## State Publication Honors Parkans

Two outstanding women of Iowa Park, Mrs. Homer Joel Blalock and Mrs. James Alfred Sewell, have been recognized for contributions to the progress and history of Texas by being listed in Texas Women of Distinction, a publication edited by Ina May McAdams of Austin, which is just off the press.

Mmes. Sewell and Blalock are leaders in club affairs in Iowa Park and also in the district. They are both active in church work and community projects.

Both are members of pioneer families of the community, their parents coming to the area in the 1880's. Married in Iowa Park, they have reared families here.

Mrs. Blalock and Mrs. Sewell are graduates of IPHS and their children are all graduates of the local school.

The book lists a biographical sketch for each woman and includes genealogical and immediate family information.

Women included represent the professions, finance, business, agriculture, politics, religion, education and culture.

## Supt. W. R. Bradford Dies

This area was grieved to learn of the death of Mr. W. R. Bradford, longtime school man of this community.

Mr. Bradford died in a Wichita Falls hospital Monday, Dec. 31, after being in and out of the hospital for the past year for treatment. He had been confined to the hospital the past three weeks.

His daughter and family Mr. and Mrs. John Guthrie and Jimmy and Margaret Ann of Denver, Colo., were visiting for the holidays and he had been allowed to go home during the day to visit with them.

Funeral service was conducted Wednesday afternoon in First Baptist church here with C. W. Walker, minister of Tenth and Broad Church of Christ officiating. The body lay in view at the church an hour before the service.

Burial was in Highland cemetery under direction of Tanner Funeral Home. Pallbearers were Taylor George, W. A. George, H. M. Mulkey, Watkins Walker, R. W. Hill, Homer Blalock, C. E. Birk.

Bradford was born in Wise county Feb. 25, 1889. He quit school while in the fifth grade to assist his family with farming. When he was 19 years of age he entered school in the fifth grade and later attended Boyd high. Here he met and later married the former Miss Chester Balch of Boyd.

Bradford was graduated from North Texas State Teachers college at Denton in 1912. He first taught at Bridgeport and served two years as principal. He and Mrs. Bradford moved to Byers



where he was superintendent for three years before coming to Iowa Park, July 1, 1920 as superintendent of schools.

In 1927 he moved to Panhandle as school superintendent but came back here in 1930 as head of the school system.

With Mr. Bradford's guidance IPHS regained its classification and affiliation. The school grew to 32 units of affiliation and from eight teachers to 32.

W. F. George high school was built in 1924. In 1940 a new elementary school was erected and a cafeteria was installed. New departments were opened in the high school: science, band, agriculture, home economics, physical education.

Bradford received the BA degree in 1927 from the University of Colorado and the master's degree in 1941 from Texas Tech.

When he resigned as superintendent of schools in 1953, he had not only served the schools but the community and county as well. He was member and past president of the Lions club, past president of the Chamber of Commerce, past president of Wichita County Schoolmasters club, past president of the Wichita County Teachers association, member of

## Tribute to a Good Friend Who Loved Young Folk

This week Iowa Park paid its final tribute to W. R. Bradford. He was a simple, unassuming man who never lost sight of his early battle for an education and who did everything in his power to help any young person to gain one.

In the Halls of Fame his name will never be listed, but in the minds and hearts of his former students, his honor will be great. Almost 1000 students passed through the doors of this city's high school as graduates during Bradford's administration. He knew each and every one of them as well as they knew themselves—sometimes better.

Their desires were his and their troubles were his. He sorrowed with them as they met with the trials and burdens of later life, and he rejoiced with them in their happiness and successes.

Many of us decided on our life's work as we attended school under him. Some of us decided what we did not want to do. Such was my case. He wanted me to be a teacher, and for several months during my last three years of high school I also served as a substitute teacher.

That experience taught me I would not be happy or satisfied as a teacher. Then he encouraged

me to write, and with his encouragement we published the only full fledged school paper the high school has ever had.

Under his tutelage boys and girls went out into the world not only versed in regular high school subjects, but imbued with many principles he had taught us without our even being aware of it—principles that in later years were to help us be better men and women and to be a credit to our town and school.

From the halls of this high school have gone many young people who have assumed duties and responsibilities of national importance and on whose shoulders has rested the responsibility of our national security.

A few weeks ago Bradford was honored by having the new school named for him. At that time I mentioned the fact in my weekly column and congratulated him. He called me on the phone and thanked me for my efforts. He never lost the common touch.

Recently a friend called me at work and said she had been to the hospital to see W. R. She said, "He talked about you as if you were his child." That's the way he felt about every child who ever attended school under him.

Many of us can remember the

times we failed to agree with him in some of his disciplinary actions—but we never once lost our respect for him. We appreciate them more as we grow older.

There have been others in our town who have served the school and served it well. But had it not been for Prof. Bradford and the magnificent job he did, there would have been little for others to do. He's the Father of our School System, and he has graduated with honors.

I would like to quote an extract from "Thanatopsis" which I used in my valedictory speech when I finished under Mr. Bradford in 1923. The lines seem fitting at this time.

*So live that when thy summons comes,  
Thou goest not like the quarry slave  
Scourged to his dungeon...  
But sustained and soothed  
By an unflinching trust  
Approach thy grave like one  
Who wraps the drapery of his  
couch about him  
And lies down to pleasant  
dreams.*

I am certain that Mr. Bradford's dreams are pleasant.

## Postage Goes Up Monday

Iowa Park post office broke a record in handling parcel post and other Christmas mail. Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath said this week he and fellow employees appreciate the people for mailing their cards and packages early. He revealed the local post office began handling Christmas mail as early as Dec. 10.

New postal rates and regulations have been posted in the by of the post office. The come effective next Monday particular interest to those use the mails for personal correspondence and occasional mailing of parcel post are the following items:

First class letters and small packages sent first class, 5 cents an ounce.

Post cards and government postal cards, 4 cents each.

Double postal cards with pre-paid reply cards, 8 cents each.

Air mail post cards, or postal cards, 6 cents each.

Air mail letters and packages, 8 cents an ounce.

Newspapers and periodical publications, 4 cents for first ounce, 1 cent each additional ounce, or the 4th class rate, whichever is the lower.

Gilbreath advises patrons of the post office to check with the window clerk about rates for parcel post and other special services.

Another item of interest is the new size regulation. Pieces of mail must not be less than 3 inches in height by 4 1/2 inches in length. Pieces that have shape other than rectangular are non-mailable.

Pieces not sealed or secured on all four edges so they can be handled by machines are not recommended.

Mr. Hale was found dead in a Mineral Wells motel Wednesday. He was enroute to Austin to visit his son and family and had checked into the motel Tuesday night.

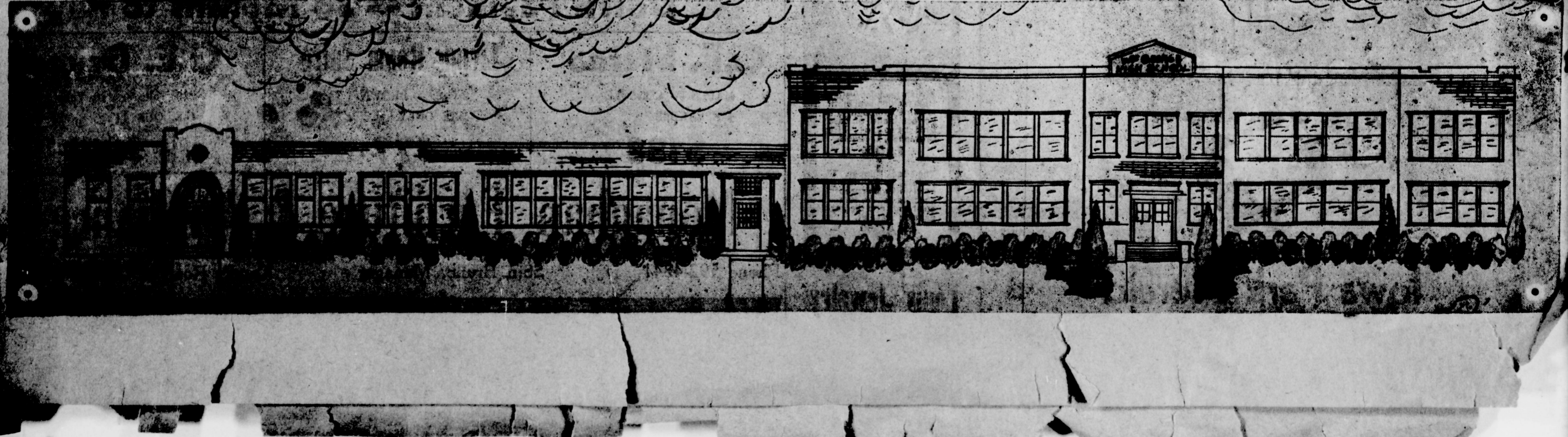
Mr. Hale resided on North Victoria in Iowa Park for several months, moving here from Wichita Falls.

### Grandma's Rocking Chair

Gee, I sure did hate to crawl out of bed this Monday after so many holidays and weekends.

Was sorely tempted to turn off the alarm or throw the clock out the window. But I reconsidered and ventured out. Felt more than ever like going back to bed when I saw the heavy frost and had to get out and warm the car up. Just wait till I retire!

Had a big job New Year's Day. Besides cooking blackeyed peas, I always take down and store the Christmas decorations. There is nothing sadder looking than the Christmas tree robbed of its presents, standing in what was once its splendor. It hurts to strip it of its glitter and glory and consign it to the trash pile.

Putting away the Christmas things, I always sit down and look again at the cards we received. Often in the rush before Christmas we look at them hurriedly, so it's fun to re-read them and see if anyone has written a note we missed.

Gave several loaves of "Dilly Bread" for Christmas, and those who ate it want the recipe. It's delicious served warmed and buttered. It may be made and frozen; brought out, sliced, buttered and warmed in its foil wrapper.

In a mixing bowl, mix one un-beaten egg, 1/4 t. soda, 1 pkg. dry yeast dissolved in 1/4 cup warm water, 1 cup cottage cheese (small curd) which has been heated to luke warm, 1 T. butter, 1 t. salt, 2 T. sugar, 2 t. dill seed, 1 T. instant onion.

Add 2 1/2 cups flour to form a soft dough. Let it rise for about 1 hour or until it has doubled its bulk. Place in casserole or loaf pan and let rise about 30 min. Bake in 350 degree oven for 40 to 50 minutes. After cooling, wrap in foil.

either — you take as many as you like.

Shooting preserves are growing by leaps and bounds. There are over 1800 of them in 44 states now, and you can get a National Directory of Shooting Preserves from the Sportsmen's Service Bureau, 250 East 43rd St., New York 17, N. Y. Some preserves are private clubs, with a wide range of membership fees, others are open to the public. Most of them provide gun dogs with expert handlers. Some offer food, lodging, even clay target practice. Believe me — try a shooting preserve for fun and fine shooting by the barrel-full!

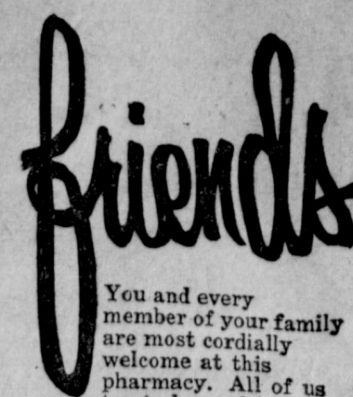

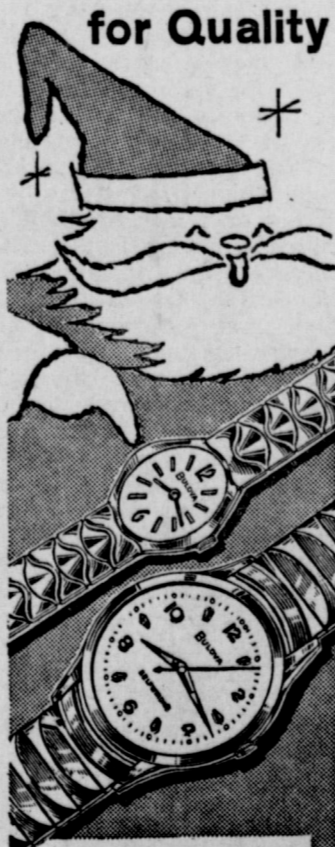

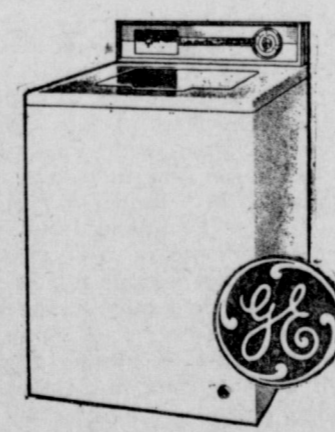

# Home Decorations Made Iowa Park Most Beautiful in North Texas

Approximately 60 homes were entered in the Christmas Outdoors Decorations contest sponsored by Iowa Park Garden club. Judging was done last Friday night by six competent women of Wichita Falls. Mrs. R. E. Van Horn was responsible for securing judges. Following the inspection, they met in the home of Mrs. Erwin Soell, club president, to choose the winners.

Mrs. R. G. Warner was chairman of the contest. Businessmen responded in marvelous way in providing the awards. There were three categories. A brief glimpse at decorations of some of the winners will attest to how hard it must have been to make final decisions.



### Homes under Eight Years

Mr. and Mrs. Joe Singer, first. The house is outlined in red and green lights and the curb and driveway featured multi-colored lights. All front windows have holly wreaths. Door decorations are a holly wreath centered with a ceramic Santa head and a gold basket filled with packages. In front of the porch stands a three-foot doll dressed in red and white striped pajamas looking toward three dimensional carolers and a snowman standing under a yard lamp.

The porch is draped with holly rope, and above each post is a cluster of pine cones tied with red felt bows, which is a Swedish custom. A gold lantern appointed with dried materials hangs between the two garage doors.

Second — Mr. and Mrs. Arch Hughes, Rita Lane. The house is outlined in red and green lights and the curb is outlined in all color lights. A blue spruce tree on the north side of the house, and the hedge are colorful with many lights.

A beautiful Christmas tree in the living room which can be seen through the large window, is a focal point of interest. On one side are a snowman, blue elephant, red reindeer; on the other side are a large red candle and poinsettia. Close to the tree are a light pole encircled with holly and a Christmas arrangement which features a red candle and kissing angels under an arch.

Mr. and Mrs. John Fecher, 1814 Farm Road, third place winners, have decorations which reflect many hours of work. A Nativity scene which has 16 near-life-size pieces is the center of interest. The garage door has "Noel" in large red letters. On either side of the door are tall lighted candy-striped candles. The lighting technique is pleasing. The house is outlined

with red lights. Front door covered with red oilcloth is framed with garlands of greenery and twinkling lights. A large white-floored tree standing in front of a window framed with twinkling red lights is decorated with red satin bells.

Fourth place winners were Mr. and Mrs. Herman Rains, 710 W. Texas. Fifth place went to Mr. and Mrs. Bart Grant, 708 Rebecca.

Vari-colored lights are used effectively on the cyclone fence, front porch and in a peach tree. Tiny lights burn in coat hanger baskets filled with greenery hanging on the front porch. Other decorations include tall candy-striped candles and plastic reindeer.

Mr. and Mrs. E. J. Shook, 306 E. Bank, were third place winners. The front door is covered with red plastic and centered with a large white key framed with greenery and lights. A light post in the yard is wrapped with red plastic and decorated with red bows. Visible from the outside is the aluminum tree in the living room, with all red ornaments. In front of the fireplace are three large graduated candles bearing red and gold balls. The mantel is decorated with greenery and red socks.

Fourth place winners were Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Thomas, 404 W. Magnolia.



### Small Homes

First place, Mr. and Mrs. Robert Lowry, 1020 Louisa. Judges commented that these decorations reflected a great deal of originality and talent. A focal point is the large red plastic Santa falling off a broken ladder into the hedge. Rudolph with his red nose stands staring at Santa. The driveway is flanked with plywood candy canes. Across the driveway is a novel green wooden tree with lights on each point. A snowman with blinking nose is standing by the tree.

Front door is covered with red oilcloth and centered with a flat aluminum tree with a base of snow bursts. The picture window shows an aluminum tree with blue ornaments on which revolving lights shine. Other lighting consists of multi-colored bulbs across the front of the house and in the shrubbery, and two floodlights in the yard.

Second place winners were Mr. and Mrs. James L. Helfrich, 412 W. Washington. High point of interest is the front door with its life-size snowman. Above the door is a spotlighted Nativity scene. A floodlight sheds the right amount of light to enable viewers to get the total effect. A tree inside the house stands in front of a window framed with lights. Judges observed that the technique of lighting was unusually good.



Mr. and Mrs. Edward Elliott, 149 Garden Valley, were third place winners. Mr. Elliott made all of his decorations, starting about two weeks before the judging. On one side of the yard is a large sleight and reindeer set. Old Santa going down the chimney is seen on the housetop, and a silver star outlined with blue lights appears above the roof.

On one side of the yard a little boy with nightcap and candle looks over the fence. On the other side a Santa Claus wreath hangs over the gate archway. Bells and cones hang on the mailbox. The house is outlined with multi-colored lights, and red and green candles glow in the front windows.

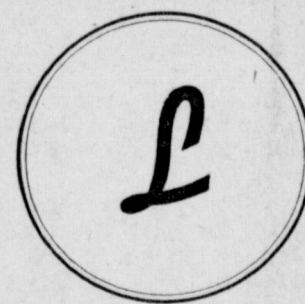
Mrs. O. E. Lochridge, organist, chose "What Child Is This?" by Greensleeves, for her musical selection.

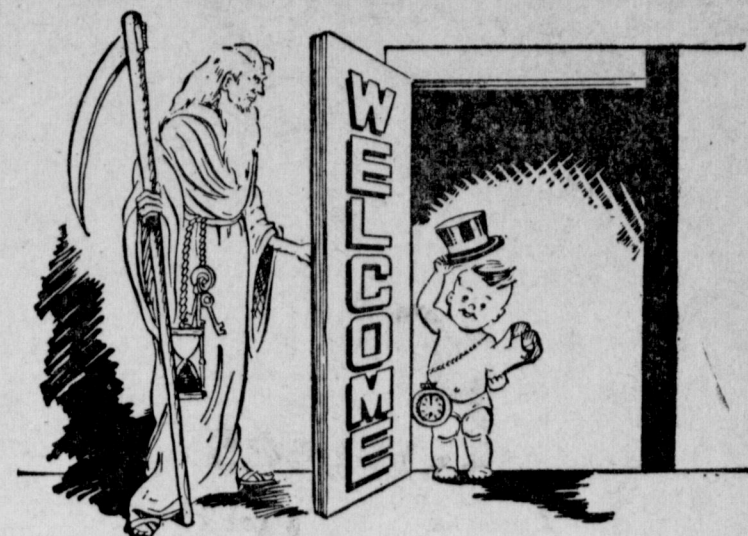

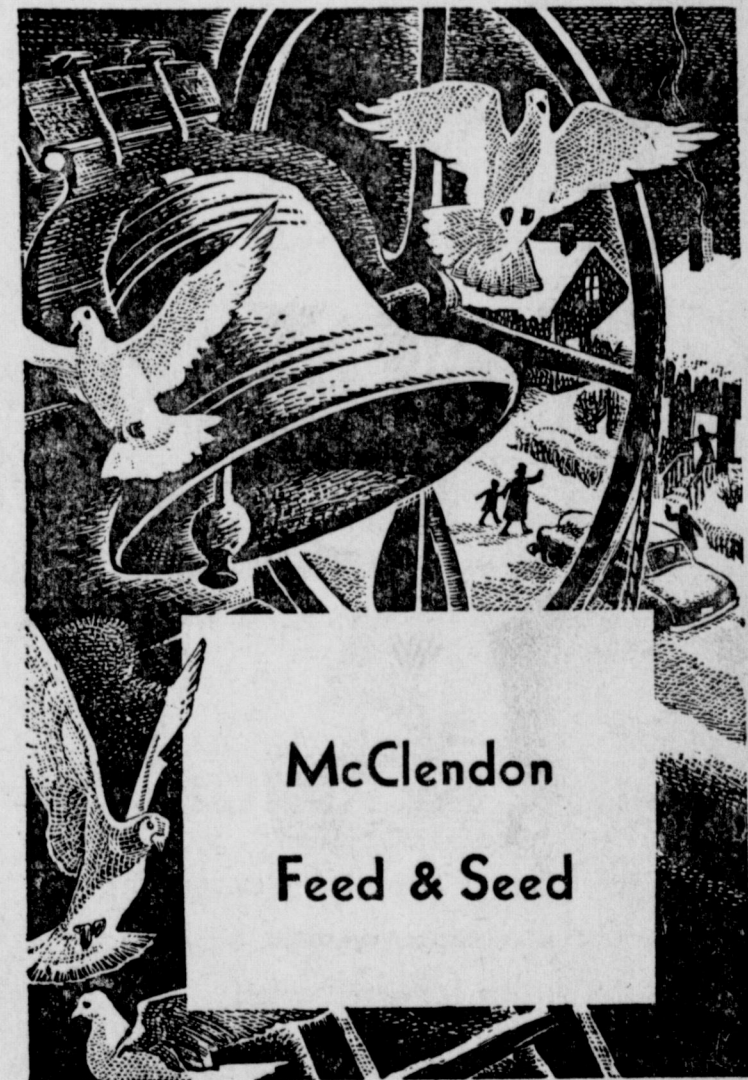

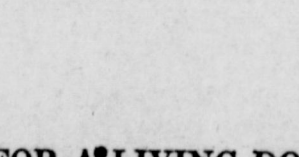
