MAHD Okays THA Dues; Renovations

Cecil Maddox of Friona was the first speaker at the special meeting of the Muleshoe Area Hospital District Wednesday night at Muleshoe Area Medical Center.

Maddox explained to Board members that he is consulting with MAHD employees on a benefit package for all full time employees of the hospital and nursing home.

Following a discussion of probable benefits, the MAHD voted to become members of the Texas Hospital Association, with dues of \$2,420 per year.

Also discussed was a partial payment on the agreed price of \$108,000 to the West Plains Medical Center Board, who said they wanted to clear accounts with local vendors and merchants.

The item will be placed on the next agenda for approval.

Next to be discussed was the physician recruitment program, and the board approved participating in the Methodist Hospital Recruitment program.

Steve Grappe, a Methodist Hospital vice president, who was present at the meeting, said Methodist Hospital will pay one half of the \$20,000 cost for recruitment of additional physicians for Muleshoe.

Following an update on the progress being made on repairs mandated by Medicare, Rachel Snider, administrator of the Muleshoe Area Health Care Center, reported on the upcoming renovation of the hospital and nursing home laundry.

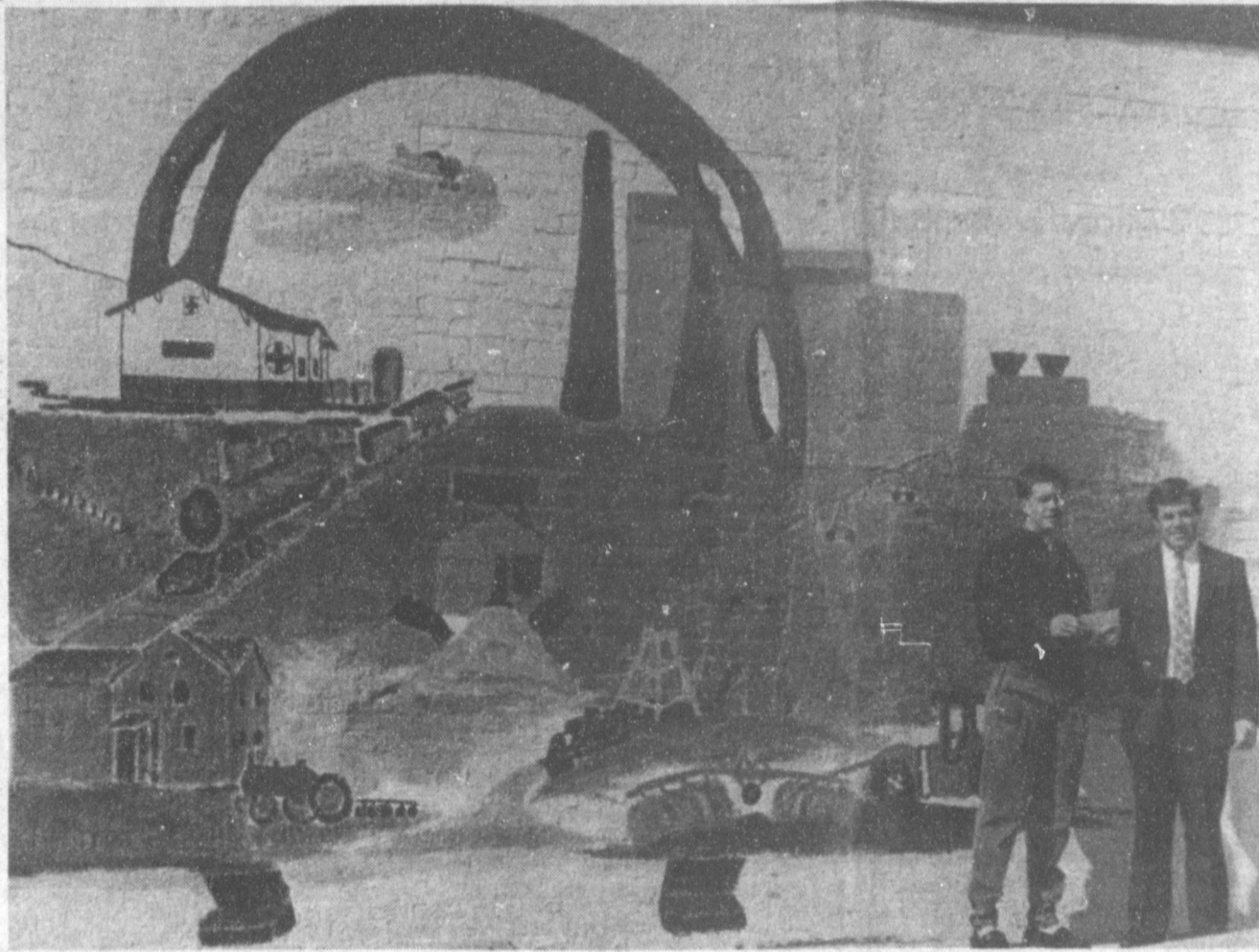
She also said that no Medicaid checks will be paid for nursing home care until the nursing home is inspected and re-certified.

Other brief discussions were held on the Parmer County Appraisal District; a budget hearing for Wednesday, August 30; the selection of a CPA firm to represent the Muleshoe Area Hospital District; emergency room physician coverage; new technology available from Texas Tech's Radiology department and an ambulance for Lazbuddie.

Breakdown On County Budget Shows Big 2-Year Increases

Watch For School Buses, Say Officials

Tom Alvis, Assistant Superintendent, would like to caution everyone relative to safety measures to protect children riding school buses and also children walking to school.

Alvis said all drivers of school buses have completed a 20-hour refresher course taught by David Gray, a high school instructor, therefore, the drivers are certified by the Texas Education Agency.

In general, these are the laws that should be obeyed to assure protection of all students:

- (1) Obey speed limits, especially in the school zones -- the limit is 15 miles per hour.
- (2) Drivers stop completely for unloading students when red flashing lights on the bus are in operation.
- (3) Watch out for small children on their way to and from school.
- (4) Make complete stops, especially where crosswalks are painted.
- (5) Drive as if your child were a pedestrian or a school bus rider.
- (6) Parents should have their children at the assigned pick-up points on time or a little ahead of time.

He added that the fair is free and open to the general public.

This year's fair is being sponsored by the Bailey County Extension Program Council, the Muleshoe Rotary Club, Valley Grain Products, Inc., and the Bailey County Commissioners' Court.

Fair catalogs are available at the Bailey County Extension office located in the courthouse, added Tanksley, saying, "the catalog has more details on the types of items which can be entered."

Exhibits to the fair will be accepted from adults and youth (18 years old or under) who live in Bailey, Parmer, Lamb and Cochran counties. There is a special division for 4-H youth in Bailey County.

Entries will be accepted in the following divisions: field crops, horticulture, culinary, canned fruits and vegetables, textiles, fine arts, and crafts and hobbies.

Exhibitors may enter two items per class at this year's fair.

Muleshoe Rotary Club will be handling the commercial and food booth reservations. Anyone interested in setting up a booth should contact R. D. (Dick) Chitwood at 272-5097 or (mobile) 272-6261.

Also, the Rotary Club announces that the theme chosen for this year's fair is 'The Wild, Wild West.' A special prize will be awarded to the best commercial and best food booth by the Muleshoe Rotary Club.

The cash prizes will be \$50 for the commercial booth and \$25 for the food booth.

Tanksley said, "The educational booths add greatly to the fair and we would like to encourage all businesses and organizations in the county to participate."

"Any civic group or health-related organization is also welcome to have items or displays at the fair."

Any interested group or organization is urged to contact Dick Chitwood so a space, or booth, will be available for you.

Special cash prizes will be awarded this year to the 'Best of Show' winner in each division. Adult winners will receive \$25 in cash and 4-H-and-Youth winners will receive \$10 in cash.

1 pkg. (3 1/2 oz.) instant chocolate pudding and pie filling mix
1-2 squares semi-sweet chocolate, melted
1 cup cold milk
1 cup cherry pie filling
1 (8 inch) graham cracker crust

Spread 1 cup of whipped topping on bottom of pie crust. Combine milk and pudding mix in medium bowl. Blend with wire whisk or electric mixer (low speed) for 1 minute. Fold in 1 1/2 cups whipped topping. Spread over whipped topping in crust. Spread remaining whipped topping over top, leaving a 1" border and forming a depression in center of topping. Spoon cherry pie filling in the center. Chill at least 2 hours. Garnish edges of topping with melted chocolate if desired.

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Muleshoe's Tax Rebate Check Still 'Larger'

State Comptroller Bob Bullock said Friday that cities, counties and transit authorities received 9.8 percent more in sales tax rebates this month than they did in August 1988.

"We sent more than \$193 million in sales tax money to local governments this month, and Texas businesses continue to report higher sales tax collections," Bullock said.

Bullock noted that cities received an average of 7.4 percent more income from sales tax this month than in August 1988, and year-to-date payments to cities are up by an average of 9.7 percent over the same period last year.

"We've predicted that the steady growth trend will continue, although it remains spotty in some areas of the state," Bullock said.

Checks totaling \$121.9 million were sent to 1046 cities that have a local sales tax rate of either one or one and one-half percent.

Muleshoe in Bailey County received a net payment this period of \$27,946.72, up 26.07 percent from the \$22,167.46 received for the same period a year ago. Last year, total payments to date were \$142,937.44, up by 8.52 percent to the current total of \$155,116.88 for this year.

From Cochran County, Morton shows a 3.88 percent increase in current payments. Their payment for this period was \$6,253.86, compared to the \$6,020.49 received for the same period a year ago. Current payments to date have decreased however. Payments this year to date have totaled \$39,705.79, down 3.18 percent from the total of \$41,010.92 at this time last year.

Littlefield, in Lamb County, shows an increase in current payments for this period of 11.60 percent. Their current payment was \$32,914.97, and at this time last year, the payment was \$29,493.49. To date for the year, Littlefield shows an overall increase of 4.29 percent. Their total payments to date for the year are \$179,360.00, as compared to the \$171,987.25 at this same time a year ago.

From Parmer County, Frona

shows a minus for current payments. Their payment at this time last year was \$12,679.18, down 2.34 percent to \$12,382.29 for the same period this year. Overall for the year, they show an increase of 8.05 percent. Total payments to date at this time last year were \$67,372.62, up by the 8.05 percent to \$72,799.41 at the same time this year.

Houston received \$20.9 million this month, the largest payment in the state. Dallas' check of \$13.6 million was second-largest, Bullock said.

The state's six metropolitan transit authorities and one city transit department received \$60.6 million, an increase of 15.1 percent, Bullock said.

Another \$11.3 million was allocated to 92 counties that collect the one-half percent county sales tax.

August's checks represent taxes collected by monthly filers in June and by quarterly filers in April, May and June and reported to the Comptroller's office by July 20, Bullock said.

law enforcement center, \$2,500.

Other expenses, water for courthouse and law enforcement center, \$2,000; water, district judge, \$275; repair, law enforcement center, \$3,000; repair, courthouse, \$4,000; repair, postage scales, \$100; repair, fire truck, \$600; rent, district judge, \$1,920; property insurance at \$2,000; and shared services with city, \$8,500.

Also, civil defense, \$500; liability insurance, \$15,000; fire truck insurance, \$575; miscellaneous, \$7,500; election expense at \$4,000; fire protection, \$5,000; capital expenditures, \$8,000; law library, \$5,500; copy machine lease purchase, \$2,125; county historical committee, \$250; and contingency fund, \$5,000.

For the Health Services and Aging Department, the budget for 1988 was \$160,620.48. This amount was hiked to \$229,442.90 for 1989 and the proposed amount for 1990 is a total of \$169,444.84.

This breaks down to \$27,208.88 for salaries; and \$7,616 for benefits.

Under operating expense for

the office are office supplies at \$600; postage for \$250; telephone at \$800; travel, \$1,000; and repair office machines, \$200.

The van operating expense is \$2,000 for gas; repair and maintenance at \$1,500 and insurance for \$800.

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

Herbicide Okay Given Producers Of Snap Beans

Snap-bean producers in five counties of the Texas High Plains may use the herbicide Poast to rid their fields of Johnsongrass, Agriculture Commissioner Jim Hightower announced Friday.

The herbicide may be used in Farmer, Bailey, Castro, Lubbock and Gaines counties and may be used only until Sept. 1, 1989, added Hightower.

"This is just another example of the Texas Department of Agriculture and the U.S.

Beef Cattle Producers To Attend Symposium

Beef cattle producers and others in related fields will want to attend a statewide policy symposium Oct. 9 at the College Station Hilton.

Theme for the seminar will be "Potential Impacts of the 1990 Farm Bill."

Spencer Tanksley, county agent with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, said the symposium will feature a noted group of speakers who will present policy viewpoints and express opinions on how the 1990 Farm Bill will impact cattlemen and consumers.

Tanksley said the program is designed for beef cattle producers, consumers, agricultural lenders and other associated agribusiness groups.

Among keynoters will be U.S. Rep. Charles Stenholm of Stamford, chairman of the Agriculture Subcommittee for Livestock, Dairy and Poultry, and Mrs. JoAnn Smith, Assistant Secretary of Agriculture, Marketing and Inspection Service with the U.S. Department of Agriculture.

Among other subjects to be discussed by key speakers will be mandatory meat price reporting, animal welfare and patents, food safety and feed grain and dairy policy. An industry viewpoint also will be presented.

The program is being coordinated by the South Central Texas Beef Herd Improvement Association in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, A&M's Department of Agricultural Economics and Texas A&M University, Tanksley said.

Environmental Protection Agency working together to help farmers. We're talking about a relatively small geographic area and a relatively small crop, but to the producers who are affected, Johnsongrass represents a major economic impact," Hightower said.

"Our estimates are that without use of this herbicide, Johnsongrass would cut yields by 20 percent, or \$96 per acre. For the 1,200 acres now authorized for use of Poast, we're putting \$115,200 into the pockets of the producers.

"This is a part of our commitment to crop diversification in Texas," Hightower said. "The very presence of snap beans on the High Plains is one of the many small success stories of Texas agriculture. In an area long dependent on the fortunes of major crops like cotton and wheat, there are now approxi-

mately 6,000 acres of snap beans in production.

"Roughly 20 percent of the acreage is infested with scattered stands of Johnsongrass."

Without special action by TDA and EPA, use of the herbicide would be illegal.

A number of other restrictions apply to use of the herbicide. Producers with questions should call the TDA Pesticide Registration Program in Austin at 512/463-7549.

Whitewing Dove Season Begins Sept. 2

White-winged dove hunters can expect reasonably good shooting during the whitewing season Sept. 2-3 and 9-10 in the Lower Rio Grande Valley.

Ron George, dove program leader for the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department, said whitewing populations are still recovering from the 1983 freeze that reduced citrus nesting sites, but production has been sufficient to maintain average numbers of birds.

"Breeding numbers counted during May were about 25 percent below the long-term average," George said. "However, nesting success since May apparently has been pretty good so it would be a fairly good season."

George said he remains optimistic that whitewing numbers will gradually increase during the next few years because of habitat acquisitions and reforestation projects by the department and the U.S. Fish & Wildlife Service in the Valley.

Whitewing hunters are reminded that a \$6 White-winged Dove Stamp is required to take whitewings in any zone of the state. "Whitewings are expanding their range into several areas of South and Central Texas, so hunters should be aware that they need a stamp if they expect to harvest any whitewings," George said.

The four-day Special Whitewing Season is authorized only in the Special White-Winged Dove Area of the South Zone. Maps of the zones and also the closed sanctuary areas along the river are contained in the department's 1989-90 Early-season Migratory Game Bird Hunting Digest, available from department offices and retail hunting license outlets. This year the three sanctuary tracts designated as "Sanctuary B" are closed to dove hunting during the Special Season.

Hunters also are reminded that a fully-feathered wing must remain on the carcass of any dove taken in the South Zone,

including the Special Whitewing Area, until the bird reaches its final destination.

There is a new change in the bag limit for mourning doves during the two-weekend whitewing season, so hunters should consult the hunting guide to determine the bag limit in the portion of the whitewing area they will be hunting. Basically, sportsmen hunting south and

east of Del Rio may take an aggregate bag of 10 white-winged, mourning and white-tipped doves which may include no more than five mourning doves and two whitetips. North and west of Del Rio this 10-bird aggregate daily bag limit could include as many as 10 mourning doves.

DPS Warns Drivers 'Watch For Buses'

What's yellow and black and has 144 feet? A loaded school bus. Summer Vacation is almost over and children across the state will be returning to school, many

aboard big yellow and black school buses. One of the most common sights on our roadways during the school year, these buses can carry from 71 to 83 seated students on any given trip each day.

Feed Facts Says Corn Adds Cost

In a recent issue of *Feed Facts*, Dr. Richard Arnold, a Dallas-based nutrition consultant, states, "In many areas the relative cost between yellow corn and grain sorghum is such that a lower cost layer diet should result when using grain sorghum to replace yellow corn." He equates the cost per ton savings of five dollars to approximately a one cent per dozen savings in feed cost.

Arnold's research shows that there should be no loss in layer production when replacing corn with sorghum, if the grain is properly balanced with special attention to energy, pigmentation properties and amino acids. Research indicates that the metabolized energy of corn is only 99 percent of the value that has been accepted in the past. If the lower value is true, then grain sorghum would have 97 percent of the metabolized energy of corn. Even using conservative energy values, grain sorghum comes in at 90-95 percent the value of yellow corn.

These being considered, grain sorghum should prove an essential component in saving on feed costs for the egg producer.

Feed Facts is an educational service of the NGSFA Grain Sorghum Promotion Federation, which is supported by the Nebraska Grain Sorghum Development, Utilization and Marketing Board; the Kansas Grain Sorghum Commission; the Texas Grain Sorghum Producers Board; and National Grain Sorghum Producers Association.

"Yet as common as they are, every year there seems to be an unfortunate rash of accidents caused by drivers who fail to follow safe driving practices for a stopped school bus," stated

Major Vernon Cawthon, Regional Commander for the Texas Department of Public Safety.

State law requires drivers on the same roadway, as a school bus that is stopped to load or unload children, to also stop until the bus driver has turned off the flashing red lights. This rule applies unless the vehicle is separated from the bus by a divided highway with a median stripe.

The first few weeks of school are the most dangerous, according to Major Cawthon. "This time of year presents safety problems for both the school children and the driver," he explained. "Many youngsters are attending school for the first

time and others might be going to a different school, where they are unfamiliar with local traffic conditions. One problem seems to be that during the summer recess some drivers have gotten out of the habit of being alert for both school zones and school buses."

Public Safety Officials are

asking Texas drivers to be thinking now about the safety of our school children, as the beginning of a new school year starts up. By observing the speed limits in school zones, being alert for increased pedestrian traffic, and watching for school bus activity, we can make this a safe school year for all.

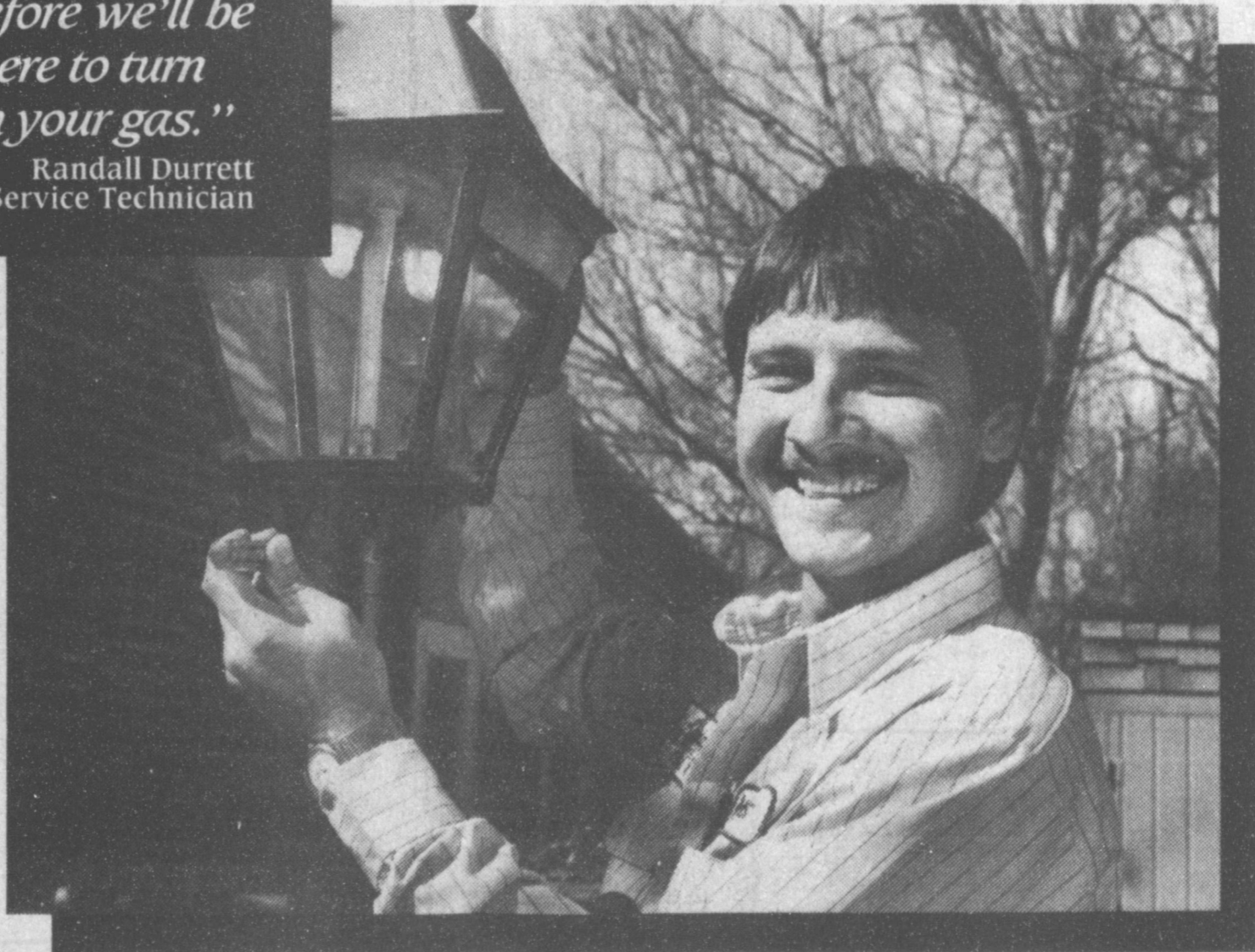
