# Mayor Fenton Dale Asks Citizens to Aid In Fire Prevention

upon this week by Mayor Fenton Dale to take an active part in the nation's observance of Fire Prevention Week, October 7-13.

The mayor drew attention to President Truman's proclamation setting aside the week for annual observance.

"Truman has appealed to the nation to safeguard its resources against destructive fires. He stressed the present emergency requirement that we conserve manpower, productive facilities and material resources; urging all of us to do our part to make the U.S. strong, by accepting individual responsibility in a year-round campaign against preventable fires.

"According to statistics provided by national fire prevention and protection authorities, each year 10,000 Americans die needlessly in fires, and more than twice that number are severely burned or disfigured for life. Every day there are 28 deaths by fire, 700 home fires, 139 store fires, 80 factory fires, 9 church fires, 8 school fires and 3 hospital fires. On farms, fires take an estimated 3,500 lives annually and destroy about \$100,000,000 worth of

Therefore, as mayor of Iowa Park I earnestly request every citizen and every organization to heed the appeal and to unite their efforts under the leadership of the Volunteer Fire Department, Chamber of Commerce and other agencies in inspecting all properties and premises so that fire hazards may be detected and eliminated. Furthermore I call upon our people to acquaint themselves with all circumstances and situations that are likely to cause the outbreak of fire and with the steps that should be taken when Headline Speaker cause the outbreak of fire and with fires occur."

federal economy. There is nothing particularly un-

usual about that. However, there has been more talk about economy in this session

of Congress than usual. One reason is that this Congress has appoved spending at a rate higher than any ever previously known in the country's peacetime

This has caused considerable concern among members who really worry about the country's future. But most of the spending is for military or related purposes and, not being military experts, those members who would like to effect economies find themselves equipped to do little except talk about it.

Another reason for the greater than usuual amount of talk about economy is that members of the House got avacation last month and had opportunity to get back home and find out what the people are thinking about Congress.

A number of them report that many of their constituents are beginning to associate the coming tax increase with the rise in spending That sort of public feeling is apt to make a man who depends of votes for a living, nervous. But, with the tax rise and sppending increase now practically a matter of record, all he can do at this point is talk about the need for economy.

# Power Break Repairs Explained to Reporter QUICK RELIEF OR NO COST By Local Manager

Herald office early last Friday morning, we wondered how the troubleshooters knew where to go to fix the lines, so this week we asked Pat Pastusek, local manager, to explain it all to us.

Pastusek obliged by going into full details, with pencilled sketches and everything. We are now enlightened on the job, but could hardly give an understandable account of the art of troubleshooting on an electric power circuit.

It seems that the local service is sectionalized and men are stationed at various terminal points to test for the open circuit.

When a portion of the circuit is given power, if the line is charged and stays on, then another section

After locating the break, temporary service is given by means of a bridge over the break, and permanent repairs go ahead immediately. By this means, service is restored more quickly.

Pat says they have two sources of power into Iowa Park, so that a break in one line can be supplemented by switching to the other power supply. The break last week was in the

outskirts of Wichita Falls, and the time required to restore service was necessarily longer than usual on account of the distance involved in reaching the trouble.

Electric service at the Fair was better this year than ever before the manager said, and he received better co-operation from exhibitors
