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## Act Now To Trim Your Federal Income Tax Bill

**YEAR END TAX TIPS NUMBER 1**

This is one of a series of four articles on federal income taxes. The articles are based on information provided by the American Institute of Certified Public Accountants and the Texas Society of Certified Public Accountants.

You still have time—but not much time—to do a little year-end tax planning and assure yourself of the best possible break when you file your tax return next April.

Millions of high, low and middle income taxpayers, realizing that careful planning of their financial affairs between now and the first of the year can pay off handsomely when the tax collector calls next spring, have already begun to establish those extra deductions and special exemptions that will reduce their tax bills.

You can do this too, but you must act no later than December 31.

To alert you to the tax-saving steps you may be able to take before the end of the year, this newspaper is printing a series of articles prepared with the help of the national and state organizations of certified public accountants. These articles—if you keep them and follow their advice—can save you money.

**Evaluate Income Prospects**

If you are like most individual taxpayers, your goal at this time should be to level out income for this year and next year. Needless or careless bunching of income in either year can be costly. The sharp bite of today's progressive tax rates—which you can assume will be as high or possibly only slightly less in 1958—makes it much better to have an income of \$8,000 in each of two years, rather than \$6,000 in one and \$10,000 in the other.

Taxpayers who are in danger of being whiplashed from one tax bracket to another because of wide fluctuations in their 1957 and 1958 income should act before December 31 to try to average out their taxable earnings. This can be done by careful shifting of income and deductions from one year to the next.

**How to Shift Income**

For example, if your two-year income estimate shows that your income for this year will be significantly higher than next year's, you should take immediate steps to throw as much income as possible from 1957 to 1958. At the same time you should speed up the payment of all expenses that can be deducted on your 1957 return. By concentrating deductions in the higher year and switching income to the lower year, you will keep your taxes for both years in the lowest possible tax bracket.

## Reflections from the Bible

Aquila and Priscilla took Apollus aside and "taught him the way of the Lord more perfectly" (Acts 18:26). He accepted their teaching humbly. Later Paul taught twelve disciples at Ephesus who had learned only "John's baptism" and they "were baptized in the name of the Lord Jesus" (Acts 19:5).

It is just that simple. Study the book of Acts closely and see if you have obeyed the command to believers in Christ to "repent and be baptized every one of you in the name of Jesus Christ for the remission of sins..." (Acts 2:38). Goodspeed translates the last phrase "in order to have your sins forgiven." If you have not done this, then don't hesitate to make sure that you have obeyed the Lord in this respect. Baptism is not a church ordinance or command. It is a command of the Lord Jesus Christ. It is no personal matter. Who baptized you is not too important, but the important thing is that you are "buried with him by baptism into death: that like as Christ was raised up from the dead by the glory of the Father, even so we should walk in newness of life. For if we have been planted together in the likeness of his death, we shall be also in the likeness of his resurrection..." (Romans 6:4-5; Compare also Mark 16:16; Acts 10:48; 22:16; I Corinthians 12:13; Galatians 3:27; Colossians 2:12; I Peter 3:21). After studying these scriptures then consider whether or not you have let the Lord add you to his church (Acts 2:47) where you worship Him in Spirit and in Truth or have you gone and joined yourself to something else?

## Along Tele - & Table-Vision Way

In search of an unusual idea for an informal dinner? Take a look at your television set — concentrate hard! There's food for thought and thought of food in "them" that dials". Call upon television to supply you with the inspiration for a delightful buffet. A "table-vision" of delicious food and drink.

Here are some ingenious decorating ideas developed by well-known designer David Barrett which can be easily converted to your individual needs.

Start off your eye pleasing preparations with a miniature TV screen announcing your TV Flavor Spectacular "The At Home Show". Lettering to show: "Bob (host) and Ann (hostess) Present The At Home Show. All you need for this are crayons, some cardboard from a hamper, laminated sheet.

Grease a 2 quart casserole having a tight-fitting cover. Pound 1 1/2 lbs. round steak to about 1/4 in. thickness. Cut into 6 pie-shaped wedges and set aside. Mix together 1/2 cup sour, 1/2 teaspoon monosodium glutamate, 1/2 teaspoon salt, 1/2 teaspoon pepper. Coat the meat with this mixture. Put in a bowl 3 carrots, 1 onion, 1/2 green pepper and 2 slices of bacon, all sliced. Add garlic powder to taste, and a chopped dill pickle, together with a few dashes of paprika. Mix well. Place a tablespoon of this mixture on each beef wedge, roll up, starting at tip of meat. Tuck under ends to keep vegetables inside roll. Insert wooden picks through folded ends and through center of each roll. Melt 3 tablespoons fat in skillet. Slowly brown meat rolls on all sides. Place meat rolls in casserole. Pour over the meat a can of tomato puree. Stir in 1/2 cup mushrooms, 1 tablespoon minced parsley, and 1/2 teaspoon Worcestershire sauce. Cover casserole and bake at 350°F. one to one and a half hours or until meat is tender when pierced with fork. Remove woollen picks (this serving.)

Yarborough Reports

"Give the people light and they will find the way." This is a basic precept of democracy.

So believing, this is to report to you that our country is in the most grave danger that it has been in since the first months after Pearl Harbor.

Last week I witnessed the missile briefings and firings at Fort Bliss and at White Sands proving grounds.

Our armed services have perfected a missile virtually 100 per cent effective against pilot-operated aircraft. But this offers little consolation because we have not created an effective weapon to knock out guided missiles.

This, without question, is the most vital problem that faces us at this minute. It is the reason I urged the president to call Congress in session immediately. I believe that the earliest minute we can face this matter and speed up our research and development programs, the safer our country will be.

Many of you have asked me, during my recent fact-finding visits across the state, whether I believe taxes will have to be raised to meet the Russians' missile threat.

I believe the answer to this depends on the administration. If we have unguided service rivalry and typical helter-skelter Republican planning by the Administration, it might raise taxes.

However, if a missile administrator or director is appointed with authority to take control of missile development and co-ordinate the work, I believe our safety can be secured without additional taxes.

One thing is sure: We cannot afford delay.
