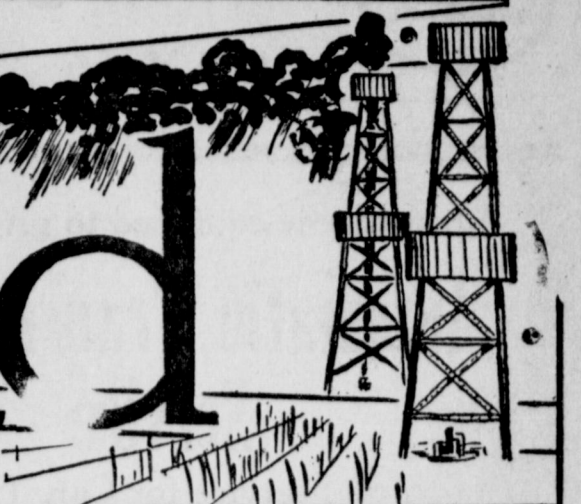

He has taught tonette in the 4th grades; bands for the 5th and 6th grades, junior high and high school; and the stage band.

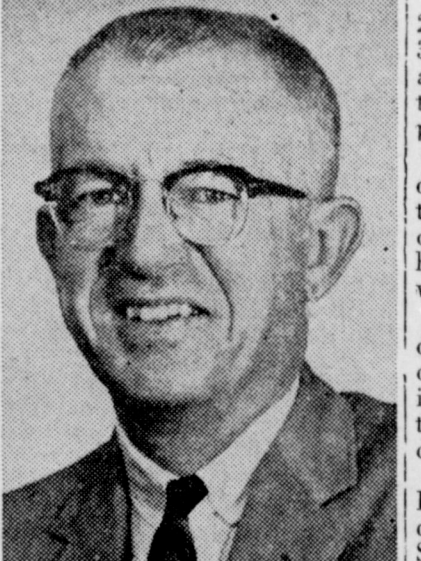
Mr. Vaughn has taken an active part in civic affairs of Our Town and has given of his time generously and graciously since moving here.

This is the only time make-up on the special program can be obtained through the county medical society, which has sponsored the program for all three types of oral vaccine.

Harvest
Rain has slowed the wheat harvest in this area. It was beginning to reach full swing when cloudy weather showed up.

Some farmers report approximately a third of the crop has been cut, and there is much moisture in the grain that has been brought to the two elevators in Iowa Park.

Holder Gives \$25
First load of wheat brought to the Ed Holder Grain Co. last week was produced by Hill Spruiell and his son Dewey on their farm just east of Iowa Park. They were given a \$25 bonus by Ed Holder.

Dee Hankins' farm in Kamay area has made among the best yields of the year—an average of 30.5 bushels to the acre.

Many farms in this area are yielding 25 bushels an acre.

Holder says the wheat harvest here should be in full blast by next week.

Wheat farmers all over the nation have turned down the 1964 wheat program.

Bob Crocker, office manager for ASCS in Wichita county, reported 248 voters preferred the program and 432 voted against it. There were 1040 eligible voters and 70 per cent took advantage of their right to decide the referendum.

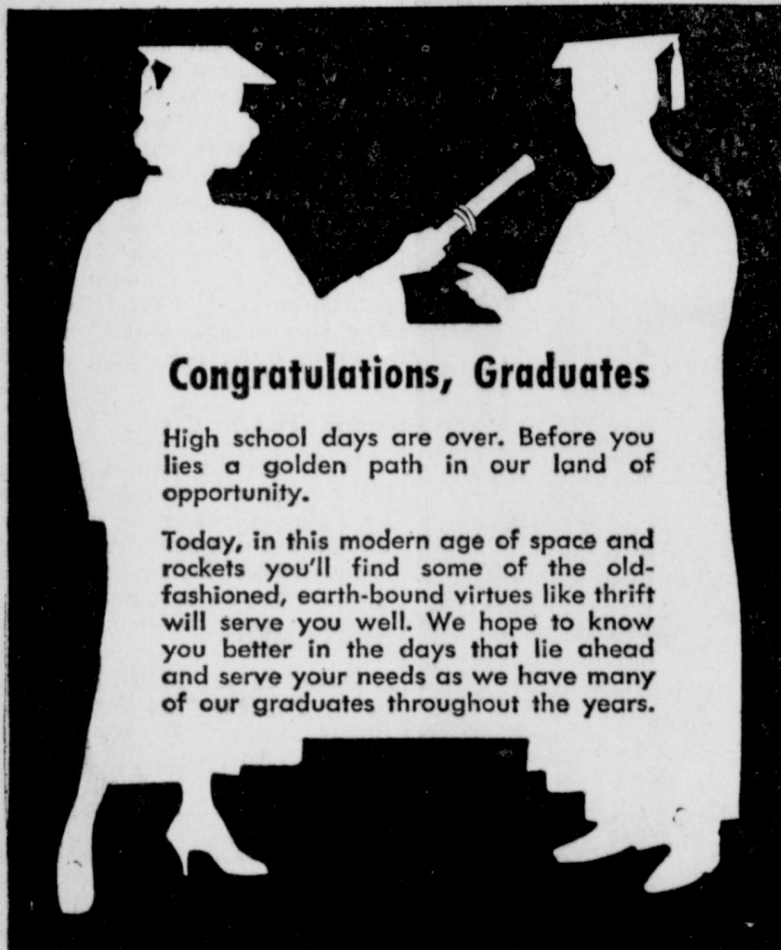

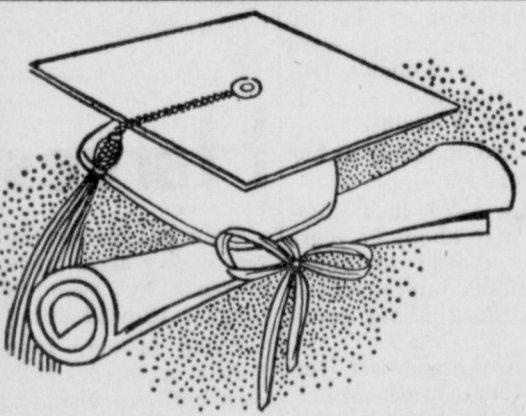

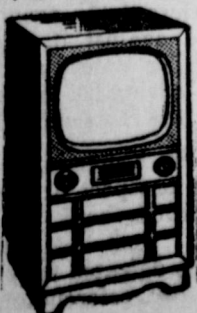

Certainly, we should be proud when our boy makes a good hit, or a good catch. But how many parents scold their boys for striking out? And how many pat a boy on the back when he has sat out in the dug-out with a smile on his face and a root for his team?

We are spending time and money on this project. Let us get the most out of it. Many men are donating their time as managers and umpires. They need our support. Let's not argue with them.

This is a tough job, and we see no perfect men in sight to take their places. We feel that both public and personal apologies are due these men for insults, real or implied.

Let's give the game back to the boys and to the men who are willing to work with our boys.

To: The Iowa Park School Board:
T. E. Gilbreath, president; John Clapp, Edward Clark, Fred Hays, Harry Moore, Fred Parkey and Dewey Spruiell.

Gentlemen:
On April 16, 1963, at the School Board meeting, I appeared before you to make a few statements in behalf of Mr. C. L. Vaughn. At that time, as you will recall, Mr. Vaughn's contract was the only teacher contract of those desiring renewal which had not been renewed. Let me take this opportunity to thank you for giving me an audience, even though you chose to take action not to renew that contract.

As a result of your action there have been several of the citizens of this community very much upset and quite surprised at the school board's reasoning or lack of rea-

soning in this matter. You will please find enclosed several petitions bearing the signatures of over three hundred persons in Iowa Park who desired that Mr. Vaughn be reconsidered for music teacher next year. Of course, Mr. Vaughn has chosen to seek employment elsewhere so this petitioning is to no avail except to enlighten you, gentlemen, concerning the feelings of many of your fellow citizens.

The deep concern most of us have in regard to this matter is of a twofold nature. First, we regret deeply the loss from our community as well as our school system, of a teacher with as much character and conviction as has Mr. Vaughn. Not only has he faithfully fulfilled his position as band director and music teacher these past twelve years, but in addition he has been a good influence upon many young lives. A man of this caliber is most difficult, if not impossible, to replace in a school system which pays its teachers no more than ours. Consequently, our children will be the losers.

The second thing which disturbs us, and this the most, is that no attempt whatsoever was made by the board to give Mr. Vaughn an

opportunity to speak in behalf of his own position. I personally have the feeling that my time in appearing before you on the night of April 16 was completely wasted as you, gentlemen, who were at that meeting, with one exception, had come with your minds already made up that Mr. Vaughn's contract would not be renewed. I have asked some of you personally "Why?" but have received not the least bit of satisfaction. You have told me that regarding the renewal of teacher contracts you have always gone upon the recommendation of the school superintendent, but for some reason we cannot determine, in this case you acted against his recommendation to renew this contract.

Again I asked "Why?" and the best you could tell me is that you did not know. Under such circumstances it seems to me that in all fairness to everyone concerned before you took your vote, Mr. Vaughn should have been granted a hearing. Many of us are very sorry that such an audience was not granted him, as this man was completely taken aback by your failure to support him.

Some of us have the feeling that he was "stabbed in the back" by some of his would be supporters in the band parents group although the great majority of the band parents are sincere in their praise of Mr. Vaughn's work. We hope we are mistaken in believing that a few parents prompted by a handful of disgruntled children have brought this injustice to pass, but if we are not mistaken our prayer is that you, gentlemen, will review in your own minds the meaning of the trust the citizens of this community have placed in you as their representatives for the good of the entire school system and not a minority.

When the day comes that the minority rules, our democratic way of life which we treasure so dearly will have died. God grant that this will not happen here.

Soil Conservation

Soil protection between crops can be had by mulching of wheat stubble, according to Elvy Sargent, Iowa Park soil conservationist.

Average wheat in this area will produce about 2000 pounds of stubble, Sargent says.

Tillage by large sweeps usually reduces the amount of stubble on the surface by 10 per cent, small sweeps about 25, average tandem disc plows about 25, and one-way plows reduce stubble by about 50 per cent each cultivation.

Since 750 to 1250 pounds of stubble are usually considered necessary for minimum soil protection, farmers can plan the type of implement they must use, the number of tillage operations, and amount of stubble at start of tillage season.

ACP county committee will take applications for stubble mulching and cost-share its application. All complete conservation plans with Wilbarger - Wichita SCD have management of residues included on cropland. Many thousands of acres are stubble mulched to some extent. Technicians with SCS are assisting district co-operators to plan a more complete mulching program.

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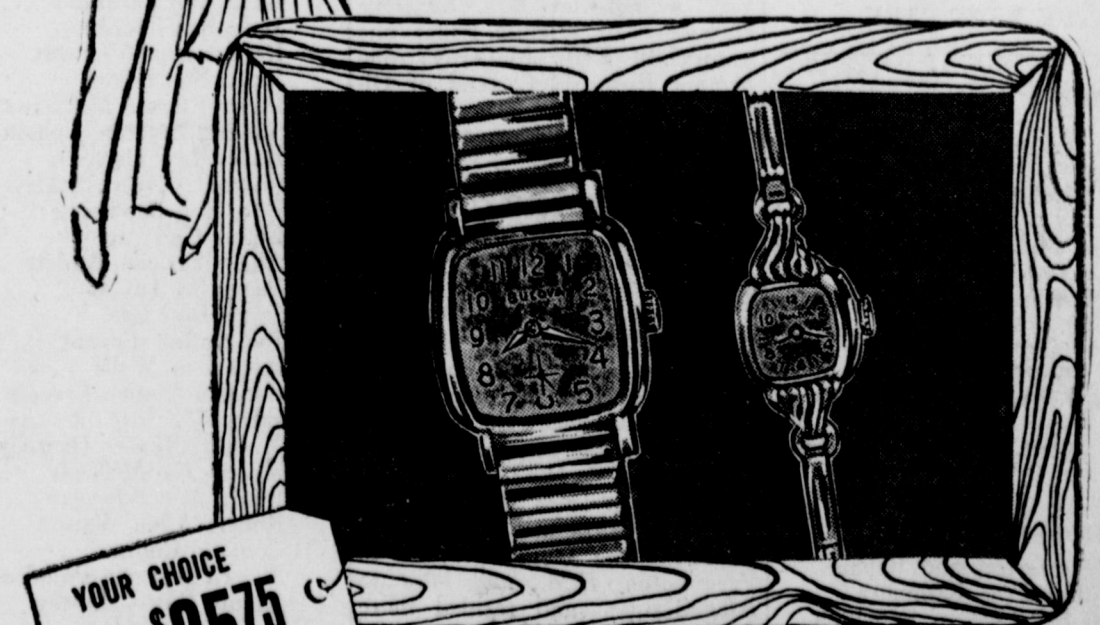
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Grandma's Rocking Chair

If the cameraman had no better judgment than to film such things, then the news editor should have cut them out.

There is a code of ethics to which all stations must conform and under which they operate. They are careful to state at the beginning and end of each broadcasting period. Surely the US department of communications would not condone such conduct.

Filming of the tragedy was news — true — but having worked for years in several types of news media, I also know that it is possible to "get the story" with tact and diplomacy and without making a sideshow of it and invading the privacy of another human being.

This is my opinion, for what it is worth. But numerous persons have called me and stopped me on the street to ask that I speak on their behalf as well as to express my opinion.

Will the person who borrowed Volume 3, Book II of World Book from the library please return it? You youngsters—did you get the book to do a theme or a speech, and have you forgotten? It ruins the set, which was donated to the library. You, Moms, check and see if you used it for a club program and forgot to return it.

The board said, "Please return the volume and all will be forgiven!"

Forty years ago I received my diploma from IPHS. This week my only granddaughter is doing likewise.

What a lot of water has run under the bride since then! There have been happiness and

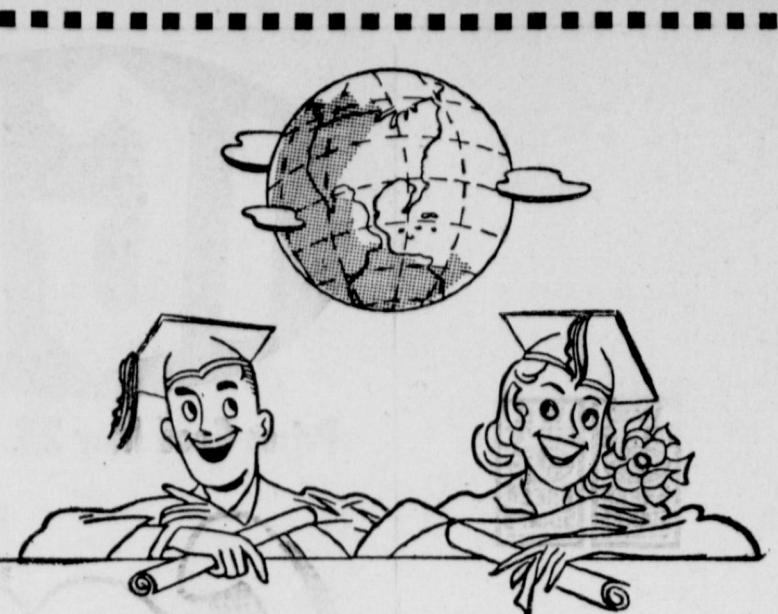

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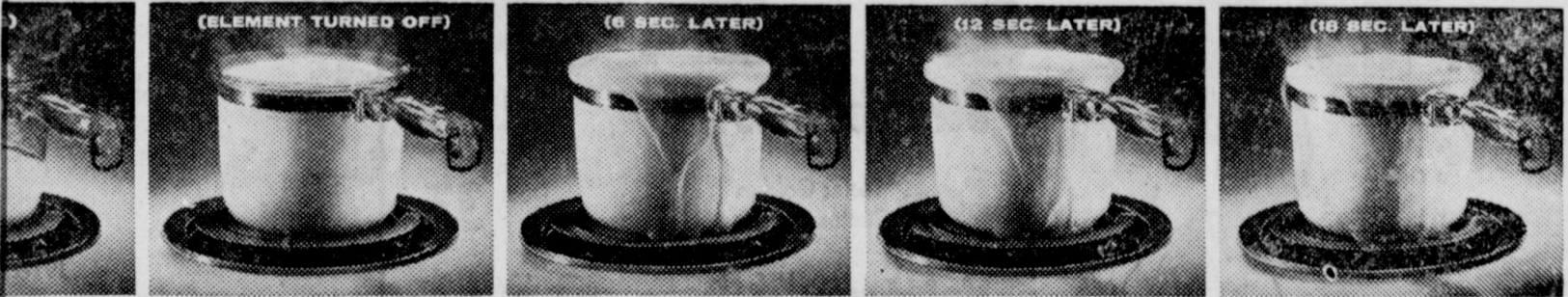

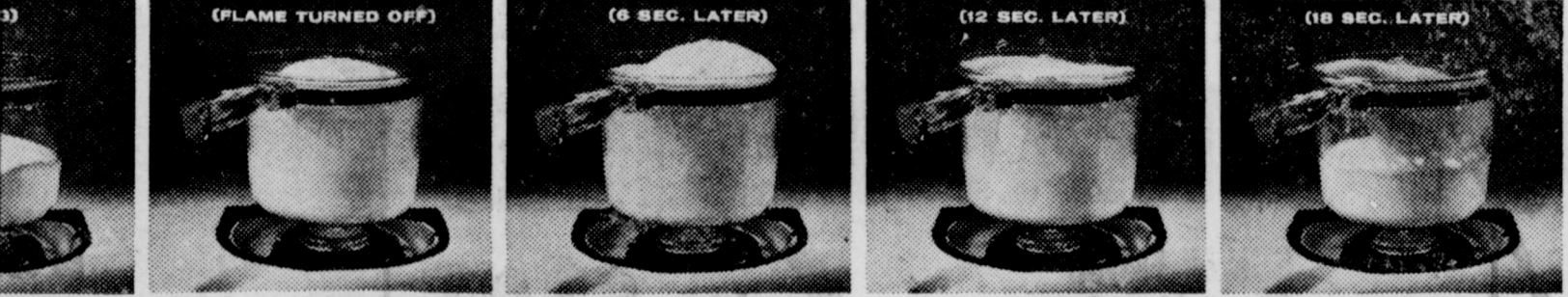

On Oct. 28 and 29 of this year we will see a new era dawn in the agriculture picture of this county for 4-H and FFA boys and girls.

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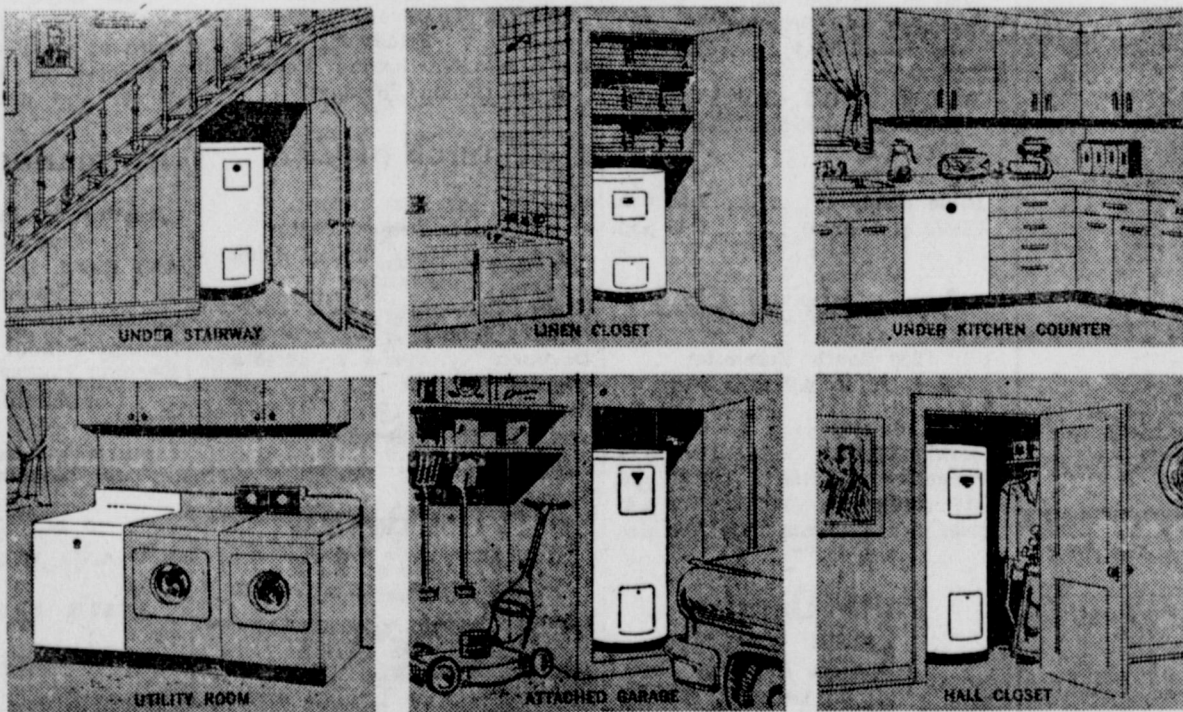
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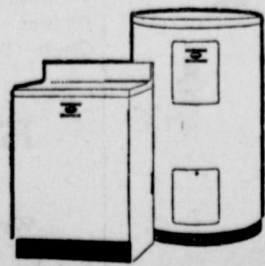
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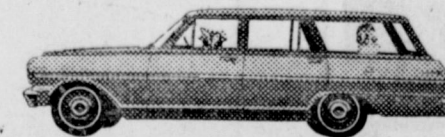

County Animal Show Planned

On Oct. 28 and 29 of this year we will see a new era dawn in the agriculture picture of this country for 4-H and FFA boys and girls. After a year of planning and hard work an organization has been formed for the sole purpose of helping the overall program for the youth of this county.

Five men from each of the Commissioners' precincts in the county have been appointed to make a board of directors to draw up rules and regulations as to the type of show needed. Out of this work has come the following:

A commercial type program that will be the same as they will be using when they become adults.

We plan to have a commercial steer, lamb and swine program in which the animals will be judged on foot and then the top ones will be slaughtered for a carcass contest.

Information will be compiled on each carcass and published for the public to see the winners.

The carcasses will be displayed to the public in some manner in Wichita Falls for educational purposes.

All other animals shown will be sold on the market the same as their parents do now.

We hope to raise prize money for this from various organizations all over the county. Trophies and ribbons and prize money will be given in the market classes as well as breeding classes of cattle, swine, sheep, dairy and broilers.

This show will be an annual affair and will be held at the 4-H Barn in Wichita Falls, but we plan to make this a county-wide endeavor.

Lion Arch Hughes of the Evening club was the only guest.

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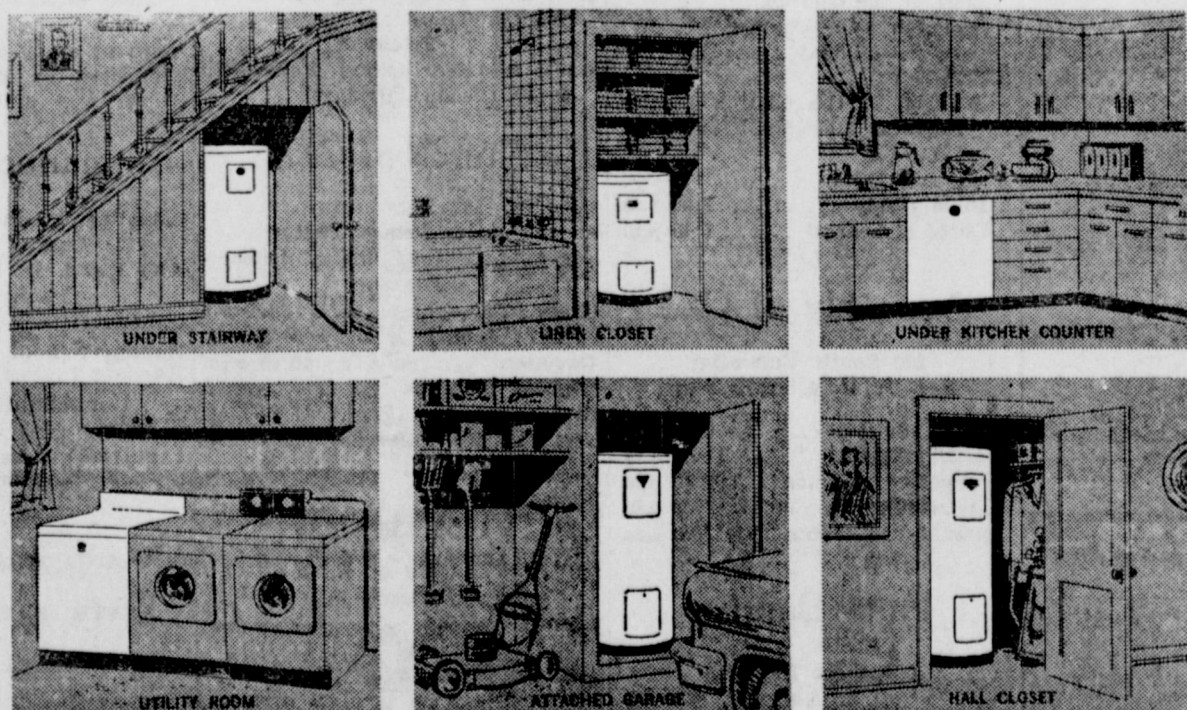
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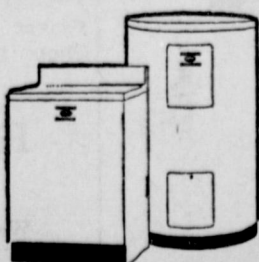
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
