Last Tuesday on the home diamond the Iowa Park Hawks took the measure of the Burk Bulldogs, 8-2. The game was well played and well coached.

The Hawks go to a good start and kept piling on the runs. Two Iowa Park double plays kept Burk from doing too much damage. Robert Nolen was the winning pitcher. Howard Klinkerman, Lee Roy Weiss, Charles Kwik and Nolen got timely base knocks to drive in Hawk baserunners.

Iowa Park now has 656 telephones including extensions. Seventy-five are business phones, 131 one-party and 287 two-party phones.

Of this, \$12,000 will be used for improvements at the relay station, and the remainder will be expended for cable, lines and increased number of connections for one-party service.

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Telephone Company Granted Rate Hike Effective May 16

The Iowa Park city council, with all members present, granted the Southwestern Bell Telephone company a rate increase effective May 16, in action taken Monday night during a special meeting called by Mayor R. E. Van Horn.

R. B. Peterson, district manager, and B. L. Moser, Iowa Park manager, presented the request to Iowa Park in January. They asked for a 50 per cent hike to raise net return to 7.1 per cent instead of the 3.86 per cent their records show. The new rate will allow a 6.1 per cent net return on investment.

Rate advances requested were to \$8 from \$5.50 for business service, to \$4 from \$2.75 on one-party phone service and to \$3.25 from \$2.05 on two-party phones.

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Coach Averitt to Direct Summer Play Program

At a meeting of the executive board of the Iowa Park Council of Church Women held at the Christian church Wednesday afternoon, Ted Averitt, high school coach, was elected director of the summer recreation program which is sponsored annually by the local council.

Date for the start of the eight weeks program was set for Monday, June 2, and the activities will be brought to a close Thursday, July 24.

Mrs. C. E. Birk, president, was in charge of the meeting, which was devoted to making tentative plans for the recreation program which has grown steadily since its start in 1947. Youth participation is now so heavy that the program entails careful planning and capable supervision.

By virtue of his athletic training and experience and his absorbing interest in youth, Mr. Averitt is well qualified to serve as director. Success of the program has been due largely to the efficient directors who have served. Mrs. Joe Harris, the former Miss Betty Smith was the first director of the program. Following her was George Koonce; then Miss Ethyle Kidwell and Mrs. Taylor George. Last summer Miss Kidwell and Mrs. George served as co-directors.

The executive board members voted to sponsor recreational activities on Monday, Tuesday and Thursday afternoons and nights from 4:00 to 10:00. Phases of diversion at present include story telling for the younger children, croquet, tennis, softball, volleyball, basketball and horseshoe pitching. Activities are held on the playgrounds of the Methodist church, which are also equipped with swings and see-saws for the children.

Other recreation will be offered if interest on the part of the youth justifies.

General chairmen who will assist the director were named to include Mrs. Birk, Rollins Woodall, Chester Gleason and Homer Blalock.

A general chairman from each co-operating church will be appointed by the council president to secure volunteer workers to assist on assigned weeks. Names of these chairmen will be announced later by Mrs. Birk. In view of the present set up, the eight weeks of recreation have been allotted to churches as follows:

1st—Presbyterian. 2nd—Baptist. 3rd—Methodist. 4th—Christian. 5th—Church of God. 6th—Baptist. 7th—Methodist. 8th—Presbyterian, Christian and Church of God.

Chester E. Gleason announced this week he would call a meeting in the immediate future of the Youth Advisory Council which came into existence last summer. The advisory council is composed of representative young people from the various churches who plan for the improvement and success of the program.



Which Farm Is This?



There's some confusion about the name of the farm pictured last week in our mystery farm feature, but nobody was fooled about the location of the place. Most people call it the Solon Featherston place, a few said it was the Jonah Love farm, and some named it as the home of J. D. Chastain. Apparently that's all the same place. Anyway it's on the Kamay road before you get from I.P. to Valley View.

First to call in was Roy Kimberlain. He was followed closely by Mrs. Dave Gay, Mrs. O. G. Crumpson, Carroll Duke, Mrs. C. J. Simpson, A. L. Sims, R. L. Good, Myrna Smith and Mrs. John Wesley.

We wish to thank all these readers for the interest they show in our feature. The farm this week is exceptionally distinctive and should not offer too much mystery to those who have traveled about in the Iowa Park trade area. Although it will not mystify, it's too pretty a place to be neglected. We are sure the owner will welcome visitors who appreciate the beautiful along with the useful in farm and ranch arrangements.

★ Soil Conservation

Some farmers in the irrigated valley who have recently completed conservation irrigation systems for the purpose of higher irrigation efficiency and for maximum production are Leo Knezek, J. A. Cunningham, Roy Folsom, Bob Miller and Fenton Dale.

Leo Knezek, who farms 3 miles southeast of Iowa Park, has completed a conservation irrigation system on 11 acres. Knezek states that this is the first time he has ever been able to water this field. Not only did he do a much better job of uniform distribution of water, but he also saved a lot of time and labor.

When field grading involves cuts and fills, the filled areas will settle considerably during the first year of irrigation. This usually requires some reworking after the first irrigation season. This can be done with a land plane or homemade drag. It is, therefore, desirable to plant an annual crop the first year, followed by reshaping the border before planting to another crop. Realizing this, Knezek plans to sow this field to sudan soon, then do what reshaping may be necessary this fall and sow it to alfalfa.

Bob Miller has just completed 10 acres of land leveling on his farm 4 miles southwest of Iowa Park. He plans to sprig this to coastal bermuda. He will then complete additional acres of conservation irrigation and will have his own supply source for sprigging them.

The importance of deep rooted legumes and grasses can never be overlooked or forgotten in any conservation irrigation work. Irrigation is a highly intensive practice and must be carried out as such if it is to be economically sound. The proper layout and maintenance, good operation, maintenance and improvement of the soil condition and efficient management all go together for efficient conservation irrigation. These are only some of the local factors influencing the work of the local technicians of the Soil Conservation Service.

Miller realizes the time and amount of water application are important parts of his system if it is to give good results. If one waits to irrigate by looking at the plant it is too late for maximum production. He should examine his soil at frequent intervals in order to know when to water. The application of too much water is also important due to waterlogging and the accumulation of harmful salts. Soil Conservation Service technicians are making assistance to the farmers of the Wilberger-Wichita

SCD in making these important and necessary determinations.

J. A. Cunningham has completed 6 acres and plans to put it to coastal bermuda. He is interested in long time sound land use and likes to have his borders so controlled that he may be able to keep water on them or drain it off as necessary. He will also be able to hold all rainfall, which is of great importance in leaching the harmful salts down through the soil.
