Barbra Collins had as guests for the weekend two cousins—Helen and Joseph McLaughlin of Lewisville.

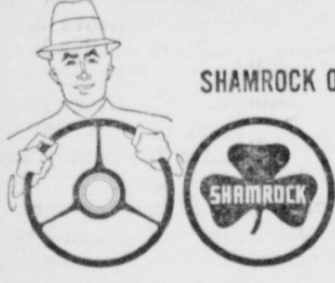
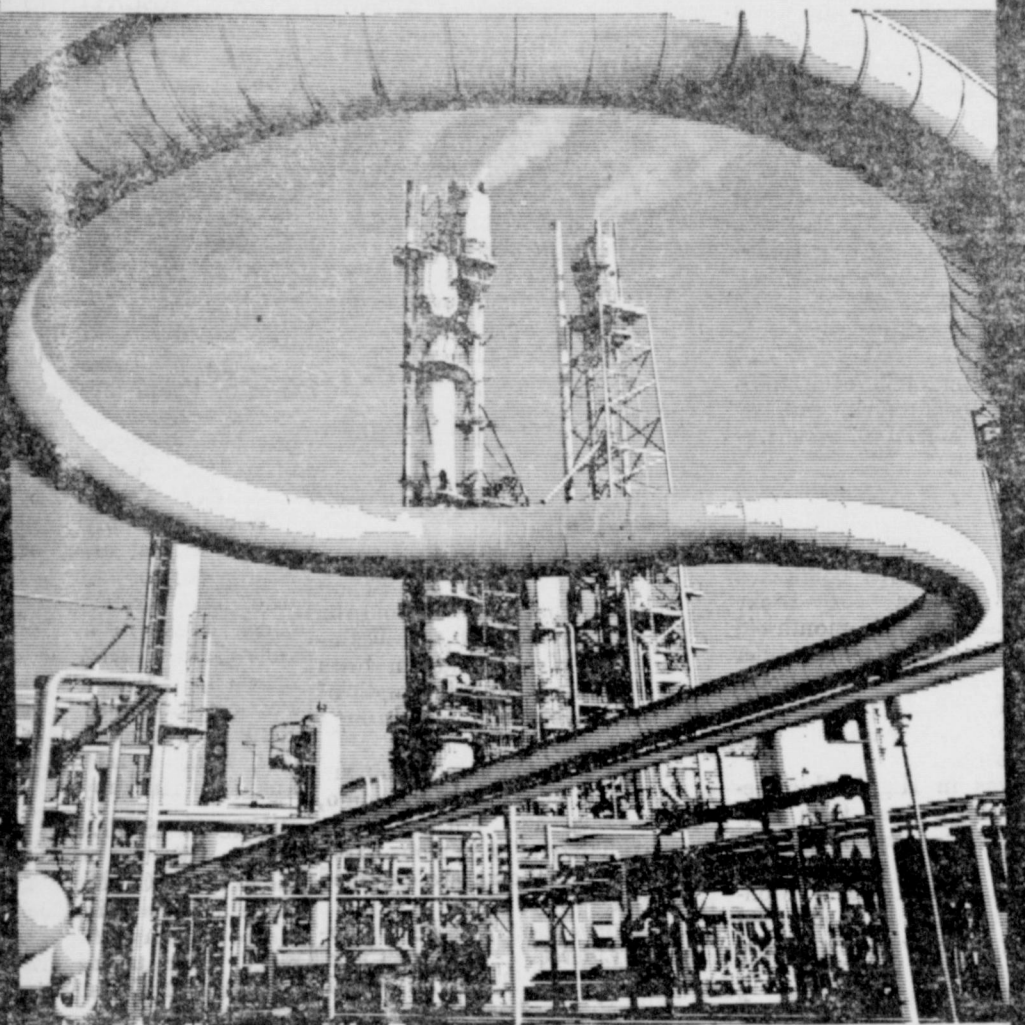
