TESCO Lowers 1st Year Electricity Rates

Wayne House, manager of Texas Electric Service Co. Iowa Park office, submitted the following offer to the City Council at its regular meeting Monday night June 10:

"Texas Electric Service Company proposes, for your approval, a voluntary downward adjustment in its residential, small general service, and large general service rates applicable in the City of Iowa Park. If you approve these rates, we will be prepared to make them effective on bills made from meter readings made on and after 30 days from the date of final approval.

"A schedule of proposed new rates has been filed with the city secretary.

"The proposed rates based on the year 1962 will result in an average reduction in residential electric service bills of 8.6 per cent, and an average reduction in commercial and industrial bills of 7.9 per cent. These percentages are overall averages. Some bills will be reduced more than the overall average per cent, some will be reduced less than the overall average, and some bills will not be affected by the proposed rates. No bills will be increased by the proposed rates.

"All residential bills for consumptions in excess of 70 kw/h will be lower on the proposed residential rate than on the present residential rate. Residential bills for consumptions of 70 kw/h or less will be unchanged by the proposed residential rate.

"The attached table gives some examples of monthly bills under the present and proposed rates.

"We respectfully ask for your consideration and approval of the proposed rates."

The council accepted the proposal.

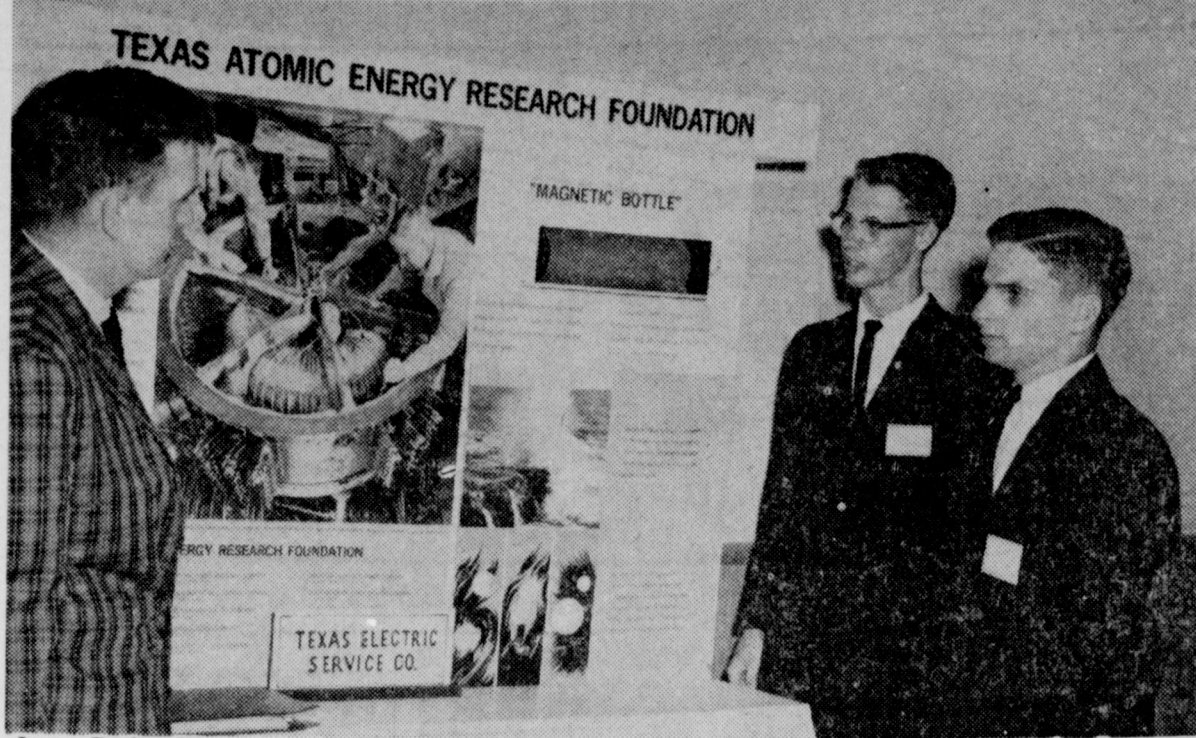

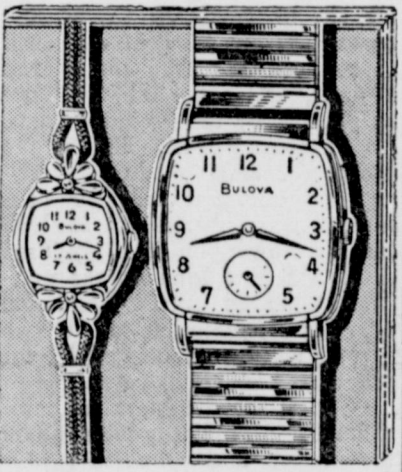

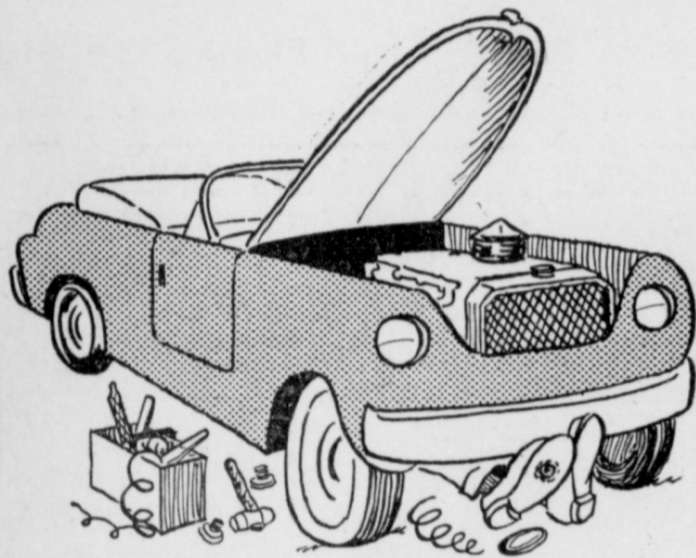

Dear Fellow Texans:

Their common enemy is starvation. Their common goal is to combat hunger all over the world. US have a major role in world food supply. Our country is one of 104 joining to study every means to help people in food-carcity countries to help themselves.

World Food Congress is looking into the problems of land reclamation and projects to get seeds, tools, farming equipment and information to those who need them in the countries without food.

Texas, with its vast food resources, its technology, its highly-capable farmers and ranchers, will find in this world effort against starvation, a means of distribution of its agricultural goods.

Texas can produce more food than it can use or market. By helping people in underdeveloped countries improve their own welfare, we improve our own. Too, underfed people are revolutionary people. They can be turned to war, to Communism, to trouble spots in the world scene. But with food, we can show them the blessings of liberty and freedom.

There are now nearly 2.3 billion persons in the world. Of these, almost 2 billion are not getting enough to eat, or them the search for food is a constant struggle, and because their diets are bad, they are subject to high rates of disease that prevent them from earning a living.

Meanwhile, the birth rate is going up rapidly, and that too is tied in with hunger in some countries. And we know that medical discoveries add years to the lives of older people. So you see the reason for the so-called population explosion. In 24 hours after you read this, population of the world will have increased by 100,000 persons, a rate never equalled in the history of the world. By this time next year, the world's population will have increased by 50 million, which is 5 times the population of Texas.

Millions of these children may never know what it is to have a square meal—as we define a meal in a nation where millions of dollars are spent by people for pill to cut down their waistlines.

Super-abundance of US food production, world food shortage, inability to get the food and the hungry people together in a stable world market, is one of the saddest failures of world history. The World Food Congress is deserving of our support.

Freedom from hunger is a ne-

cessity for a stable world in which you and I and all the rest of the people can have security and the good life.

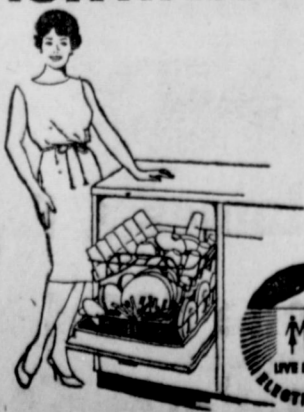
