### YOUR CHAMBER OF Dairymen to Meet COMMERCE —

"Who dunit" may be the most important element in the mystery picture or the detective story, but in building a town, it can be over-

Sometimes in smaller towns, there is more interest in who is doing a thing than in what is being undertaken. When a project is launched, the question too often is "who dunit?" instead of "how can we, 'all working together, get this thing accomplished?"

When citizens pull together, the result is obvious, the public sees a town progressive and alive.

Alone, a man can do only one man's work. The most outstanding president on earth cannot accomplish much unless the members of his organization are working with him. The most alert chairman in the community cannot get far unless his committee members support him in the undertakings of the group. Th eminister, however devout and dedicated to his calling, cannot carry forward the work of the church without the combined co-operation of the officers and the membership.

Occasionally we take our eyes from the limited view of our own opinion and get an over-all picture of the future and of the wonderful worthwhile projects that should be undertaken, and then we pull together, not caring "who dunit," just eager for the good of the town as a whole.

We once knew a little girl who, greatly displeased with her mother, resentfully flung herself out of the house and marched to the end of the garden where she finally came to a halt in her father's hobby shop. Looking around she took from its

rack on the wall a sharp little hatchet and laying her finger on a block drew the hatchet across her thumb again and again, ever so lightly, but darkly muttering all the time: "That's what I'll do, I'll just cut off my thumb, and then Mother will be sorry."

Of course, she was just a little kid, and she didn't cut off her thumb because we saw her when she was grown (in the mirror). But Your Chamber of Commerce knows that scmetimes grown people can come awfully close to cutting off their thumbs rather than co-operating in good movement, just because of the person "who dunit."
