

Upon receiving the petition, the judge set March 25 at 1:30 as the time for a hearing before the county commissioners' court. At the hearing all interested persons are invited to appear and show reason why they are for or against the formation of the water district and should or should not be included in the new taxing structure.

Out of the hearing, it is expected that the names of five directors will be submitted to the voters of Iowa Park for their approval, along with their sanction of the creation of the water setup.

Following this election, Iowa Park is then faced with a bond election and then, of course, the building of the dam and all facilities contemplated to give us an unlimited supply of soft, potable water.


