County Hospital Possibly To Have Doctors Before Jan. 1

BAIRD--In view of rising costs of operation, the county commissioners are considering an offer to lease the Callahan County Hospital to an outside source.

The Commissioners and board members met last week in the courthouse, and it was apparent, at the start of the meeting that no one thought the hospital could survive in its present state.

The men agreed that the people of Callahan County want the hospital to stay open, and so, the Boards should try to keep it going.

County Judge A.E. Dyer Jr., who presided over the meeting, stated that if the 26 bed County Hospital is ever allowed to close, it would be terribly hard to re-open.

Judge Dyer stated that a Filipino group called Texas

Medical Assistants Service Inc., wants to lease the hospital for five years and staff it with doctors from the Philippines, although, if all goes well an American, Bob Martin from Florida, will be the administrator, at least for a while.

Dyer said the group wants six months free leasing at the start and expects to bring in the first doctor in mid-December, and possibly two men and two women doctors by the first of the year, if the proposal is approved.

Baird has been without a doctor for the last two years and the hospital is therefore not caring for enough patients to meet its monthly expenditures. The hospital board members left the decision to the county commissioners because the problem is financial and commissioners have charge of

allocating county money to the various tax-supported projects within the County.

The next few days, the commissioners will investigate the proposal closely to see, for example, how the operation would be funded until the first doctors get here, and start putting patients in the hospital.

Dyer and a representative of the Doctors, proposes the County getting lease money for outside maintenance of the hospital and the Filipinos paying for everything else.

The Callahan County Hospital was opened in 1939, and though the building remains the same outside, there have been many improvements and remodeling in its 35 years of operation, and the hospital's coronary care unit is a source of particular pride to the staff.

The Texas Medical Assistance, Inc., took the contract last Friday to look it over, and if they agree, they should sign it and return it sometime during the next two weeks.

Judge A.E. Dyer explained that the doctors who would come here already have gained accreditation for American practice and would only have to get their Texas licenses to begin work here.

Pasture Short Course Begins In Clyde

CLYDE--A pasture short course for adult farmers will be held Nov. 11, through 14, under the sponsorship of the Clyde High School Vocational Agriculture Department, according to James Trammell and Tim Stone, Vocational Agriculture teachers.

Mr. Phillip Nix, pasture specialist with the Vocational Agriculture Division of the Texas Education Agency and the department of Soil and Crop Sciences at Texas A&M University will do the instructing in the course. He is headquartered at Texas A&M University.

Mr. Nix holds B.S. and M.M. Degrees in Agriculture Education from Texas A&M* and had some work in Agronomy at A&M. He has had nineteen years of field experience as an agriculture teacher and as a county agricultural agent, where much of the emphasis was on pasture production.

"Many Pasture Short Courses in various parts of the state have been taught by Mr. Nix and all have met with outstanding success", according to Ralph Moser, Area Supervisor of Vocational Agriculture at Stephenville.

The course at Clyde is scheduled to begin Monday, Nov. 11, at 7 p.m. in the Ag. Building. During the dates the short course is in progress Mr. Nix will be available to assist farmers with individual problems and to provide on-the-farm instruction, according to Trammell and Stone.

Persons interested in attending the short course may pre-register by contacting Superintendent Ferrell Newton or the Vocational Agricultural Teachers. They can also register at the start of the short course.

An entry fee of \$3.00 will be charged. Pasture Short Course Certificates are to be presented

to each enrollee who attends all the training sessions.

Mr. Nix states that the short course will be adjusted to the wishes and interests of farmers enrolled but he expects to cover such subjects as adapted grasses and legumes, fertilization, weed control, grazing management, and grazing systems.

The primary purpose of the course is to help farmers and ranchers make the most profit from their pastures.

Insurance On Bank

Deposits Increases

BAIRD--On Oct. 28, 1974, the President approved an amendment to the Federal Deposit Insurance Act. Among other things, this legislation increases insurance on deposits from \$20,000 to \$40,000 for each depositor, effective on Nov. 27. It also provides insurance of public unit funds in some circumstances not to exceed \$100,000 per account. The First National Bank of Baird is a FDIC insured bank.



We wished we could have played a game this week to keep our competitive edge, but we intend to regain it this week against an excellent Merkel Badger ball club.

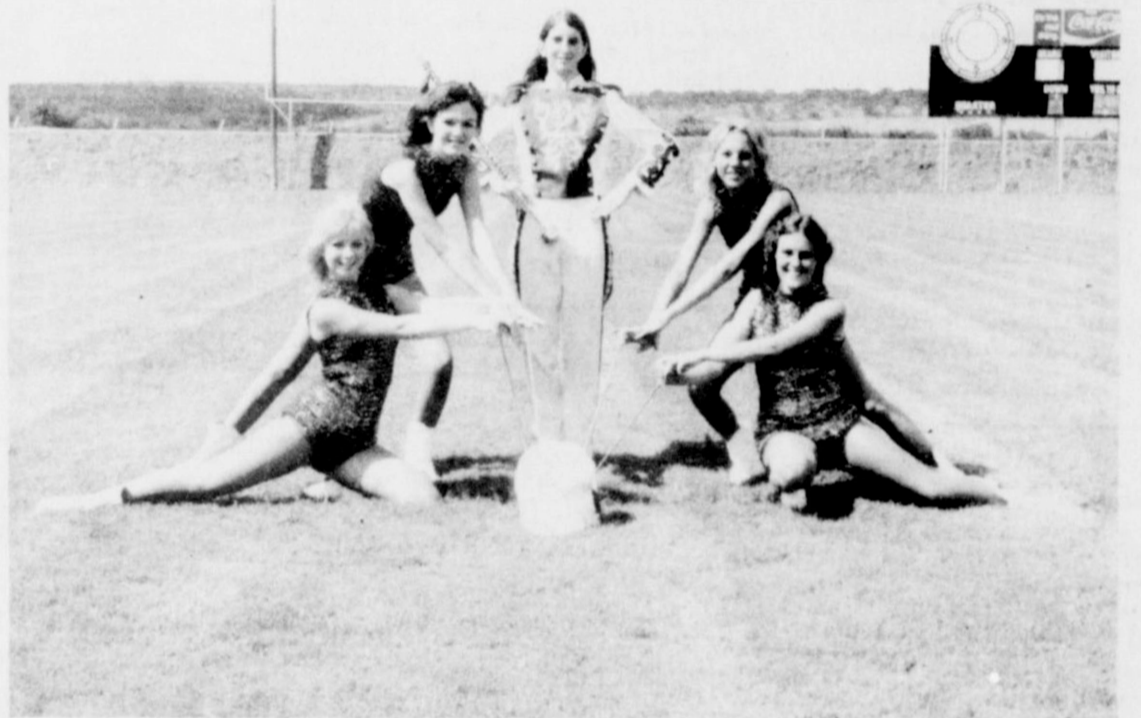
