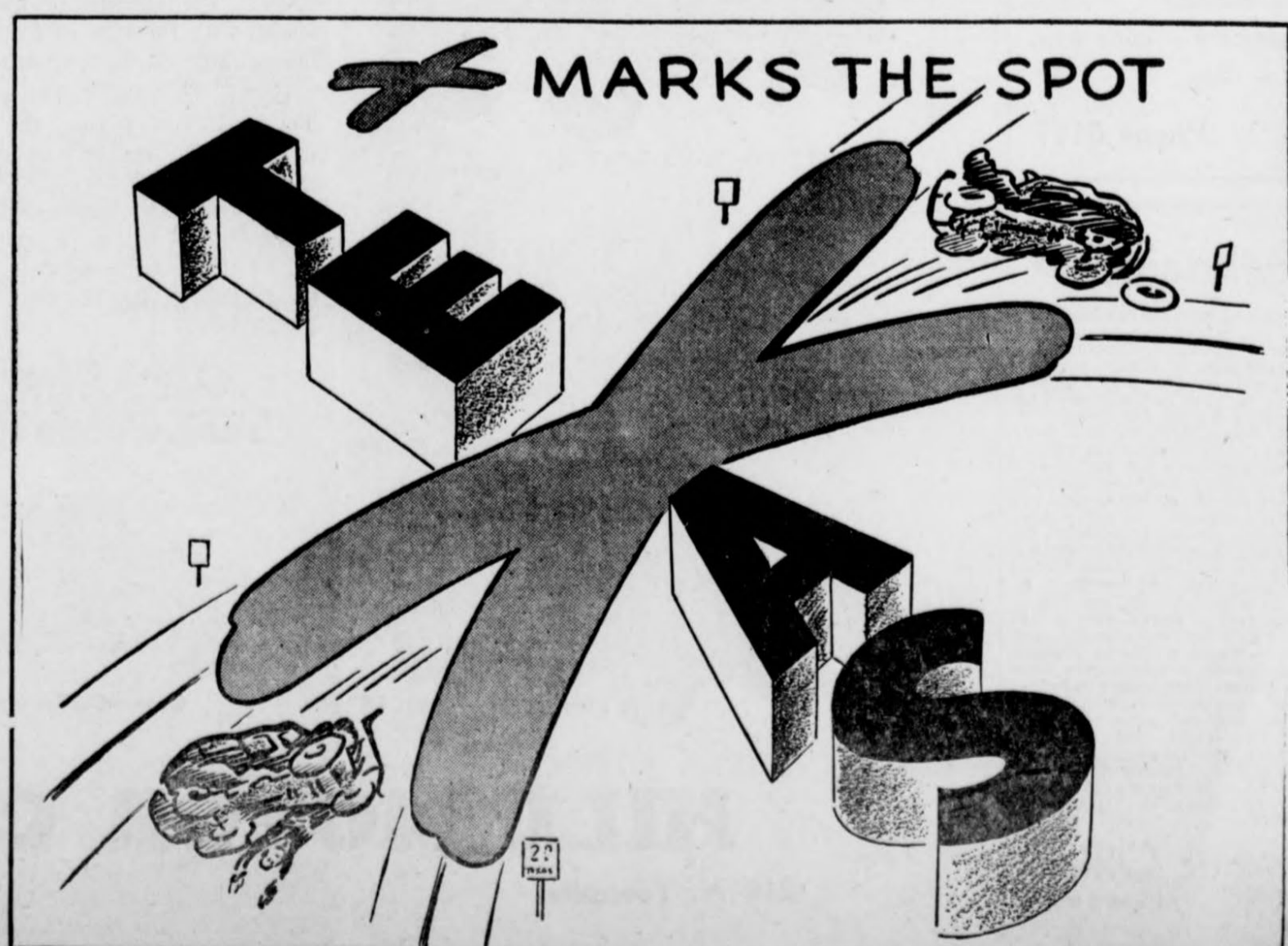
## LIVING HERE BEATS CALIFORNIA'S BEST
