Hawks Tie Bulldogs with Last Minute Pass

Although the backfield got credit for the 13 points made by Iowa Park in last Friday night's game with Burk, the entire team must be praised for the fact that Burk's Bulldogs were held to the same total score.

The visitors piled up 237 yards running with the ball and only 19 through aerial plays. But most of their yardage was made out in the field of play where points are not awarded.

One running play did count, a 56 yard scamper by Doyce Walker. And one of their three passes was a scoring play from the Hawk 15.

The Hawks countered these scoring plays with two of their own. They jumped into a 7-0 lead early in the second quarter when Harvey Klinkerman went across from the 1 yard line to consummate a 67 yard sustained drive. A 16 yard keeper play and a 15-yard pass to Norman Marquart sparked the long march to paydirt. Jimmie Harris carried across for the PAT. With seconds left in the half, Walker made his long run after a key block was thrown by Donald McKinnis. Joe Baker kicked the tying point.

Burk's successful pass came late in the third period. Recovering a Hawk fumble only 24 yards from paydirt, the Bulldogs fought their way to the 15; then came the scoring pass from McKinnis to Jerry Boren. Donald Daugherty and Randall Pierce blocked the extra point try.

With less than four minutes remaining, the Hawks were forced to punt and all seemed lost. Only a fumble could give Iowa Park possession for an attempt to tie or go ahead. And the fumble occurred!

Four passes failed, but Burk was offside, so the Hawks got another life. The play that tied this thrilling contest was then reeled off as if the whole team had rehearsed for it. The line gave Klinkerman protection and time to find an eligible receiver with a chance to catch his throw. The boys rushed

T-O Fair Parade

Twenty-eighth annual Texas-Oklahoma Fair and Southwest Oil Exposition will open Monday, Sept. 24 at 9:00 a.m. A parade will be held at 6:00 p.m.

Alan Berry and John Mixon are serving again this year as co-chairmen of the parade committee. They are ably assisted by A. W. Bedford, J. W. Thomas, Jimmy Stewart, Arch Hughes, R. E. Van Horn, Henry Jones, W. A. George and T. C. Berry.

The parade will start forming at 5:00 in front of the high school, and start promptly at 6:00 through downtown Iowa Park, to the Fair Grounds.

Fair officials especially invite all southwestern Oklahoma and northwestern Texas to take part in all activities of the Fair.

Rhea Howard, president of the Wichita Falls Times and Record News, of Wichita Falls, will lead the parade in his 1907 Cadillac.

Others taking part will be the Sheppard AFB band, its drum and bugle corps and its precision drill team; the Iowa Park band; various riding clubs; and decorated bicycles of the local youth.

Tuesday is always set aside as Pioneer Day. Registration starts at 3:00 a.m. Crowning of the Pioneer Queen will be followed by a Chuck Wagon feed at noon.

There will be plenty of free entertainment each evening in the Fair Auditorium.

Each department committee has been working hard to give to the people the best Fair yet.

The 1956 Fair is dedicated to the Wichita Falls newspapers, now in their fiftieth year of continuous publication.

Iowa Park is fortunate to have so many thriving businesses in her midst. Among them is the Elliott Turkey Farm, just outside the city limits on the Wichita Falls highway.

Mr. and Mrs. F. E. Elliott are owners and operators of this interesting farm. They specialize in bronze broad-breasted turkeys, securing their stock when they are one day old.

At present the Elliott farm has 2000 broiler size turkeys.

Their turkey parlor is a building 110 feet by 28 feet, with automatic heating and cooling system and automatic watering fountains. When the turkeys are 8 weeks old they are turned outside the building to graze.

The Elliotts have lived here 18 months, moving from Wichita Falls where he had resided all his life. His mother Mrs. W. F. Elliott, 97, still lives in Wichita Falls.

Mr. and Mrs. Elliott have one daughter Mrs. James Bosworth, and two grandchildren, all living at Graham.

Junior Hawks Defeat Burk JrHi

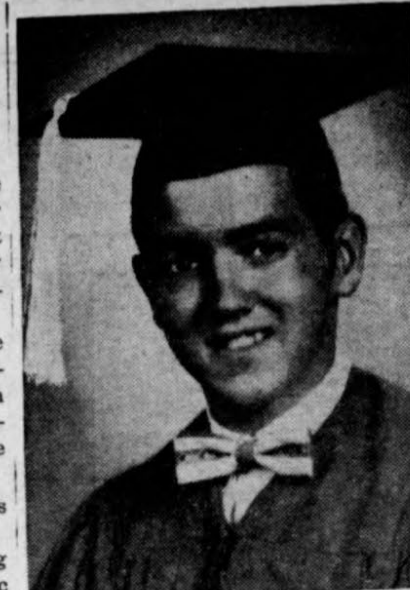
All 51 of the junior high football squad didn't get in the game this Thursday night, but enough played to take the measure of Burk's junior high squad. Final score was 21-0.

IP Grad in Navy Seeing the World

USS Franklin D. Roosevelt Monday, Sept. 3, 1956
Dear Mr. Huckaby,

While I was in Norfolk, Va., I talked to Pat Sewell about home and navy life. We had a wonderful time together. He asked me why I didn't write back home to the Herald and tell you about my trips while in the navy. I had thought about it before but he made up my mind for me.

In the fall of 1954, I went to the Far East on the USS Noble APA 218, which is a troop transport, for a six months cruise. We hit Kobe, Japan, our first day in Japan. We also hit Sasebo, Yokosuka, Japan.

By the time the ship got to the Far East, it was winter time over there. It is certainly a lot colder over there than in the States in the winter. Some of the other ports that we hit were Keelung, Formosa, Inchon, Korea and Hong Chong, China. Of all the ports that we hit while in the Far East, I liked Hong Chong the best. It is one of the most beautiful ports in the world.

I certainly had a wonderful experience while in the Far East. The Noble returned to the States the first part of 1955. All of 1955 and the first part of 1956, I was on the West Coast from San Diego, Calif., to Bremerton, Wash.

The 22nd of Feb. 1956 I was transferred to the USS Franklin D. Roosevelt (CVA 42), which is a carrier. I went aboard April 3 and she was put back in commission April 6 in the naval shipyard in Bremerton. The FDR is the third largest carrier afloat.

We left the West Coast June 20 for a 58 day cruise around the Horn of South America. One of the big attractions in going around the Horn was crossing the equator. The pollywogs were initiated by the shellbacks. I don't believe I'll ever forget crossing the equator.

Some of the ports we hit while on our way to the East Coast were Panama City, Panama; Valparaiso, Chile; and Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. The most beautiful port in South America is Rio. It is also one of the three most beautiful ports in the world. It is just as modern as the States.

We arrived in Mayport, Florida, which is the home port of the FDR on August 8. I like the East Coast a great deal better than the West Coast because I'm back in the southern part of the states.

The ship is now in Guantanamo, Cuba, for a seven weeks shake-down cruise. We return to Florida Oct. 19 for four days, then go to New York for a month. I've wanted to go to New York for years. It looks like I finally made it.

After the holidays, we go to the Gulf of Maine and around the area of Greenland for about 20 days. The latter part of April 1957 we go on an extended cruise to the Mediterranean. I've been looking forward to seeing the Mediterranean for quite some time now. I'll let you know more about that trip when we return.

When the ship gets back from the Mediterranean cruise, I'll have from 6-8 months left to do in the navy. That will be the happiest day of my life. I plan to go to college after I get out of the navy.

I sincerely hope that you have enjoyed my telling of the trips while in the navy.

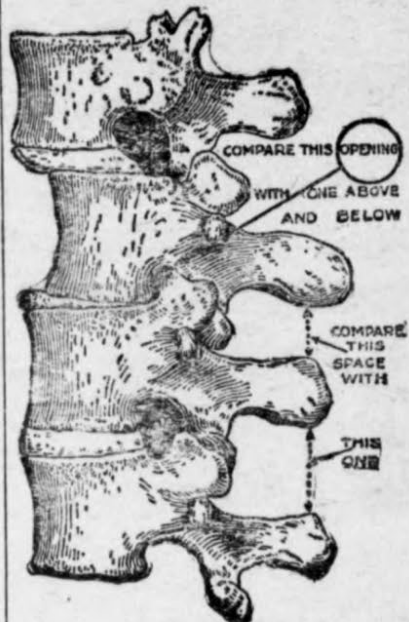

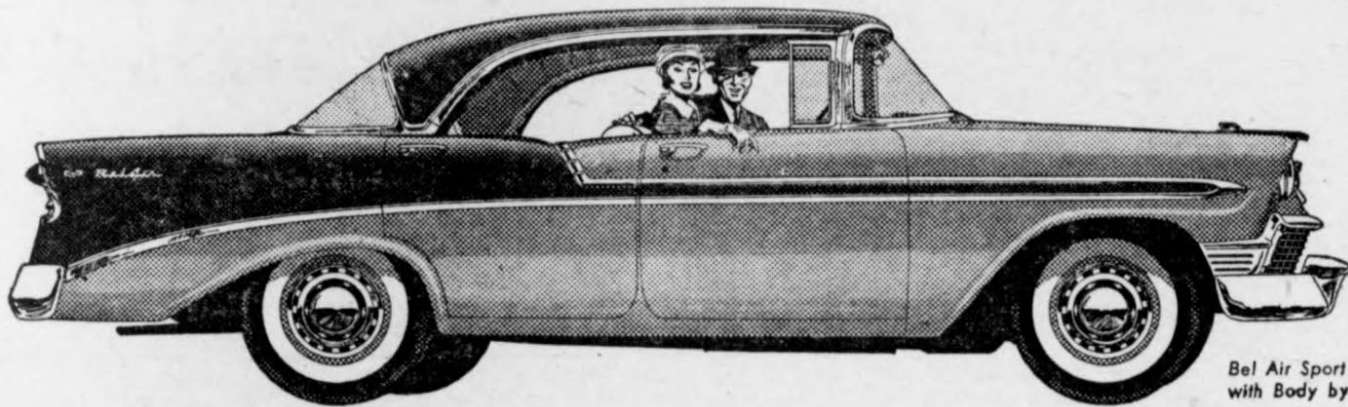

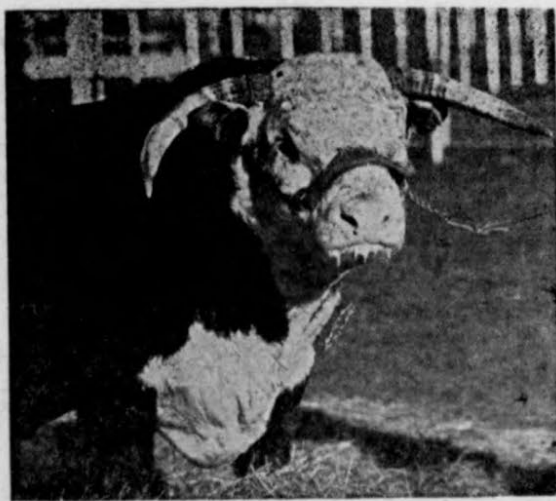

Iowa Park post office has come a long way since the late '80's. Air-conditioning, automatic heating — and ball point pens for customers' use. Just a reminder, the pens bear an inscription "Property of the U.S." and private citizens are not to make off with them!

Anyway, the fabled pen with its dull point and scratchy writing has joined the Gay Nineties antiques, such as brass beds and moustache cups.

There is another long time postal employee in our midst—Mr. Charles Quick, former postmaster of Electra.

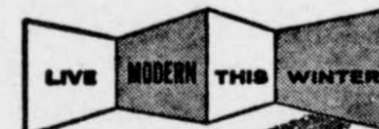

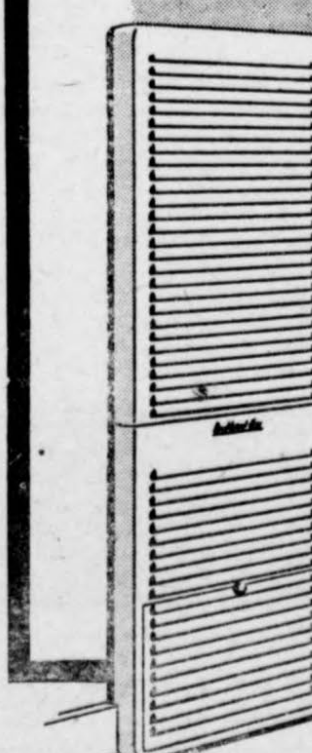

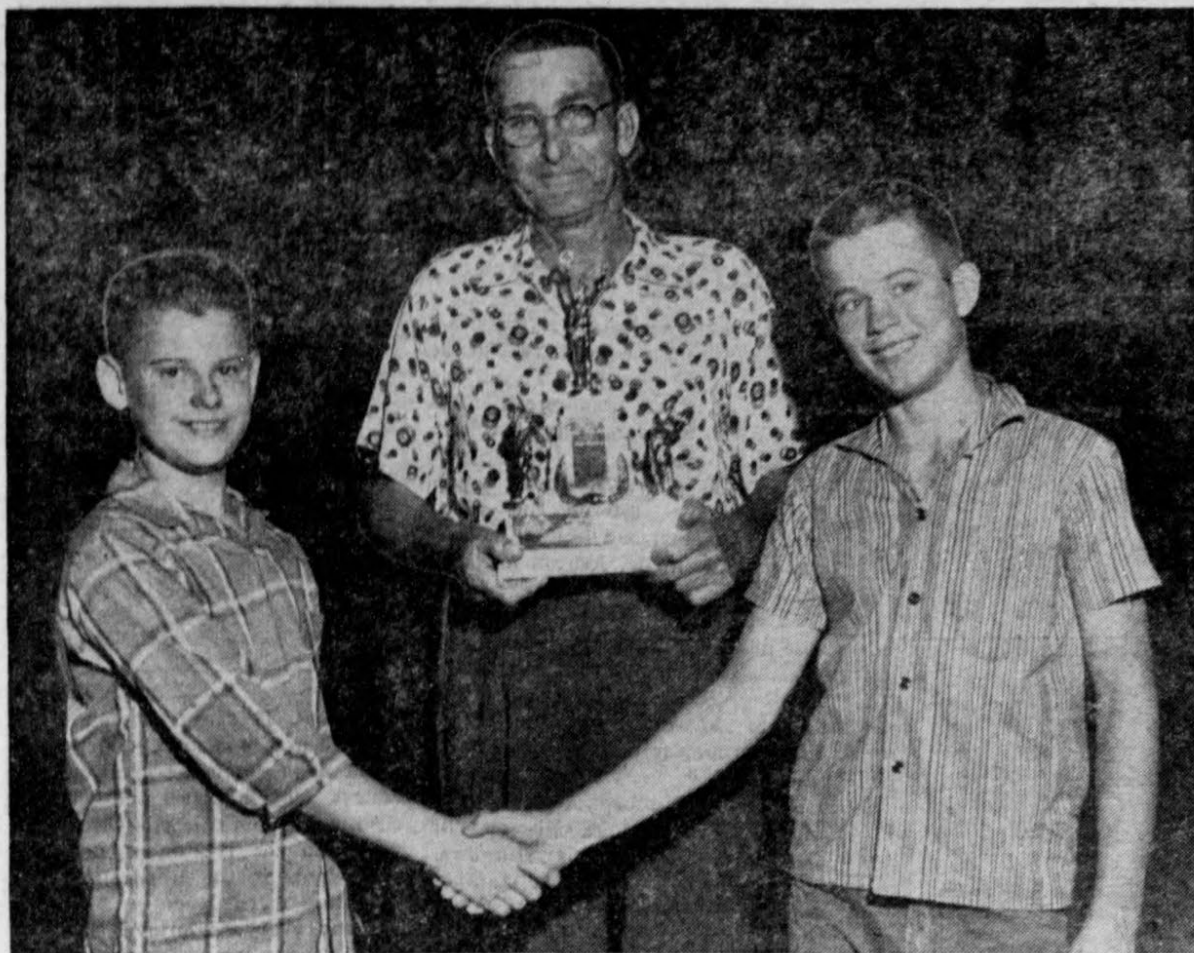
