234 degrees on thermometer. Add vanilla, butter and pour popped corn and pecans. Mix well. Shape into balls keeping hands moistened with a little cold water. Wrap balls in plastic wrap.

Caramels

- 2 cups sugar 1 3/4 cup white Karo
- 1 cup butter
- 2 cups light cream (half & half)
- 4 cups pecans 2 tsps. vanilla

Cook sugar, Karo, 1 cup of cream, and 1/2 cup butter for 5 minutes to 219 on a candy thermometer. Add remaining cream and butter gradually (a bit at a time) so it never stops boiling. Cook and stir until thermometer reaches 234 degrees. (For hard caramels, cook to 236 degrees). Add vanilla and nuts. Pour onto greased jelly roll pan and let set and cool overnight. Cut into 1-inch squares and wrap in plastic wrap.

Hot Pecan Spread

- 1 8 oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened
- 2 Tbsps. milk
- 2 ozs. dried beef, chopped 1/4 cup green pepper, minced
- 2 Tbsps. onion, minced 1/2 cup sour cream
- 1/2 tsp. garlic salt 1/4 tsp. pepper

Topping: 2 Tbsps. butter 1/2 tsp. salt

1/2 cup pecans, chopped

Blend together cheese and milk. Stir in dried beef, green pepper, onion, sour cream and seasoning. Mix well and pour into 1-quart baking

To make topping, melt butter in a small skillet. Add salt and pecans and saute over medium heat until lightly browned. Spread over cream cheese mixture and bake at 350 degrees 20 minutes. Serve hot with

Butter Pecan Ice Cream

6 eggs

- 1 2/3 cup sugar
- 1 can Eagle Brand sweetened condensed milk
- 1 pt. whipping cream
- 1 Tbsp. vanilla
- 1 Tbsp. butter flavoring
- 1 tsp. maple flavoring 1/2 cup pecans, sauteed in 1 Tbsp. butter
- Whole milk to fill freezer

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

"Real financial planning must include more than just investment advice and retirement planning," he said. "It should also encompass a personal assessment that incorporates every financial aspect of your life. With this information, personal money planning can help you reach your financial goals and ensure it all works together to meet individual needs."



had been unable to sell the remains, and asked for 30 more days during which his son would use to remove the brick for further use.

Following that process, the remains would be used by the volunteer firemen as a training site, by setting it afire.

An additional 30 days following the burning would be allowed to clean away the remains, it was decided.

No action was taken on a resolution concerning a new 10-year contract with I.E.S.I. for solid waste collection and removal. Aldermen wanted more time to check the details of the contract, following its review and proposed changes by the city attorney.

A resolution was approved, however, authorizing the mayor to continue the city's membership in funding the North Texas Regional Drug Enforcement Task Force, for the 11th year.

The city's share, unless confiscations by the Task Force fall short, would be as much as \$8,463.

Another resolution which was approved is a joint contract with

Wichita County, Wichita Falls and Burkburnett for a three-year contract extension for ambulance service with American Medical Response.

A proposal to allow the hiring of a computer consultant to evaluate the city's computer needs and develop cost estimates, for budget purposes, was approved.

Price proposed hiring Christie Threadgill of Innovative Creations in Wichita Falls for that purpose, as a cost estimated less than \$2,500.

No action was taken following a 30-minute executive session of the council, held for the purpose of "considering purchase of property for possible park improvement purposes.

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



Stock Shows

Its January, its starting to get cold, its stock show time!

The stock show season will kick off with the Ft. Worth Stock Show starting on Jan. 19 with the arrival of the goats and heifers. The steers, lambs and hogs will arrive and show the week of Feb. 1-5.

Starting on the 7th of February, the San Antonio Stock Show will kick off with the breeding gilts, the goat show. The market hogs (like last year), will be arriving according to breed either Feb. 13 or 16. The lambs and steers will both arrive on the 15th and show the 16th through 18th.

Houston will start the mid part of February and continue through Mar. 4. The hogs will arrive at Brenham for the sifting on Feb. 14 through 26, and the top 660 (out of some 3,000 to

4,000) will arrive at Houston for judging on Feb. 29. The lambs will arrive at Rosenberg on Feb. 27 for their sifting. The top 324 lambs will arrive at Houston for judging on March 1 and 2.

The goats will arrive at Houston on Feb. 27 and show on the 28th. The steers will arrive at Houston on Mar. 1 and will be judged on Mar. 2 and 3.

The San Angelo Stock Show will start with the goat show on the 4th and 5th of March. The hogs and steers will arrive on Mar. 7. The lambs will arrive on Mar. 8 and all three will be judged on Mar. 9 and 10.

Then the Wichita County Stock Show will start on Mar. 9 at the MPEC in Wichita Falls. All animals will be arriving by 6 p.m. on Mar. 9, with the exception of the horses and rabbits. Also, on Mar. 9 the steers,





Miller pulls game out from line

Any good basketball coach will tell you the importance of free throw shooting, especially in a close game on the road.

Iowa Park head coach Tim Clark has been preaching that to his team all year long as he's watched the Hawks struggle from the line so far this season.

And the Hawks continued to struggle Tuesday night, missing 15 iree throws in the District 5-3A opener on the road in Henrietta.

But even though Iowa Park missed enough charity shots to blow the game open, the Hawks found themselves tied with the Bearcats at 62-62 with just over 10 seconds left in the game.

The Bearcats grabbed a 64-62 lead with six seconds left and had a chance to make it a three-point lead, but a missed free throw gave the Hawks a chance to tie or win the game with a three-pointer.

Landon Miller, who had already scored 30 points in the game, took the inbounds pass, dribbled the length of the court, stopping just behind the three-point line and released his shot with only six tenths of a second remaining. The shot didn't fall, but he did, as the whistle blew sending him to the line for three free throws.

With ice water running through his veins he calmly sank all three, giving Iowa Park the 65-64 win over Henrietta.

"Thank you Landon Miller," said Clark. "Those might have been the biggest clutch free throws I've seen since I've been coaching."

Iowa Park trailed by six at intermission and watched the lead grow to 12 in the third quarter before mounting it's comeback. Clark called a time out midway through the third quarter with his team down by a dozen and changed up his defense, going to

a full court man-to-man, then sat back and watched his team turn a 12-point deficit into an eight-point lead heading into the final quarter. Iowa Park outscored Henrietta 26-12 in the period.

In the fourth quarter, Henrietta's big gun Kyle Jeffries found the hot hand and pulled the Bearcats back into the game by knocking down several long range jumpers, finishing with 31 points. But in the end it came down to free throws. Henrietta missed the one that could have put the Bearcats up by three, and Miller made them pay by sinking all three of his.

"We played okay at times,"
Clark added. "We really started playing better in the third quarter when we went to our man defense, which is our best defense. We picked it up and were a lot more aggressive. Henrietta did a good job with their zone. They really packed it in against our post players.

Joining Landon Miller in double figures for the Hawks was Chase Wright, who finished with 20 points to go along with several steals and double figures in rebounds.

Earlier in the week, Iowa Park traveled to Decatur to close out the non-district portion of their schedule, falling 70-49 to the Eagles. Landon Miller led Iowa Park in scoring with 13 points followed by Wright with 10 and Justin Penn with nine.

The Hawks will continue district play Friday at 8:30 p.m. when they play host to Childress. Iowa Park will then travel to Bowie on Tuesday to take on the Jackrabbits.

Honor requirement for magna cum laude is a grade point average of 3.70-3.89.

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

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

time for the kids as well as the coaches. We were just out athleted as well as going through all the changes. The second year was a lot easier even though we lost our first five games. You could see it every week even in those losses, we were making progress every week and when we got that first win you could just see it. It was a huge relief. The pressure was gone and our program had reached the first phase of what we were trying to accom-

"In building anything, to be successful everybody has to believe in the same thing," Nelms stated. "That's part of what started to happen our second year. Our kids came together, as well as the community and fan support. The kids began to believe that they were not losers. I don't think even when we were 0-10 that we were a bad football team, we just didn't realize what it took to win. What made it so sweet when we made the playoffs that first time was that everybody got to see where we came from that first year. The change in how the kids felt about each other and the way the community felt about our program. It wasn't just Friday night football anymore, it was Hawk football and that was a big change. Those first two groups of kids, even though they didn't have a great won-loss record, laid the ground work for the success we are enjoying now."

"And even with me stepping down and coach Ellis taking over, I don't think you'll see any changes. These kids expect to win now. They've devoted themselves to working hard and to do whatever it takes to be successful. There's no way you can put it in writing to explain how it feels until you've been part of it as a coach. As a coach you know that you're never going to get rich, but I think this is the richness of it when you get to see it all come together."

"Our kids know that we as coaches have high levels of expectation and so do they," said Nelms. "Going to the Regional round of the playoffs the last two years isn't good enough. They want more and they'll work even harder this off season to try and achieve their goals. They're going to continue to achieve and the kids that follow them will do the same. That's when you know that you've got a good program. It doesn't matter if it's football, basketball, baseball, track or whatever, our kids are going to be competitive. One of the things that's really helped our program is the closeness of our kids, and if there's any one thing that gives me more satisification than anything is to see our kids work together."

In coaching a lot of times you are judged only by your won-loss record. It's pretty simple most of the time. Either win or get fired. And at 0-10 his first year and after losing his first five games his second year makes you wonder if Nelms wasn't looking in the Yellow Pages under U-Haul.

"I think the pressure to win was brought on more by me than anyone," said Nelms. "No one ever told me my job was in jeopardy if I didn't win, and I always felt I had the support from the board and the community. But at 0-10 it did cross my mind. All my life I was taught not to quit, and to be honest when we were 0-10 I had several opportunities to leave but I didn't because I didn't feel like I had fufilled my commitment here and the challange still motivated me. Until I felt like this program had taken off and was successful, I wasn't going to be satisified."

One of the hardest things for most people to understand is how a coach can go from being a die-hard Wimberly Texan fan one day to becoming the biggest Iowa Park Hawk fan the next.

"I still have special memories of all the teams I've played on and the teams I've coached," said Nelms. "I still keep up with their scores. In this profession you take all those special memories with you, you don't ever give them up and when you go to that next school the only way you can sell yourself and your program to the kids

is to show them you bleed Green. I love Iowa Park and I'd do anything in the world for the Hawks. I picked up my life, my wife and three daughters to come be a part of this community, not just a football coach, but a part of the community. We've done everything from raising show pigs to getting dunked in a dunking booth. But when it's over you put that chapter of your book in a special place in your heart and you can go back there anytime and re-live those special memories."

"Last year I felt like I was at the crossroads of my career," Nelms added. "And I still don't know what chapter I will open next. But I know that the six years I've spent here in Iowa Park, I wouldn't take anything for them, not even the 0-10 year. The challenge of seeing the kids grow, graduate and come back, that's what it's all about."

Whichever chapter Nelms decides to open next in his life will only add to his book, which will surely be a best-seller. Especially here in Iowa
