

### HOW TO FIND THE SECRET PLACE OF SAFETY

A bombing raid was on. An ignorant Chinese woman stood at a railroad station as the raid began. Suddenly she raised her oil-paper umbrella and began to scream, "I am God's child, so I can't be hurt! Whoever gets under my umbrella with me will be safe!"

This Chinese woman had recently been converted to Christianity. A missionary had taught her that she was God's child and that He would take care of her.

Four helpless ones crowded under the umbrella with God's child. When the raid was over, only these five stood alive amid the shambles. Under the shadow of the Almighty they had found their refuge.

There is a circle of protection for those who trust Him. This was known even to the men of the Old Testament, for David the Psalmist wrote, "A thousand shall fall at thy side, and ten thousand at thy right hand, but it shall not come nigh thee." Daniel in the lions' den, and others, were conscious of protection. They felt it. They knew it, for they had learned to abide under the shadow of the Almighty.

How can one set in motion this marvelous protective force?

First, be still and know that He is God. He has all power, and if He wished, this little world would roll up like a scroll. And He could easily make another one at the same moment.

Also, know that He is love and that He has made us of Himself and for Himself. The Bible tells us that He breathed a part of Himself into a lump of dirt and man became a living soul. You are a son of God. The wonderful privileges that such a relationship guarantees is yours.

And then we must pray for others. We cannot desire the love of Christ for ourselves while Chinese, Japanese, Greeks and Germans cry alone in the night from pain or hunger. They are all children of God. And as a mother goes first to the bedside of a child who needs her most, so we should send our prayers out in love to our own brethren.

What happens we send the love of Christ through our prayers to others who are also His children? I cannot tell you all the results. But there is a certain result that becomes immediately perceptible, for as we pray for all the world in His name, we know of a certainty that He is God. And there is an assurance within us that His love breathes over jungle and desert, the sea and the whole earth!

Then we come to know that we rest under the shadow of His wing. Yes, through praying for and ministering to His suffering children all over the world, we invite Him into ourselves and thus direct His power through us. This is our protection.

A certain missionary traveled alone among cannibal tribes. Years later he converted the chief of those tribes. The chief asked him this question, "Who were those two shining ones who walked on either side of you?" Then the missionary was sure that God had protected him with guardian angels.
