You are hereby commanded to appear before the Honorable 30th District Court of Wichita County at the Court House thereof, in Wichita Falls, Texas at or before 10 o'clock a.m. of the first Monday next after the expiration of forty-two days from the date of the issuance of this citation, same being the 15th day of September A.D. 1952, then and there to answer Plaintiff's Petition filed in said Court, on the 29th day of July A.D. 1952, in this cause, numbered 50747-A on the docket of said court and styled Jose Moore, Plaintiff, vs. Sidney J. Moore, Defendant.

A brief statement of the nature of this suit is as follows, to-wit:

After alleging jurisdiction, plaintiff further alleges that she and defendant were married on or about December 17, 1926 and continued to live together as husband and wife until on or about September 20, 1950, when by reason of cruel, harsh and tyrannical treatment on the part of the defendant toward this plaintiff without cause or provocation, was of such a nature as to render their further living together insupportable; that there were children born of this marriage, only one who is now under 16 years of age, a girl 8 years of age, and that there is no community property; that plaintiff is a proper and suitable person to have care, control and custody of said child.

Wherefore, plaintiff prays that defendant be cited to appear and answer herein, and that upon trial hereof, she have judgment for divorce, and for such other and further relief, in law or in equity, to which she may show herself justly entitled.

If this citation is not served within ninety days after the date of issuance, it shall be returned unserved.

The Officer executing this process shall promptly execute the same according to law and make due return as the law directs.

Three Park Boys Win Prizes in Hog Raising Contests

Jerry Robertson, son of Mr. and Mrs. Clyde Robertson won first prize of \$25 in the district heavy litter contest sponsored by the Sears Foundation, Jay Bryan, assistant county agent, revealed this week.

Jerry is 11 years old and is in the fourth grade. He has been in 4-H work about 1 1/2 years. Sears gave Jerry the sow June, 1951, and she bore 10 pigs last March 29. Jerry has raised all 10 of them. He has fed 14 per cent prepared pig pellets and crushed corn.

He gave back to Sears one sow pig and sold them one. He has sold three others and plans to keep the remainder until after the Texas-Oklahoma Fair, and then sell them. He has paid for the feed from the sale of pigs.

Jerry says he wants to be a rancher when he grows up and that James and Jerry Whitaker, two other 4-H boys, got him interested in 4-H work. He is interested in chickens and gardening and has taken prizes in poultry shows.

This is not the first time Jerry has won on this sow. He got \$7 for second place at Electra last spring. He is planning to enter her in the show at the T-O Fair in September.

Second place of \$20 was won by another Iowa Park boy, James, son of Mr. and Mrs. James Whitaker.

He is 11 years old and in the fifth grade. He received his sow from Sears in March 1951. One of her nine pigs born in May died. He gave one back to Sears and traded three for the rent on the field. He will have four for sale after the Fair. He feeds corn, milk, bread and slop.

Jerry has been interested in 4-H work about 4 years. When he grows up he wants to be an assistant county agent. He is also interested in chickens has taken some prizes with his birds.

His sow won \$7 for third place at Electra last spring.

Those two boys are neighbors on the Kamay road. They were interviewed Wednesday morning on station KTRN along with county agent Joe Lehman and Mr. Bryan.

Jerry's litter weighed 346 lbs. and James's weighed 296.

Son of Mr. and Mrs. John E. Wesley of Valley Farms, won first prize of \$12 in the area boar contest.

John is 14 years old, a freshman. He has been in 4-H work about three years. His hog is the father of the prize winning litters of Jerry and James. He also placed in the T-O Fair last year.

Young Wesley is interested in general farming.

Old Age Assistance Checks to Be Larger

All persons receiving Old Age Assistance and Aid to the Blind will get a \$5 increase beginning in October, according to Mary S. Schneider, area supervisor for the state department of public welfare. Exceptions will be those who are receiving both Old Age Assistance and Old Age and Survivors Insurance, since the increase will be received by them through Social Security. A lesser increase will be available for youngsters who are receiving Aid to Dependent Children.

These increases are to be automatically taken care of in Austin and it will not be necessary to get in touch with the local or Austin office of the state welfare department, Supervisor Schneider says.

PMA Elections Are Slated for August 22 In Wichita County

Production Marketing Administration community committee elections will be held Aug. 22 from 8:00 a.m. to 5:00 p.m. in the Iowa Park PMA office, Bob Crocker, secretary, announced this week.

Balloting from the five communities may be done by mail, but ballots must be returned by Aug. 22. Mailing of absentee ballots was completed Tuesday.

Delegates elected will participate in the county convention on Aug. 28 at 2:00 p.m. in Iowa Park to elect the county committee. Crocker termed the elections "probably the most important we have ever had."

Committees will assume their duties Sept. 1 to get the 1953 conservation program planned at an early date. Before Jan. 1 community committees will contact farmers in their districts and get each man's plan for carrying out next year's practices.

A farmer who has not filed by Jan. 1 will not be able to participate in the 1953 agricultural conservation program. In most cases this will mean that each committee member will have to visit at least 50 farms to carry out his duties.

Crocker explained the nature of the committee visits to include: 1. Planning the 1953 program so that it will accomplish through needed soil and water conservation practices the greatest possible contribution toward increasing and sustaining the production needed now and for the future.

2. Operating the 1953 program so it will achieve the maximum conservation benefits on the land with the financial and technical assistance available.

prices paid to farmers at the market place will be around the 100 per cent parity price. We feel justified in advocating 90 per cent support price as it is unselfish in that it does not advocate that government protect the farmer beyond a 100 per cent parity price.

Support prices of 100 per cent of parity as some members of Congress were advocating in the last session would mean that government was guaranteeing the farmer a 100 per cent of parity income.

In order that agricultural products could move in the channels of trade the market price would have to be above the 100 per cent level which would mean more than a 150 per cent of parity to the farmer. 100 per cent of parity to the farmer would be entitled to a guaranteed 100 per cent of parity income by the government.

Members of the American Farm Bureau which consists of 1,452,210

farm families in 47 states, have consistently spoken for the interest of the farmer without making selfish and unjustified demands upon the economy of our country. We have consistently believed that industry, labor and agriculture should have a parity income in order to have a well balanced economy which will afford an opportunity to earn a livelihood in any group.

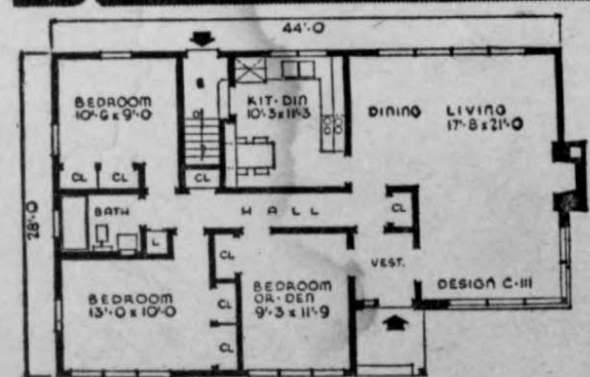

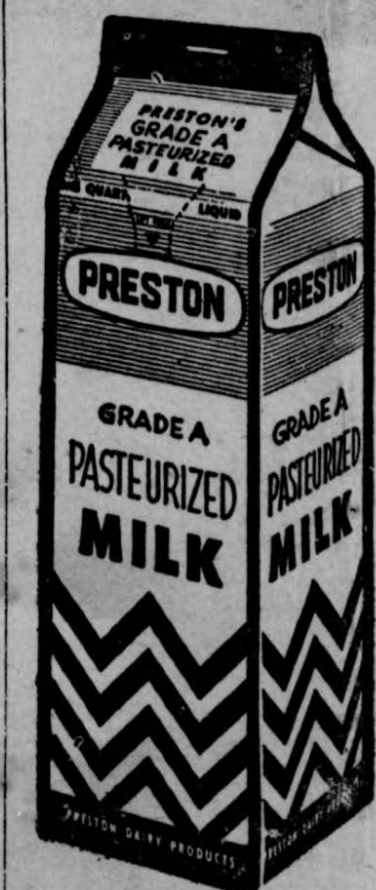

Farm Bureau policies regarding prices of all agricultural products are 100 per cent of parity price in the market place, instead of 100 per cent support prices. The prices a farmer receives at the market place are the most vital to his success. Farmers have indicated through their Farm Bureau organization that they prefer a free market for their products rather than a subsidized market regulated by government.

Support prices of 75 to 90 per cent of parity was recommended by the Farm Bureau and written into the Agriculture Adjustment Act of 1949. This range in support price does not mean the support price will be 75 per cent of parity for agricultural commodities, but to the contrary. The act of 1949 states that the support price shall be 90 per cent of parity until the supply reaches 110 per cent above demand, then the support price will slide back 1 per cent for every 2 per cent gain in supply above 110, with provision that the Secretary of Agriculture shall have the authority to declare acreage allotments and call for a referendum on marketing quotas when the supply reaches 110 per cent of demand. This means that with controlled acreage and marketing quotas the support price could not possibly in any event fall below the 90 per cent support level.

When farm prices are supported or 90 per cent of parity that means in order to move agricultural products in the channels of trade the market prices must be above the 90 per cent parity level. This means
