Another step has been taken to make Iowa Park the center of the Hereford cattle industry. Last Tuesday night the Chamber of Com-merce board of directors heard a report from M. L. Smith, chairman of the committee, and voted to back an annual Hereford show and

Mr. Smith reported that his had approached some of the leading Hereford cattle men in this area with the proposal and found them willing to take part. Under the plan as now conceived, expenses of the show and sale will be borne by those stockmen who entered cattle for exhibition and for sale. George D. Keith, prominent in

Hereford cattle circles has suggested that the event be a one-day sale, using one day to make ready, a day for the sale, and a third day for removing the stock from the show grounds

He pointed out that the success of the entire venture depends upon getting the stock in tip-top shape for showing. The quality of the exhibits can make or break the reputation of the show.

Many details are yet to be worked out and the board of directors of the Iowa Park Chamber voted to continue Mr. Smith's committee for that purpose. Another important piece of busi-



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



### **Three Mighty** Important Ideas
