mester. Returning students and
many new students have already
enrolled.

Prin. Bob Dawson reminds all
junior high students to register
this Friday in the school cafe-
teria.

Seventh grade students are to
report at 2:00; 8th grade stu-
dents at 3:00.

All students enrolling here for
the first time are to bring report
cards from former schools, and
should have shot records.

Parents of elementary students
are reminded to send or bring
them to school this Friday for
registration. All students will
register at the school they attended
last year except those who live
south of the railroad tracks and
within two miles of Bradford ele-
mentary school. Children living in
that area will register at Brad-
ford.

Students in grades 1 through 6
will register from 8:00 a.m. till
2:00 p.m.

First grade pupils have already
registered but Miss Ethyle Kidwell
and John Sibley, principals, ask
them to register again on Friday.

If crowded conditions develop
in some grades, it may become
necessary to transfer some stu-
dents to another school, but all
children in one family will be
placed in the same building unless
separated with parents' consent.

All new students must have im-
munization records. First graders
must have birth certificates.

First graders will not be en-
rolled under any circumstances
without a birth certificate. This
is a state law.

School buses will not run Fri-
day.

with junior high football.

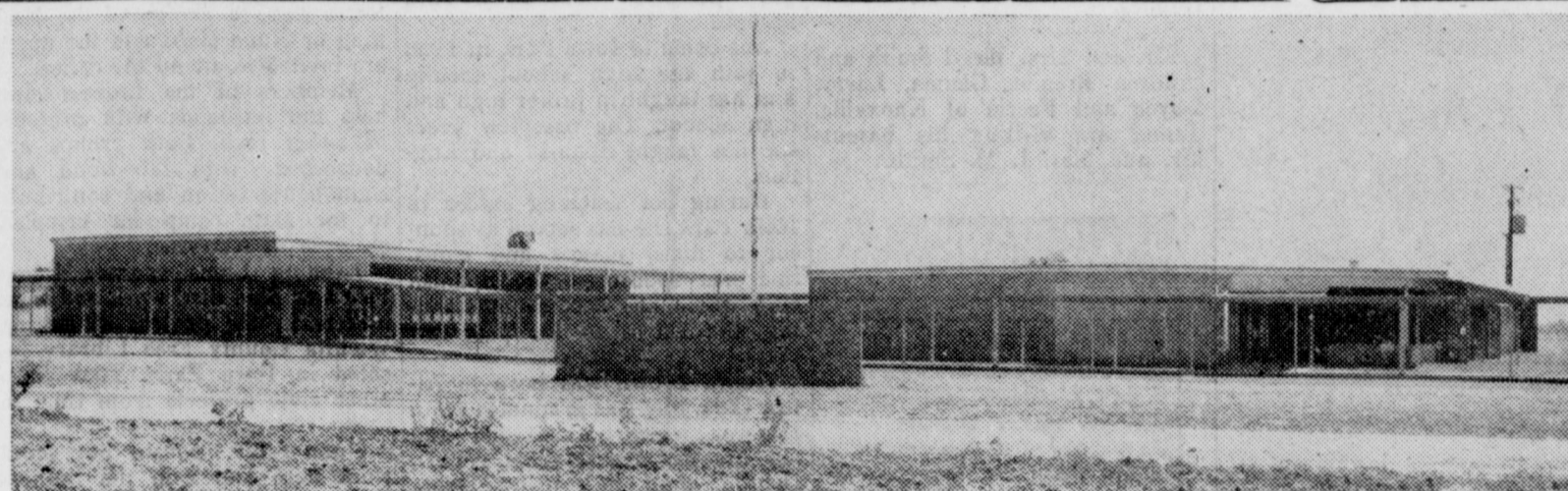
Shelton is a 1955 graduate of

noon for the W. R. Bradford
elementary school located on S.
Texowa street.

Visitors will register from 2
to 5 o'clock. The dedication will
be held at 3:00 in the school's
beautiful cafeterium. Supt. Keith
Swim will be master of ceremo-
nies. Mrs. John Mixon will be
organist and John Rollins Wood-
all vocalist. He will sing "My
Task" and the Lord's Prayer.

Don James will give the dedi-
catory message.

These three are former pupils
of W. R. Bradford while he was
superintendent of schools here.

Honor guests will be the daugh-

ter of the late Mr. and Mrs. Brad-
ford and her family: Mr. and Mrs.
John Guthrie and children Jimmy
and Margaret Ann of Denver,
Colo. They will be in the receiv-
ing line at the openhouse.

Others in the receiving line
will be school trustees and their
wives: Messrs. and Mmes. T. E.
Gilbreath, Harry Moore, Fred
Parkey, Fred Hays, Dewey Sprui-
ell, Ed Clark, John Clapp jr.,
the superintendent and his wife;
Miss Ethyle Kidwell and Mr. and

They will also serve as guides
for inspection of the 3-classroom
school building.

This orchid-blend brick struc-

ture was named in honor of the
beloved and well-known educator
of Iowa Park for 33 years. In
November of last year the board
voted to name the new school the
W. R. Bradford elementary school.
A committee called on him at that
time and told him. At that time
Mr. Bradford was in ill health and
it pleased him. He said it was
one of the happiest moments of
his life.

Mr. Bradford's biography reads
like a story book. Born on a farm
near Springtown, he had to quit
school in the 5th grade because
of the death of his father. At the
age of 19 he re-entered school
in the 5th grade of a rural school.

He finished high school and
college, working his way until he
earned a master's degree.

Bradford taught in several
places before coming to Iowa Park
in 1920, where he served the local
schools until May 1953. In 1927
he went to Parhandle as superin-
tendent but returned here in 1930.

While in college he married his
boyhood sweetheart Miss Chester
Balch of Boyd. She died several
years ago and he died last Dec-
ember.

John Sibley will serve as prin-
cipal of the Iowa Park elementary
school and the new school.

Everyone is invited to attend

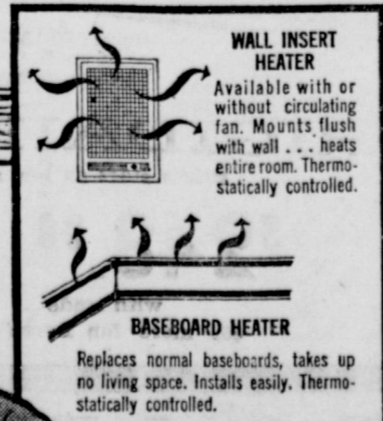

Mr. Estep is survived by his widow, three sons and two daughters. The family are members of First Baptist church.

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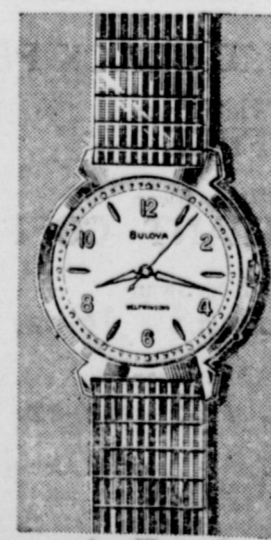


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
