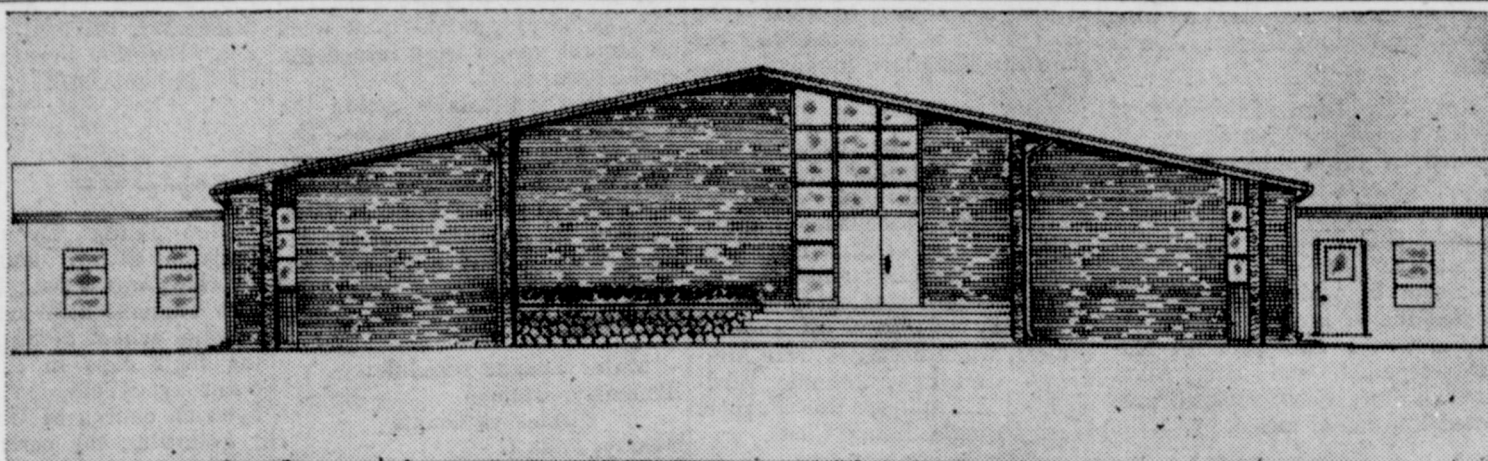

Church of Christ Announces Gospel Meeting and Openhouse

Mr. Jon Jones of Tuscaloosa, Ala., will be guest speaker in a series of gospel meetings at the church of Christ that begins June 10 and continues through June 17. This is the second time in two years that the church has called upon the services of this young man in their annual June meeting.

Though young, Mr. Jones is possessed of great ability and has many accomplishments as a gospel minister.

During the meeting the church will be celebrating open house in newly enlarged facilities. The church is expecting a great number of citizens of Iowa Park to visit with it during this series of meetings.

Schedule of services is as follows: Sundays: Bible classes at 9 a.m.; worship at 10 a.m. and 6 p.m. Monday through Saturday, 7-7:30 a.m. and 7:30 p.m.

An old fashioned "Dinner on

the Ground" will be served Sunday, June 10, at 12 noon, and all visitors at the 10 a.m. service will be urged to stay for this enjoyable occasion.

Work is almost complete on the \$40,000 expansion program of the Iowa Park Church of Christ. Although there will be a few details to be completed, the church is holding open house Sunday, June 10 through Sunday, June 17.

During this week a series of gospel meetings will be in progress and the church is urging all of Iowa Park to view its new facilities during the week. Speak-

er for the meeting will be Jon Jones of Tuscaloosa, Ala., who served in the same capacity for the church in 1960.

History of the local church has been one of growth and expansion since its beginning in 1905. In the late fall of that year a small meeting house was constructed on East Cash street, which served the membership for several years. In 1933 the church acquired three lots in the 300 block of East Park and erected a frame building.

Two lots adjoining this property were purchased in 1951 for future use. In 1954 a masonry building was erected with a seat-

ing capacity of 300 and containing nine classrooms and an office.

As membership continued to grow, four classrooms were added on the east in 1953 to shape the building into a near-perfect "T." Latest addition has been accomplished by adding 20 feet to each side of the auditorium. It affords the following advantages:

- Seating capacity of 550
 - Quadruple previous nursery space
 - New office and library area
 - By use of accordion doors, seven spacious classrooms.
- It is the desire of the church that everyone will come and see these improvements personally.

We have had the real and valid feeling that this endless activity is quite beside the point; that we never get around to what is actually important in our lives. This is the kind of frustration the man felt when he was given a new boomerang and spent the rest of his life trying to throw the old one away!

The message of the Scripture is quite different from this mad activity. The biblical account is filled with the importance of waiting—upon God. In the Scriptures to wait means to be strong; to be strong in the Lord. It means to look eagerly for.

And why wait upon God? Because as the Psalmist says, "The Lord is the stronghold of my life; of whom shall I be afraid?" You see, "The Lord IS my light and my salvation"—not, "I hope the Lord will be my light and my salvation" or "The Lord will be my light and my salvation if I can just muster up enough faith."

"The Lord is my light and my salvation; whom shall I fear?" In other words, to wait patiently before God is to realize that He has something far more important to say to us in our lives than we can ever have to say to Him. Each of us need moments of calm and silence and quiet waiting; if we "wait upon the Lord" then our lives can truly be directed to their highest possibilities, directed toward that for which they were made.

Waiting in silent prayer before God is never wasted time; it is truly redeemed time. People who are too busy to be in a hurry have their hand on a master clue to living. They know they cannot discharge their long list of obligations if they hurry.

And as Christians we wait upon God because Christians throughout all the ages have known that the real meaning of life is found only here; that they have been the most faithful servants of Christ when they have themselves hushed — and stood silent and waiting before Him.
