Iowa Park's new telephone building is scheduled to be completed in June. When the building is completed, a crew of trained Western Electric installers will move in to install the new dial switching equipment, Gene Brusenan, manager for Southwestern Bell, says.

When the new equipment goes into service, Iowa Park users will be able to dial Wichita Falls customers without a long distance toll charge.

"Iowa Park telephone users will be able to dial Wichita Falls in the same manner they now dial local calls," Brusenan says. This means an additional 39,000 telephones will be within the local

calling scope of all Iowa Park phones.

When the change is made, all Iowa Park telephone numbers will be changed to the seven-numeral system. Wichita Falls was changed to this new plan in January.

In addition to the new building and equipment, additional cable

are being added between the two cities to handle the increase in traffic when long distance charges are removed from these calls.

Cables between Iowa Park and Wichita Falls are being placed under the ground to provide even more dependable service. "These underground cables will be free from damage due to wind and rain and ice storms," says Brusenan.

"We will notify all Iowa Park customers of the exact date of the change as soon as it has been determined," he adds.

New directories listing the new telephone numbers will be printed and delivered in advance of the change.



Services Held for Mrs. S. L. Denny

Mrs. Bonnie Eloise Denny died Saturday morning, April 12, in a Wichita Falls hospital after several weeks of serious illness.

Funeral services were conducted Monday afternoon in the Methodist church with Rev. Elden Cole, pastor, and Rev. Dan Barron, district superintendent and former local pastor, officiating. The body lay in view at the church one hour before the service.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Alan Berry, Rollins Woodall, John Mixon, Curtis Sewell, Roy Lahey of Valley View and Miles Hines of Lubbock.

Mrs. Denny was born July 1, 1876, near Henderson, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Rhoad E. Perry. As a small child she moved with her parents to Chico and resided there until 1897, when she came to the Denny community (which is now Valley View) to teach school. Several of her former students are still residents of this area.

She taught in Denny school for two years and resided with the late Mr. and Mrs. Joel A. Putman, a pioneer couple of the community.

On May 23, 1899, she was married to S. L. Denny. The ceremony was performed in the Putman home.

The Denny family resided on the farm until 1917, when they moved into Iowa Park and settled on North Bond street. Mr. Denny died in September 1936.

Mrs. Denny was active in the Methodist church as long as health permitted. She was a member for over 60 years. She was a member of Susan Wesley Sunday School class, a Sunday School teacher and a life member of the Woman's Society of Christian Service.

Mrs. Denny helped organize the Valley View Methodist Sunday School and church. For many years she was superintendent and organizer for the small group.

She was a long-time member and past president of the 23 Study club of Iowa Park.

Survivors are a son Elgin Denny of Iowa Park; three daughters: Mrs. Emma Gaunt and Mrs. Elmo Traylor, both of Iowa Park, and Mrs. Arthur Beadle of Odessa; a sister Mrs. J. M. McDonald of Phoenix, Ariz.; a brother M. A. Perry of Oklahoma City; six grand-children: Miss Jane Gaunt and Miss Elga Ana Denny, both of Iowa Park; Don Beadle of Farmington, N.M.; Gary, Jocile and Alan Beadle of Odessa; and several nephews and nieces.

Reflections from the Bible

God Selects Moses for Leadership. Text: Exodus 3:1-15.

Moses was delivered from the hands of Pharaoh's men while a babe in a bulrush basket on the river Nile only to become the adopted son of the daughter of Pharaoh. Growing into manhood he had a decision to make of whether or not he would remain with the Egyptians and enjoy a life of ease or align himself with his despised and persecuted brethren.

The decision of Moses is also a decision for all. Are we willing to suffer the persecution of a New Testament Christian or will we follow the pleasant paths of man? Paul teaches that Moses acted by faith in God. "By faith Moses, when he was come to years, refused to be called the son of Pharaoh's daughter; choosing rather to suffer affliction with the people of God..." (Heb. 11:24,25). Paul also teaches "faith cometh by hearing, and hearing by the word of God" (Rom. 10:17). Moses acted by the rules of God thus denying the honors of a corrupt and licentious court by which he could share in the future blessings of the Abrahamic Covenant.

Moses did not hesitate as to which he should choose; knowing that "the triumphing of the wicked is short and that the joy of a hypocrite is but for a moment" (Job 20:5).

The God of Moses was not a static being. He was a God of action. He demands the same of His Children today, that is, action by faith, "for whatsoever is not of faith is sin" (Rom. 14:23). adv

23 Study Club Football, War and Business --Lay Preacher

"All things whatsoever ye would that men should do to you, do ye even so unto them."

This quotation from Matthew introduced a talk "Christianity in Action" by Dr. LeRoy Carter, minister of the Christian church, for members of the 23 Study club meeting recently in the home of Mrs. Fred Widmoyer.

Dr. Carter said the greatest power in the world is the power of Christianity working in men and women. "The world has plenty of bluster, but history has not been shaped by bluster. Rather by creative forces working in the hearts and minds of people."

In the midst of barbarism in Europe, the church planted monasteries which later grew into the great universities, including Oxford and Heidelberg. John Calvin established the first school system out of the church.

Russians might be surprised to learn this, but in the year 956 the translation of the Gospel into the Slavic church became the basis of the Russian language.

American law came from the old Roman law, whose spirit was Christian ethics. In spite of the belief of many that science and Christianity cannot live together, our greatest scientists have been churchmen. For 1400 years the church was the sole promoter of science.

Art, literature, music, medicine and hospitals, homes for the weak and broken stem directly from the church.

We think of the Spirit of '76 as being the beginning of freedom and democracy. These things began on the Judean hills and came down through the ages with hearts filled and steeped with Christian principles—prior to 1776.

Christianity has destroyed human sacrifice, child exposure (the practice of leaving children to the wild beasts), human slavery (Britain furnished the slave marts of Rome), feuds, duels, imprisonment for debt, trial by ordeal, and many other things which we today cannot believe ever were possible. Present day issues are numerous. To meet these issues we need to re-establish Christian ethics and make them work. This is no task nor time for weakness.

Mrs. O. E. Lochridge was leader for the day, and in addition to the guest speaker presented Mrs. C. J. Simpson who gave a beautiful Easter meditation, and Mmes. C. W. Coppock, James Sewell and Fenton Dale, singing as a trio: "When I Survey the Wondrous Cross."



Reaching the pulpit via the hard knocks of the gridiron and the complexities of the slide rule may seem strange to some—but not to Fred Cherry.

"The Lord just called me into it," comments the tall sunnied Oklahoma in a matter of fact tone. "I feel he used my experience in the business world to prepare me for the evangelistic ministry."

Cherry—considered the country's most prominent full time lay evangelist—is soon to conduct a layman's evangelistic program in the Faith Baptist church here.

It is one of the estimated 170 such meetings he has held in cities and towns from coast to coast since starting the work eight years ago.

Back in the early '30's Cherry made a name for himself as a top flight end on the University of Oklahoma football team.

Upon graduation, he became a petroleum engineer and worked for oil companies in Oklahoma and Texas. Next, as a captain in army ordnance, he served four years in Europe during World War II. The Post War period saw Cherry in the service of the Oklahoma planning and resources board. Then in July 1950 came his departure from governmental facts and figures and his entry into the field of evangelism.

The change was not an abrupt one, for Cherry had been drifting steadily toward what has become his lifetime work. He devoted his spare time to spreading the word of God by speaking in jails and hospitals and at services held by church groups.

"Finally," he recalls, "invitations to speak in churches exceeded my free time. It was then I decided to devote full time to evangelistic work."

"I'm compelled to do this. I couldn't do anything else. This is what the Lord prepared me for, for a long time. I was receiving my preparation for this work in a practical way—through my business life."

"I made a vow on Thanksgiving morning 23 years ago to talk to at least one person each day about Christ. I have kept that vow to this day."

It was not uncommon for Cherry, when he worked as engineer, to go out of his way to pick up hitchhikers in order to chat with them about the Lord. Nor is it uncommon for him to stop and talk to a stranger on the street.

"People, in their hearts," he explained, "are concerned with their souls. And they appreciate your interest."

Cherry's evangelistic meetings keep him on the go about 11 months a year. He spends the Christmas and New Year seasons with his family in Oklahoma City. "And that's about the biggest part of this story," Cherry chuckled. "I've got my wife and 11 youngsters at home—a few too many to take on my tours."
