





Reflections from the Bible

Many parents ask the question What is wrong with dancing? Not long ago one of our leading newspapers carried the anhweras the Chinese give it. Maybe some of us can learn a lesson in morality from the Chinese. Here is the news item:

"TAIPEI, Formosa, July 7, 1957—(AP)—Police have banned dancing parties of students on Fors mosa. . . . An sorder gives this reason: 'Over-indulgence in the dancing affects a student's scholastic work and his sense of moral

And there you have it according to the Chinese. Public school teachers and officials, as well as parents, please take notice. Here is a double-barrel charge, and if either barrel is loaded," that's enough to ban the modern dance from the gymnasiums and the physical education class rooms of public schools.

While the probers are delving into the causes of juvenile delinquency they should not overlook the fact the public school systems themselves are among the chief contributors because of insistence upon dancing in physical education classes, and encouragement of dancing at almost every public chool function.
