Hawks Ready to Entertain Electra Tigers

Iowa Park Hawks will play the Electra Tigers here Friday night to kick the lid off the 1956 season. New bleachers have been constructed for visiting fans on the south side of the field. They have been placed on a concrete foundation.

Reflections from the Bible

There is absolutely no substitute for hours and hours of study of the word of God, for this study alone will provide a man with the knowledge that must go with zeal. Consider the words of Paul who wrote to Timothy saying, "Study to shew thyself approved unto God, a workman that needeth not to be ashamed, rightly dividing the word of truth." So essential was knowledge to zeal that Paul said to the same young man, "Till I come give attention to reading, exhortation, to doctrine. Take heed to thyself and unto the doctrine; continue in them, for in doing this thou shalt save thyself and them that hear thee." The converse of this statement is that if a man does not take heed to himself and his doctrine he will neither save himself nor those who hear him, regardless of how great his zeal may be.

It does make a difference what we believe. One thing is not just as good as another in religion. Error was never as good as truth, and zeal can never make up the difference between truth and error.

It is easy to stir up religious zeal. Any rabble-rouser with strong lungs, can create a frenzied zeal in his audience, but that is productive of harm rather than good if it is not circumscribed by a knowledge of God's word. Do you have that knowledge?

Planner Sees Window Need

New windows are needed in one out of every two homes being remodeled, according to A. B. Campen, a Peoria, Ill., designer who specializes in home modernization planning.

His reasons are: 1. More light. "Dark rooms are characteristic of out-dated houses," says the designer. "A good goal is to have 20 percent as much window area in a room as floor area."

2. Style. If exterior remodeling is intended to give an old home contemporary lines, old-fashioned windows should be replaced with windows more in keeping with modern architecture. Building materials dealers carry a wide variety of ponderosa pine windows in up-to-date styles—fixed-sash picture windows, sliding windows, casement, awning, and hopper windows. Even the familiar double-hung sash now has contemporary, horizontal panes. Wood windows are easy to paint, lending themselves to the general emphasis on color in modern home styling.

3. New room construction. A new wing, dormer or enclosed porch is likely to stick out like a sore thumb unless the sash and frames match those of the rest of the house. This can be accomplished by standard wood window units.

Poultrymen Need Cool Egg Storage

Poultry farmers who want consistently to bring top quality eggs to market need air-conditioned egg storage rooms, according to Clemson Agriculture College, Clemson, S.C.

A farmer with a 3,000-chicken flock, the report suggests, should have a 6-foot-square storage room with a one-third horsepower refrigeration plant.

Outside walls, floor and ceiling should be thickly insulated with mineral wool batts, blankets or blown mineral wool.

A light-color roof is another insulating measure since it will reflect some of the sun's rays. Mineral-surfaced asphalt roll roofing comes in a number of light colors, ideal for this purpose.

Mrs Jack Holmes is installing a new boiler at her laundry and now will have lots of hot water and be all ready for her customers' laundry.

HOME OWNERS' QUESTION BOX

Q—I'm planning to pour concrete steps. What's an easy way to be sure the concrete cures properly?

A—For full strength, concrete poured should be kept damp as it hardens. One way to do this is to cover the concrete with burlap after it has set for a day, then keep the burlap damp with a garden hose. Concrete never should be poured when the temperature is below freezing.

Q—What should be done to a furnace during the summer to get it ready for the next heating season?

A—Here's a check list recommended by a heating and air conditioning manufacturer, the Coleman Company: Clean or replace the air filter (replacement is better), vacuum-clean the burner if gas is the fuel you use, and oil the fan bearing assemblies and the fan motor according to the manufacturer's instructions. In addition, call in a service man to make a routine check. Inspection and regulation of the controls and the burner are part of the job he'll do.

Q—I want to build on a pier foundation. How far apart should the piers be?

A—Piers should be about six to eight feet apart around the

perimeter of the building. If they are placed much farther apart, the floor will not have proper support and may have an objectionable amount of bounce.

Q—Is there a simple tool for cutting holes in rock or masonry?

A—A star drill will do the job. It is held in one hand and tapped with a hammer. The drill is revolved slightly after each tap.

Q—Can I solder two pieces of aluminum together?

A—Use special aluminum solder. Roughen both pieces of metal with emery cloth or a wire brush.

Q—The walls of my house are brick veneer. I'd like to insulate the walls, but is there any way to get the insulation behind the brick?

A—A few individual bricks would be removed and holes drilled in the sheathing to permit insertion of a hose to blow mineral wool into the walls. When the blowing is finished the hole is sealed and the bricks are carefully replaced. There are similar techniques for insulating walls of all types, including stone veneer, clapboard and shingle. There's a way to insulate any hollow wall with mineral wool.

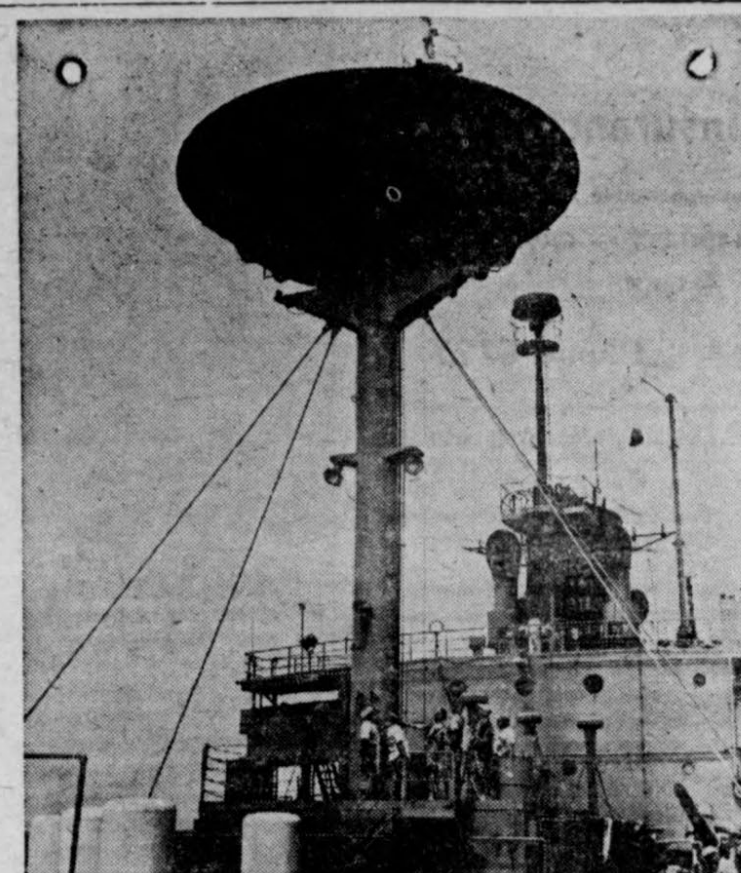

Haws Advises Farmers to Halt Water Run-off

It is the rain you keep that counts, says E. T. Haws, Wichita county agent.

It will take a lot of good soaking rain to break through the present drouth, but if history repeats itself, Haws adds, heavy downpours usually follow long dry periods. Unless provision has been made to hold such rainfall, too much will be lost.

He offers several suggestions for holding a maximum amount of the heavy rains should they occur this fall. Don't go out and buy expensive equipment, just use what is available on the farm or ranch. Net wire spreaders do an effective job of slowing down runoff water. They stop drift and hold water, even on slopes. Too, says Haws, they are cheaper to build than dirt spreaders and there is no dam to be washed out or blown away.

Trees and brush thrown into the heads of gullies will greatly aid in slowing down and spreading runoff water. Brush piles placed in gullies at intervals will tame running water and also catch soil and cause more of the runoff to be soaked into the ground. Fallen brush scattered over the pasture holds water and helps grass seedlings get started by giving them protection.

A range dotted with wire spreaders, pits and piles of fallen trees and brush holds many times more water than a range which is bare of vegetation or man-made constructions. Bare areas should be pit-pitted, for little water will be absorbed if measures are not taken to break the surface crust which will shed water, especially if the rain comes as a downpour.

Many good soakings will be required to get drouth ravaged soil back in good shape, and because most ranges and pastures are now bare, any device, construction or practice which can be put on the land to hold water will help the comeback, says Haws. Most of these jobs can be done piecemeal and with available equipment and labor. They will not cost much

Modern Heating Units Save Floor Space in Small Home

One of the problems in building or modernizing a small basement house is that there often doesn't seem to be any place to put the furnace without sacrificing expensive floor space that's badly needed for family living.

The problem can be solved with modern equipment, however. These three ways of doing it are suggested by Sheldon Coleman, a heating equipment manufacturer:

1. Use a specially designed, space-saving type of furnace so trim and compact it will fit in a small closet.
2. Install a horizontal furnace in a crawl space.
3. Install a horizontal furnace in an attic.

Some models of the first type measure as little as 14 inches wide and 28 inches deep. The closet need be little larger, for this is a "zero clearance" unit approved for installation with its sides and back touching closet walls. In remodeling work, if a suitable closet doesn't exist, one can usually be made by boxing off a corner of a room.

The Coleman Company president says the horizontal furnace in a crawl space of a shallow attic doesn't take up any living area at all. Instead of standing upright, it lies on its side. The ducts that carry warm air to the rooms can fan out through the crawl space to terminate in outlets in the floor, walls, or baseboard, or through the attic to outlets in the ceiling.

How-To-Do-It

Trim Insulation Slightly Oversize

Proper installation of mineral wool batts and blankets is important to attain the highest insulating value of the material.

Batts or blankets should be trimmed slightly greater than the exact size of the space to



be insulated so that the space will be tightly filled.

To do this, lay the insulation on a flat surface with the vapor barrier down and cut it with a sharp knife. Leave enough of the vapor barrier to make a flange. Wedge the batt or blanket into place and staple the flange to the stud or rafter.
