Clothing, Blankets Gathered for Needy Persons of World

Mrs. Harry Weaver, overseas relief chairman of the Iowa Park Council of Church Women is issuing a last minute call for clothing and shoes for the refugees and homeless in our world. The clothing drive is now in full swing in our town and will close United Nations Day, Wednesday, Oct. 24.

The garments will be packed by representatives of the council next Thursday morning at the Christian church.

Urgently needed are good, clean used clothing for men, women and children (both heavy and light weight garments) and shoes.

Cash donations are encouraged since 8c per pound of clothing must be raised for processing and shipping from St. Louis to destinations overseas. Shipments to Korea require 10c a pound.

Bedding is also needed, and the Iowa Park Council of Church Women is sponsoring a used blanket project. People are urged to donate light weight blankets, cotton flannel or light weight wool. The blankets will be dedicated at the World Community Day program, Friday, Nov. 2 at the Church of God.

C. L. Vaughan, director of the Iowa Park school bands, holds a B.A. degree from Northeastern State college at Tahlequah, Okla. His major was music and his minor was social sciences. He has done 14 hours work toward his master's degree at NTSC, Denton.

Before coming to Iowa Park this fall, Mr. Vaughan had taught at Morrilton, Ark., for five years.

His wife, the former Miss Marilyn West of Morrilton, is a senior at Oklahoma Baptist university at Shawnee, where she is a voice major in sacred music.

Vaughn was graduated from Seminole (Okla.) high school and served in the 25th infantry division for three years during World War II. During the Texas-Oklahoma Fair this year the Hawk Band won trophies for first honors in marching, and concert work, and Mr. Vaughan was presented a travel clock for his skill in directing.

Work and Worship Urged by Baptist Round-up Speaker

"Although no man was ever saved by works," said H. K. Killingsworth of Dallas to the men attending the 12th annual 103 Roundup at the Baptist church Monday night, "work is an important part of Christian fellowship."

The speaker brought more light on his subject "The Twin Parts of Christian Fellowship" when he recounted the missionary journeys of Paul, and the importance of doing things for the good of the church.

The twin to "work," according to Killingsworth, is "worship." He unfolded the history of worship as recorded in the Bible and summed it up with a quotation from Revelations: "Worship God."

The 97 men who assembled in the Baptist church sanctuary Monday evening were favored with an organ prelude by Mrs. O. E. Lochridge. This was followed by the singing of "Blessed Be the Tie" under the leadership of C. L. Vaughan. Members of the Brotherhood and visitors were welcomed to the Roundup by their president A. C. Hooten. The invocation was given by A. L. Halbert.

Following the chuck wagon style supper prepared and served by a committee of the Brotherhood, Mr. Vaughan led the men in a song session and L. E. Brooks led in prayer.

Immediately preceding the ceremony of installation of officers, Mr. Brooks explained the fund drive for additional land at the Brotherhood camp at Vernon. He said the need was great for more space so that permanent cottages can be built.

Officers installed for the coming year were A. C. Hooten, president; Wayne Williams, membership vice-president; Deloss Kagy, program vice-president; Malcolm Mills, activities vice-president; and T. E. Gilbreath, secretary-treasurer. Mr. Brooks called upon all the men to support and promote the whole program of the church. 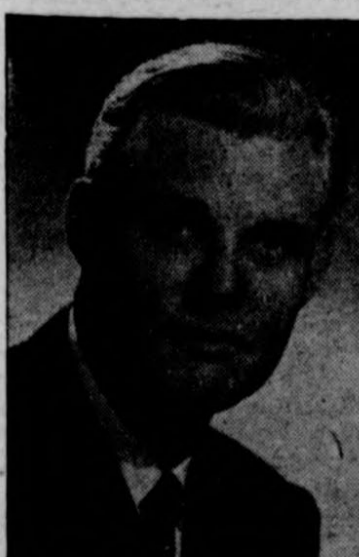

Four Day 'United Nations and Religion Fair' Planned by Christian Church, Begins Sunday

As a continuation of its Fair featured at this time last year, leaders of the Iowa Park Christian church are planning a United Nations and Religion Fair, beginning Sunday, October 21 and continuing through Wednesday, according to Rev. Chester E. Gleason, pastor.

The public is invited to this fair as it is designed to meet the perplexities of church people in these times of crucial world chaos.

What is a churchman to do and believe as a citizen living in a country preparing for defense?

Is Christianity making any headway in Europe against Communism? Does the American church need to be ecumenical minded?

Are Asiatic Christians happy with the Japanese peace treaty? These are the questions to be discussed and answered at the United Nations and Religion Fair beginning Sunday evening. The fair will feature four visiting speakers for each of the evening through Wednesday at 7:30.

Speakers include Chaplain Robert Gentry of SAFF, discussing the subject "U.S.: Christian Citizenship in a Country Faced with War." Mr. Gentry is a Disciple of Christ minister attached to the Wing chaplain's office at Sheppard.

On Monday evening colored slides taken in Paris, Geneva, Rome, Germany, Venice and England will be explained by Rev. Weems Dykes of the Nocona Christian church who

this summer studied church operation in Europe at the places mentioned, as a delegate of a guided study tour sponsored by Texas Christian university.

Tuesday evening Dr. George R. Davis, minister of the First Christian church of Wichita Falls, will discuss the Ten Year Program of Advance of the Disciples of Christ. As a member of the board of managers of the United Christian Missionary society, he brings firsthand information of the long range program the Christian churches are launching this fall.

Climaxing the Fair will be a covered dish supper at the church on Wednesday at 7:30, when United Nations Day will be observed. Japan will be reviewed by Clayton Baldwin, who has just returned from 12 months duty with the navy. Mr. Baldwin was stationed at a Japanese port as an electrician's mate. During his stay he traveled in Japan observing their customs and reactions to American occupation and collecting a large number of pictures depicting scenes of interest.

The Fair also will feature exhibits from many foreign countries, a display of Christian literature and Disciplina.

The prayer room of the church will be open all day Wednesday in keeping with the program in Iowa Park that churches be open for prayer and meditation on that day.

Iowa Park's next four games will be strictly on the record, since they will be the Hawks' bid for championship of district 2A4. This coming Friday, Iowa Park will be host to Burk Burnett in a game that should see lots of hard-fought football. Burk has a better record than the Hawks, but the Coaches and their boys have been working hard and long in an attempt to whip up a winning strategem for this important struggle.

Extra seating capacity has been set up for the game, and a large crowd of rooters for both teams is expected.

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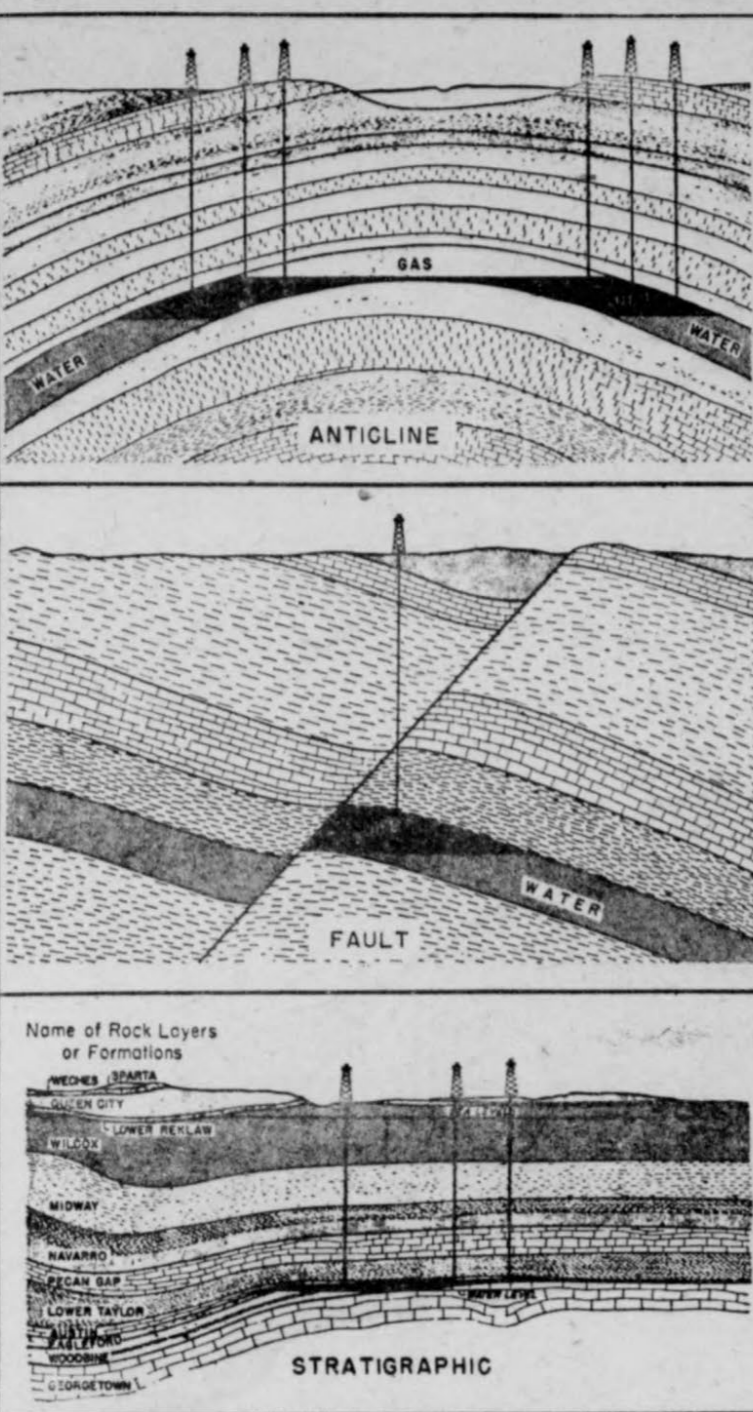
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Types of Traps in which Oil and Gas Accumulate

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OIL PROGRESS The biggest hunt in Texas' history is now taking place. All over the state shooting parties are hunting for traps - traps that are full of oil. But these traps are a mile or two below the ground and the hunters have to shoot the surface. Oil in Texas once was found by accident, or because it seeped to the surface of springs or leaked into water wells. But the days of finding oil by accident are gone. Men now hunt for oil using every branch of science and a program of drilling thousands of wells a year. Texas operators drilled about 16,500 wells last year as part of this search and about 21 per cent of those were wildcat wells in unexplored areas. The financial risk involved in drilling is why the oil business is still so hazardous. A conservative estimate of \$10 a foot is a lot of money to put into a well that may find nothing but salt water after drilling 4,000 feet or so. Texas operators lost an estimated one-quarter billion dollars in 1950 as a result of dry holes, which had a total footage of 22,564,980. But still the search goes on, that your cars, trucks and tractors may have gasoline and lubricants. Sunday School Begun in Shack by Local Couple Has Grown into Modern Church

Sunday, Oct. 21, will be a day long remembered by the Church of God members. On that day their new \$40,000 building will be dedicated.

The white brick edifice is constructed in the shape of a "T" and the cross section rises into a second story which is used for Sunday School classrooms.

The 65x40 foot auditorium has a seating capacity of 300. The lower walls are finished in knotty pine with the upper part and ceiling in celotex white 91. Pews, pulpit, pulpit chairs and altar are white lime finished redwood and the red oak floor is set off by thick green carpeting down the aisles and around the altar. On either side of the front entrance hall are the pastor's study and nursery and rest rooms.

Nine classrooms, a modern kitchen and dining room are in the building process at present.

Rev. G. M. Gilbert stated that visitors are expected from Fort Worth, Graham, Weatherford, Vernon, Electra, Henrietta, Childress, Odessa, Burkburnett, Kamay and Wichita Falls next Sunday to take part in the dedicatory services.

A musical program at the church Saturday evening will inaugurate special activities. At that time special music will be contributed by visiting musicians and each guest minister will deliver a five minute sermonette.

State Superintendent L. H. Aultman of Weatherford will do the preaching at the Sunday church services. Wayne Hill, also of Weatherford, state youth director, whose duty it is to promote Sunday School work, and Mrs. E. E. Alexander of Weatherford, who was first pastor of the local Church of God soon after its organization in 1929, have accepted invitations to be present for the dedication service.

The new structure has been put up rapidly because of the degree of love, faith, sacrifice and work on the part of members, declares Mr. Gilbert. Barrow-Grace Buick company in Wichita Falls donated the lumber in two buildings to the church for use in the building.

Each member of the church donated a week's salary when the building program was launched and with the exception of the brick work all labor has been volunteer.

Completion of the new building has been the greatest desire of each member. Men have worked at their regular jobs and then gone to the church to work several more hours. The women have been of valuable assistance in the work. A neon sign notice from a great distance was donated by Gordon Callahan and Roland Battle.

Mrs. Jack Ralston gave a beautiful redwood pulpit in memory of her late husband, who loved Christians of all faiths.

Perhaps none of the 105 members has a deeper sense of pride and gratitude for the new building than do Mr. and Mrs. V. A. Wilson. It was through their efforts that the church came into existence in Iowa Park in 1929. The Wilsons lived at that time in the southwest part of town.

One day Mrs. Wilson gave some Bible stories she had gotten from the Electra Church of God to some boys playing in her back yard. They became interested and wanted her to read the stories to them. She invited them back that afternoon.

The following Sunday afternoon she told the stories to 7 children, the next week she had 12 and the next 28. Mrs. Wilson saw the need of a larger meeting place, so they converted a two room shack which belonged to the Wilsons into a meeting place.

Soon more than 100 adults and children were attending Sunday School in the small house. Then, Mrs. Alexander was invited to come to the congregation and conduct prayer meetings at night. These services were held outside and the Wilsons recall how they covered an oil barrel with a sheet to serve as pulpit and to hold the lamp.

The partitions were taken out of the 12x24 foot shack and the board were placed on boxes, tubs, etc. for benches. The "shack" which had been converted into a church building was later moved into the northeast section of Iowa Park a block west and north of the present site.

About 12 years ago the building burned and a new one was built. Six years ago it was moved to the present location.

The first members of the church acknowledge with deep gratitude the efforts of Mrs. Alexander. She chose to stay here and pastor the church in the face of hardship and privation.

Other former pastors include the Reverends Campbell, Meadows, Ruben Martin, Oscar Davis, Tom White, Melton, W. C. Hill and Ray T. Hill.

Lester Watson is Sunday School superintendent and W. G. Sheets is his assistant. Melva Sue Brown is church pianist. V. A. Wilson is choir leader. Mrs. Roy Stegall is president of the Women's Missionary Society and Miss Grace Churchman is young people's leader.

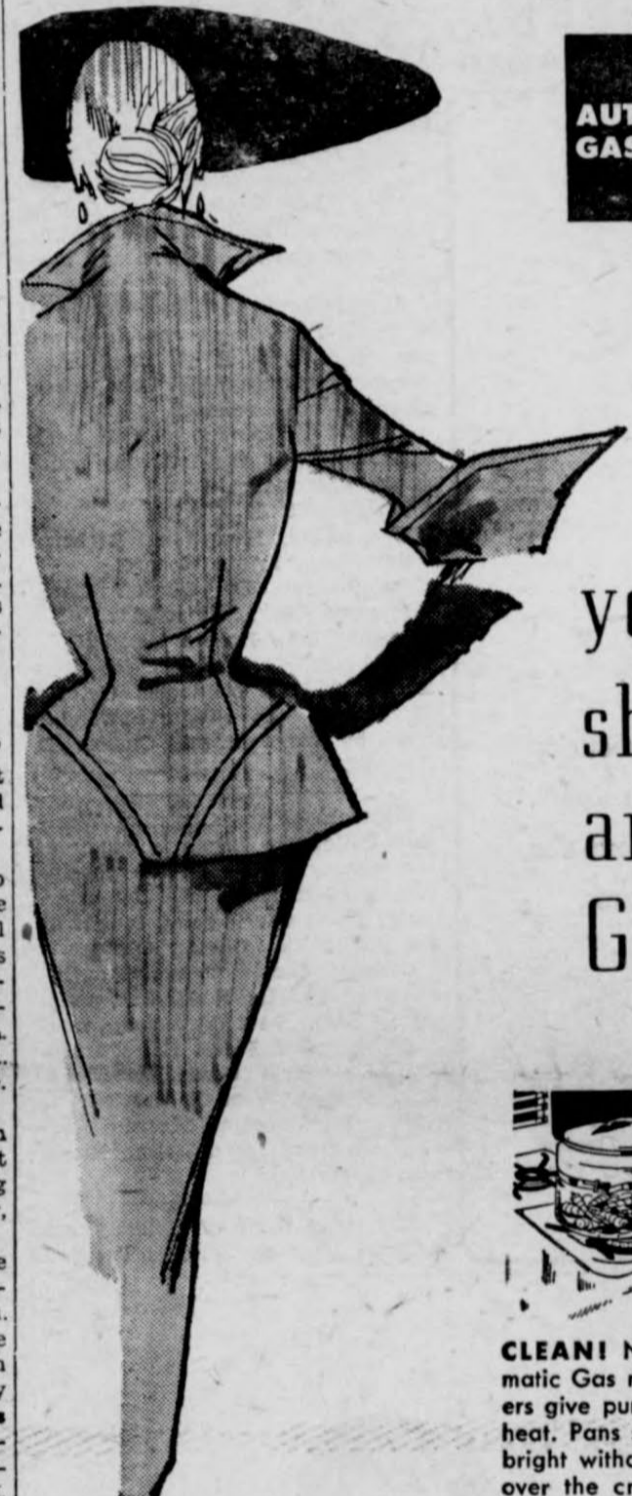

Steel Scrap Needed By Foundries

Mr. Woodson, representing the U. S. Department of Commerce office in Dallas, called at the Chamber of Commerce office Wednesday to discuss the steel scrap shortage and what can be done about it in this area.

This is not a household scrap program such as the one promoted during World War II. The drive is directed at business and industrial executives who have authority to determine what can be scrapped, order its disposal through normal channels, and arrange to have obsolete equipment written off.

Woodson said to increase the flow of dormant iron and steel scrap to mills and foundries, the National Production Authority has set up a special program in which business, industry, chambers of commerce and many other organizations and agencies are co-operating.

The program includes formation of scrap mobilization committees in industrial communities throughout the country.

Farms and ranches also provide a source of scrap: worn out tractors, plows, rakes, harrows, plow points, washers and the like are found on many farms. All this is needed to make military equipment as well as new farm machinery.

The chambers of commerce at Wichita Falls, Burkburnett, Iowa Park and Electra are working together in this drive to salvage all dormant iron and steel scrap as quickly as possible.

The Wichita Falls chamber is sparking the drive with an area meeting soon. At that time a general chairman will be named. A chairman for each town will help organize community efforts.

Amazing results have followed when careful search for dormant scrap has been made, and Pres. Alan W. Berry of the Iowa Park C of C feels confident a continuous scrap check-up will bring results here.
