

City buys land for golf course

Golfers, take heart! You may have your own golf course here in the next few years.

Though action taken during Monday night's meeting of the city council was not described as such on the agenda, that is the city's goal.

Following a half-hour executive session, called for the purpose of considering "purchasing property for possible park improvement purposes," the council approved the purchase of 135.24 acres of land.

The undeveloped property, owned by Gene Wigley, includes the land between Lake Buffalo and US 287, on the west side of Wigley Road.

The agreement was that the city will pay \$2,000 per acre, and Wigley will finance the purchase for up to five years, at six percent interest.

It was also stipulated that Wigley be allowed to lease the land during the time the city does not begin utilizing the property.

Aldermen voted unanimous approval of the purchase, after returning to the open session that followed the closed meeting that lasted half an hour.

Monday was the second time the council has met behind closed doors on the issue. The issue also was on the council's Jan. 10 agenda, but no action was taken at that time.

After the lengthy discussion, Mayor Tim Hunter told House that one of three motions were needed in order to take care of the issue: to delay, to approve the proposed contract, or disapprove it.

House made the motion to postpone action, and Alderman Bud Mercer seconded it. Both voted to approve, but Aldermen Joe Singer, Joe Ward and Tracy Fears voted against it.

That was followed by a motion from Fears to approve the contract and Ward seconded it. The motion was approved 4-1, with House casting the only descenting vote.

Aldermen approved appointment of Administrator Mike Price as the city's Fair Housing/Equal Opportunity Standards Officer, in conjunction with the city's Texas Capital Fund Projects.

A resolution designating the month of February as Fair Housing Month and supporting Fair Housing activities within the city was approved.

An ordinance was adopted, offering a \$200 reward for information leading to the arrest and conviction of anyone found guilty of disposing unqunauthorized liquid waste into the

city's sanitary sewer system.

The action was taken concerning the unauthorized dumping of wastes from septic tanks and grease traps into the city's sewer system.

Stage four of the city's drought contingency plan could possibly be put into action within 30 days, unless some beneficial precipitation adds to the supply in the city's lakes, Price informed the council.

Proposed street improvement projects for this year were approved by the council.

Listed in order of priority for resurfacing were Surrey Circle, West Smith, North First, North Park and North Jackson.

Completion of those projects depend on funds available, it was explained.

Streets on the list for slurry projects included, in order of priority: West Manes, North Second, North First, North Bond, West Lafayette, West and East Emerald, East Poe, West Aldine, North jackson, South Wall, West Jefferson and James Drive.

Completion of work on that list will depend not only on funds available, but also on the cooperation of the weather.

He is nuts about nuts. Herb Smallwood shells about two hundred pounds of pecans a year and brushes each one to assure there is no trash in his pecan pies.

He began making pecan pies about 25 years ago, using the standard recipe. Herb says pecan pie has always been his favorite pie. He always had pecans around, so after retiring from the Air Force and he had time on his hands, he baked a pie.

Herbshared his pies with friends and family. But then something happened. He gave an undercooked pie to a friend who was going to serveit to out of town guests. When she cut the pie there was still liquid in it.

Herb said,"I was embarrassed and I decided I would never be embarrassed again because my pie was not fully cooked."

That could have been the end of Herb's pie baking. But he is not a quitter so he worked on a method that would assure him the pies were fully cooked throughout. That method helped him create an award winning pie.

A few years after he perfected his pies he was invited to enter his pies in the Charlie - Thornberry Pecan Festival baked goods contest., a fundraiser for the Charlie - Thornberry Volunteer Fire department.

The first year Herb entered one of his pies, he said after the winners were announced, someone said they were going to do something they had not done in the past. They announced, "We would like to give special recognition to Mrs. Herb Whoops! Ladies, looks like you have some competition, Mr. Herb Smallwood."

Herb has entered and placed with his pies each year since then. After the baked goods winners are announced they are auctioned off, and monies raised goes to the Charlie -Thornberry Volunteer Fire Department.

pies sell to help this cause.

He stated two years ago he had told the auctioneer he wanted him to get \$100 for his pie. He didn't quite get that amount.

This past year, Herb served the auctioneer a sliver of pie so he would have "food for thought" before he auctioned Herb's pie. It sold for \$100. There were two men bidding on

the pie. The man that didn't get the pie was disappointed because he had wanted to take the pie to Alabama to his daughter. So, Herb offered to bake him a pie. The man donated \$50 to the Charlie - Thornberry Volunteer Fire Department for the pie Herb was to bake him.

With pride on his face Herb shared some of the complements he has received on his pies, such as, "I am not a pecan pie eater, but I'll eat your pie anytime I can get it." And "When I eat your pie I can just taste the love you put into the pie."

Herb says he has never had anyone taste his pie who didn't like it. He stated his pie doesn't taste as sweet as other pecan pies he has tasted. He contributes that to there being pecans throughout his pie not just on the top. He also places a whole pecan in the center of his pies, calling it his 'praying hands.'He says the pie has already been blessed, no calories, so you can eat all you want.

Herb admits he is no expert on pies, but says he has never eaten a better pecan pie.

Pies are not Herb's only past time.

With his wife, Lona, at work at Midwestern State Univ., he finds plenty to keep him busy.

After retirement he began remodeling homes while attending MSU to finish his degree in business.

Herbs says when he got his degree he was having so much fun doing what he was doing and getting

doing it.

The details and painting while working on homes helped him fine tune his wood-working skills. (Remodeling homes is also where he met many of the recipients of his pies.)

Herb said," I make a lot of saw dust and every now and then something nice comes out of it." He added, When it does I make three of them, one for each grandchild."

He makes toys, golf carts, and other wood items and is an avid golfer who plays most every day.

Lona enjoys crafts and collects porcelain dolls.

The couple enjoy traveling and camping when time permits as well as spending time with their grandchildren.

Herb's North Texas Pecan Pie 1 All Ready Pie Crust 19" Deep Dish Pie Pan

3 Eggs

3/4 Cup of sugar 1 cup light or dark corn syrup

1 tsp. vanilla extract

4 Tbls. butter or margarine, melted 2 cups of chopped pecans 1 full cup of pecan halves Dash of salt optional

Place All Ready Pie Crust in pie pan and set aside. Beat three eggs lightly. Add sugar and syrup to the eggs, beating constantly. Stir in butter, vanilla and salt (if desired).

Add chopped pecans and mix well. Pour mixture into pie shell and place in oven preheated to 400 degrees. Baking time is approximately 1 hour and ten minutes.

The following is very important: After ten minutes, slide oven shelf out so pie is accessible. Take a fork and gently remix pecans and syrup. Start in the middle of the pie and work toward the edge. (Starting at the side makes the syrup move onto the edge of the crust or even spill over).

After first mixture, reduce heat to 375 degrees. Every ten minutes repeat the process of remixing the ingredients. Continue doing this until there is no runny syrup. At this time place pecan halves on top of the pie, pressing them in gently. Bake another 10 to 12 minutes.

Yield: One very delicious 9 inch pie.

OTHER BUSINESS

Following a discussion that lasted almost an hour, aldermen approved a revised contract with I.E.S.I. for the solid waste collection and disposal services.

Though the current contract has another four years remaining, the new agreement extends for another six years, making it a 10-year pact.

A portion of the contract calls for an annual increase in charges of four percent.

Discussion on the contract was prolonged when Alderman Wayne House expressed a desire to postpone it for at least 30 days, during which time the city would make a study that could lead to the collection work being done once again by city employees.

Light week for police Only one case during the past

week resulted in an arrest by officers of the Iowa Park Police Dept.

When an officer stopped a vehicle at 2:31 a.m. Monday on the Access Road near Johnson Road, the couple was taken into custody.

James Dennis Hall, 38, was cited for having no drivers license and no liability insurance. After being detained at the police station until his identity could be confirmed, he was released after promising to appear in municipal court.

His companion, Sheila Joyce Choppy, 27, was taken into custody on a charge of public intoxication. She was detained 10 hours, and then released after promising to appear in municipal court, according to the police blotter.

On Saturday, a citizen turned over a small wooden jewelry box he found in a ditch in the 400 block of West Aldine, containing less than two ounces of marijuana.

Police believe the owner had tossed the box away in fear of being caught in its possession.

Trustees open bids for school projects

School trustees got their first look at bid proposals for construction work, to be funded by approved bonds, Tuesday afternoon.

The bid openings, which took close to three and a half hours to complete, was held in the middle school cafeteria, with a large crowd of contractors present.

Reason for the procedure being so lengthy, according to Michael Marrs of Marrs Architects, Inc., was that they had received three times the normal number of bids. "This is the most interest I've had in a project in several years," he said.

After all the bids had been opened, Marrs commented that he was pleased with the range of the bids

The Hambrights are members of Jefferson Street Baptist Church in Wichita Falls.



Award winners for the evening included:


