## SUMMER PROGRAM AND EDUCATION PROBLEMS LISTED

George Jones, program chairman, presented two local people in interesting reports at Lions club meeting this week.

Mrs. Taylor George, co-chairman of the summer recreation program committee, announced a Youth Rally set for June 11 when young people of Iowa Park will be given an opportunity to make their own recreation program for the summer months.

At present, Mrs. George said, plans are to offer folk games, ball games, girls' softball, horseshoes and other active sports of this type.

For the very young there will be story telling and games especially selected to interest them.

Dramatics and choral singing will be stressed to fill in where the more active sports do not suffice. Mrs. O. R. Owens has offered her services in directing the choral club.

Mrs. George gave as the aim of the entire program, a determined effort to interest more boys and girls in the program of some church in Iowa Park. She said that remarkable results had accrued from the program of last summer and believes that even more can be accomplished this year.

George Koonce, who has been selected to head up the program, is now in Marshall attending a Water Safety Instructors course offered by the American Red Cross.

The second half of Mr. Jones' program was a report by Supt. W. R. Bradford on the work he is doing in connection with the Gilmer-Aikin committee for canvassing the needs of education in Texas.

As an introduction to his report, Mr. Bradford gave figures taken from the Iowa Park school system. First he said that the school system here handles \$90,000. The sources of this money are \$16,000 from local taxes, \$15,000 income of the school cafeteria and the remainder from state and federal funds.

He passed out opinionnaires to members of the Lions club on which they recorded their reactions to a set of questions concerning the type of persons who should be encouraged to enter the teaching profession, and also their opinion as to the scale of pay which teachers should receive.

In connection with his report on school transportation problems, Mr. Bradford said that all school children in Wichita county who live 2 1/2 miles from school now have access to school buses.

## LARGE CROWD HAS PART IN UNITED MEMORIAL RITES

The united Memorial Program held on the lawn of the Iowa Park Methodist church last Sunday evening drew a record breaking congregation of worshippers. Amvets, the Amvets Auxiliary and the churches of Iowa Park, in solemn and reverent tribute to departed veterans of all wars, voiced their appreciation of the sacrifice of these heroes.

Presentation of the flag was made by Clayton R. Baldwin, navy, and E. E. Buck Voyles, army, flag bearers; Vernon Loveall, navy, W. L. Entriken, army, color guards.

After Taps was sounded by Rollins Woodall, came Presentation of Flowers by Mrs. Betty Baldwin and Mrs. Vernon Loveall. The two ladies were dressed in white and wore Amvets Auxiliary caps. They presented sprays of white gladiolus for the graves of all deceased veterans of all wars.

The hymn "We Cannot Think of Them as Dead" was followed by a prayer by Rev. W. C. Hill, pastor of the local church of God. ## INTEREST GROWING IN ARTIFICIAL BREEDING WORK

Information received this week from J. L. Iwig, field worker in the county artificial breeding program, should be of great interest to farmers and business men of Iowa Park, since our community is ideally fitted for dairy farming.

Mr. Iwig says:

The Wichita County Co-operative Artificial Breeding Association has now been in operation for two weeks. During this time 37 cows have been bred. In Wichita county there are 672 cows now signed up with the Association. In the state of Texas, 28,773 cows are included in the program in 24 counties. This is in addition to Wichita county.

Artificial insemination service offers these opportunities:

You may improve the producing ability of your dairy herd by using the superior sires to which you have access through the Association. In New Jersey the first 120 artificial daughters produced 42.2 lbs. of butterfat more than their dams. The daughters produced 442.1 pounds of butterfat. This is a means of avoiding crossbreeding if you have more than one breed in your herd.

The semen for this Association is received from the North Texas Artificial Breeding Farm, 6 miles south of Dallas on Highway 75. Visitors are welcome at this farm at any time. At this farm are 4 and 5 star Jersey bulls with classified daughters ranging from 428 lbs. fat to 617.73 lbs. fat. One of their Holstein bulls in Carnation Madcap Design. His seven nearest dams average 1129.80 lbs. fat and 30,017.30 lbs. of milk in 365 days.

The Wichita County Association welcomes new members at all times. Further information may be had at any time by calling Vernon Loveall's Station 2821, Iowa Park, which is the technician's headquarters for this area.

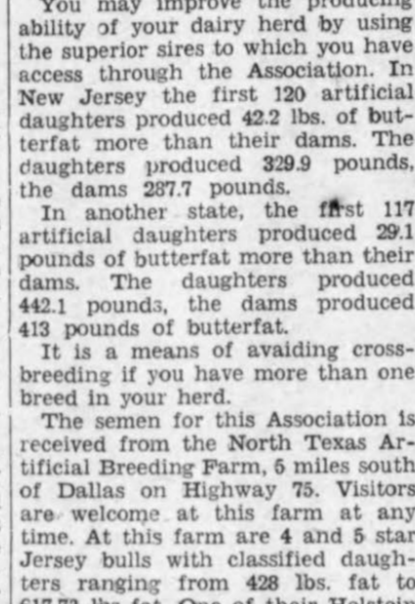

Justice must be just, competent and free from improper influence. He must be like an umpire of a ball game — call the strikes fairly and without being intimidated by the gallery or captivated by wealth and social standing.

As many of you know already, I have served Wichita County in the last two World Wars. I left with a group of young Wichita Falls men back in 1917 for the First World War. When World War II came around as it suddenly did at Pearl Harbor on that fateful December morning, I again volunteered for service to my country, and though I was then 48 years of age, and though I was beyond the draft, a married man with a wife and three young daughters, I was given a commission in a combat Military Police Battalion, and in sixty-eight days found myself in the Asiatic-Pacific theatre protecting the fortifications and defenses of three vital defense islands of our western coast. After serving one year in this capacity, I was returned to the U.S. for training additional troops. I was then transferred to the Military Government Division and had service in the European Theatre of Operations with the Sixth, Seventh and General Patton's Third Army. I was Military Government Prosecutor in Munich, Germany. This city was the birthplace of Nazism and here I received a severe gunshot wound, but I remained in the service to the end of the war.

After the close of the War, I again accepted duty with the Army of Occupation and returned to Berlin for a period of 14 months. I directed the work of re-organizing the courts of Germany, the selection of judges in the U.S. Zone, and helped re-write the German Law Code for the courts in the U.S. Zone which the British and French Zones later adopted. I was specially commended by General Parkham and General Clay for this work. I have reported to the people of this country through the columns of the Wichita Daily Times some of my experiences and pictured the problems that are facing us through Russian communistic expansions. This danger is apparent to all and I have untiringly pointed out this menace to our national safety, and it must be defied at home as well as abroad.

Wichita County has been my home for 32 years, and naturally when the job was done at the close of the War, I would return to my home here, where scores of friends have asked that I seek the office of district judge and carry on the task of exalting our country in times of peace.

I have served you faithfully and well through four long years on foreign soil; every foot of Texas soil is dearer to me than ever before — a similar feeling swells in the heart of every Texan who has set foot on enemy territory. I am coming therefore to you, the people of this county, asking for your help in my campaign for the import office of District Judge. My time is short, there are over 24,000 voters in this county, and I will deeply appreciate the honor of serving you for the next four years on the home front where ties have been broken by the past four years of war.

Will you kindly take this announcement as a personal appeal to you for your vote on July 24th?

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## Chamber Plans Party and Vote on Constitution

Another step has been taken to make Iowa Park the center of the Hereford cattle industry. Last Tuesday night the Chamber of Commerce board of directors heard a report from M. L. Smith, chairman of the committee, and voted to back an annual Hereford show and sale.

Mr. Smith reported that his had approached some of the leading Hereford cattle men in this area with the proposal and found them willing to take part. Under the plan as now conceived, expenses of the show and sale will be borne by those stockmen who entered cattle for exhibition and for sale.

George D. Keith, prominent in Hereford cattle circles has suggested that the event be a one-day sale, using one day to make ready, a day for the sale, and a third day for removing the stock from the show grounds.

He pointed out that the success of the entire venture depends upon getting the stock in tip-top shape for showing. The quality of the exhibits can make or break the reputation of the show.

Many details are yet to be worked out and the board of directors of the Iowa Park Chamber voted to continue Mr. Smith's committee for that purpose.

Another important piece of business was the decision to call a special meeting of the membership for July 6. Purpose of the meeting is to give consideration to a constitution and by-laws. A draft of the proposed new articles was read by W. R. Pastusek in the absence of Dr. Gordon Clark, chairman of the committee.

As an added incentive to attendance at the July 6 meeting, it was decided to have refreshments and entertainment. A committee composed of O. R. Kelly, W. R. Pastusek and M. L. Hines, was appointed by Pres. J. C. Horn to plan the meeting and provide refreshments and the program.

An important feature of the new constitution is the proposal to have two types of membership, commercial and civic. Commercial memberships will be taken by business firms and professional men in the quantity indicated by the size of their businesses. Civic memberships will be open to all persons interested in furthering the causes of the Iowa Park Chamber of Commerce. They will carry voting privileges in proportion to the amount paid in as dues.

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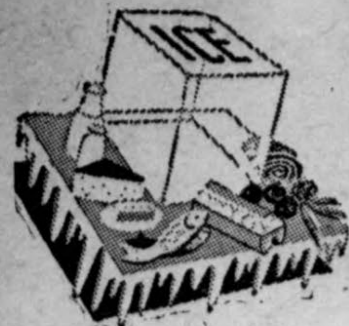

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### Soil Conservation

Applications for the assistance of the Willbarger-Wichita Soil Conservation District were received this week from W. C. Probst on 246 acres, Fenton Dale on 210 acres, Jimmy Parker on 130 acres, Clyde E. Robertson on 360 acres, J. W. Hill and Coyle L. Francis on 1,000 acres.

The 50 acres of hairy vetch that Oscar Klinkerman has planted on the Hirschi farm is looking good at this time. He plans to harvest most of the acreage for seed. Other district co-operators who plan to harvest seed are John Storey, W. T. Riley, Norb Zimmerman, Henry Vaughn and E. O. Mullins. Vetch growers should receive an excellent price for seed this year, since the early spring dry weather has seriously damaged the seed producing area of Central Texas.

The regular monthly meeting of the District Supervisors will be held in Electra, June 3. At that time, business pertaining to the soil conservation district, applications and agreements will be discussed and passed on.

Ross D. Schleich has cut 108 bales of alfalfa hay per acre the first two cuttings this year. It will soon be ready to cut again. The alfalfa is planted on upland, but is irrigated by a high water table. He expects to get 5 or 6 cuttings this year and plans to plant more acreage this fall. Since his soil analysis shows a 300 lb. deficiency of 20 per cent phosphorous per acre, he intends to apply this amount by the time of seeding this fall.

Irrigation topography maps were made this week on the irrigation land of the State Hospital and of Kindel Paulk.

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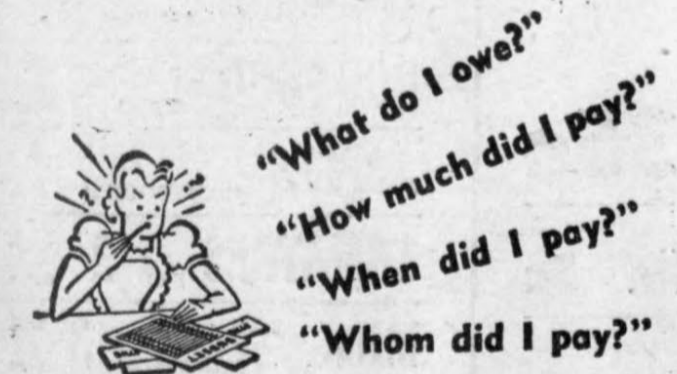
