Funeral service was conducted for Franklin M. Love, 51, a life-long resident of Wichita county, Wednesday morning, Sept. 5, in First Methodist church, Wichita Falls, with Dr. Howard Hollowell, pastor, officiating. He was assisted by Rev. J. W. Poke, visiting pastor.

The body lay in view at the church one hour before the service. Burial was in Highland cemetery here with Masonic grave-site service. Pallbearers were Sheldon Ward of Midland, Otis Gay of Iowa Park, Robert Lindsay of Corpus Christi; Melvin Pursley, Alton M. Toombs, T. O. Stewart, Tom Canan and Joe Cunningham, all of Wichita Falls.

Franklin died at his home in Wichita Falls early Monday following a long illness.

Born in Iowa Park, March 7, 1911, he was son of the late Mr. and Mrs. Jonah Love, a pioneer family of the Iowa Park area.

Franklin was a member of the 1929 graduating class of IPHS. He attended Southern Methodist university, Dallas.

He was married to Miss Jimmie Pauline Summers on Sept. 2, 1939. The family had resided in Wichita Falls for many years. He was an independent oil operator.

Mr. Love was a member of the First Methodist church and of the Kay Bible class. He was a 32nd degree Mason with membership in Dundee lodge of Holiday, the Maskat Shrine and Knights Templar in Wichita Falls.

He was a member of the Oil and Gas association, the YMCA and several other civic organizations.

Even though Franklin had established his home in Wichita Falls, he never was too busy to come back and visit with classmates and friends.

Surviving are his widow and son Alan of the home; two sisters: Mrs. James W. Stewart of Iowa Park and Miss Mildred Love of Austin. He had a 2 1/2-year-old daughter Dana Kay, who died Aug. 3, 1949.

Mrs. Otis Gay of Iowa Park is a cousin of Mr. Love.

Pastor Replies to Revival Criticism

Misery loves company. I could not help but be reminded of this saying as I read last week in the Iowa Park Herald the article entitled "Pensive Notes" and signed J. Penwright Pensive. Now although a derogatory article as this one may seem by some unworthy of an answer, this minister feels it would be remiss of him if he did not request some space in the Herald to answer this person's problem.

There is no question that J. Penwright has a problem as by his own admission he acknowledges that he is not a Christian and therefore, he is a pagan and at this point a lost soul. Of course, this is obvious at the outset as no Christian, child of God, would write a destructive bit of criticism as this letter was. Truly all of us need to be critical of the work of the Church but from a constructive rather than a destructive standpoint. We harm not only the ongoing of Christ's living body, the Church, when we are destructive in our thoughts but just as important we harm ourselves as much.

Frankly, my heart goes out to the person who has from time to time been writing these letters to the Herald over the signature of J. Penwright Pensive. It goes out to him or to her, whichever the case may be, because it is obvious that such a person is filled with misery as well as cynicism, and definitely not filled with Christian joy.

Life in these days is difficult at its very best and to strive to exist in this world without the loving grace of God and His Son, Jesus Christ, makes it nearly impossible to get through. Somewhere in his subconscious J. Penwright realizes this and in his misery seeks to bring others to his level of thinking.

Long before now I should have been praying for this person and certainly will from this week on and pray, too, that those Christian readers who are looking at this article will do the same. But even as we do, brethren, let us realize that this person is merely an example of many folk who like him are pagans and standing on the outside of the living body of Jesus Christ.

Therefore, let us accept this note written last week as a disguised plea for them that they be taken up into the light of God's countenance by the prayers of those of us who call ourselves Christian, who consider ourselves children of God and are finding our purpose in life by striving to bring these others into the same joy that we know.

You see, there are many of these folks, who being moved by the devil, speak out destructively against the work of the Church under the pretense of trying to help the Church to keep from hurting itself. This is perfectly stupid!

Why, I ask, would a pagan, a non-Christian, who has never had the conviction to accept Jesus as the Christ, the Son of the living God, be sincerely worried about his Church? The truth of the matter is that such a person (and again let me say it is unfortunate but J. Penwright Pensive is not the only one in our community) is erroneously trying to raise the standard of his own miserable existence by stepping upon the honest and sincere efforts of many good Christian people.

The statement the writer made, "I have been toying seriously with Christianity for several months now" fully illustrates how misinformed many a self-centered, conceited individual is about Christianity. If there is one thing that is absolutely certain in this life it is that you don't toy around with Christianity!

Christianity is the way of life, given to man by God Himself through his only begotten Son, Jesus Christ, our Lord and Savior. J. Penwright Pensive and others who agree with his notes haven't the vaguest idea of what that really means.

He speaks about men taking up their cross rather than taking up a microphone, God help his self-righteous blindness. In the short time I have been in this community I am most aware that Iowa Park is filled with men and women, too, who every day pick up their cross (the burden of their neighbor) and move forward in life with it.

This minister acknowledges that he is most lax in his Christian duties from day to day but he will vouch that the other ministers in this community are very much filled with the Holy Spirit in moving forward the Kingdom of God here. And at least, even I try to start each day out with a prayer upon my lips that I might be an instrument of God each day rather than an instrument of the devil.

And, J. P. P. note, that if you would be an instrument of God you do not "toy" around with Christianity, you don't destroy the good things that the people of the Church are trying to do even though their efforts may be far from perfect.

Personally, I was most grateful for all the efforts put in by everyone in regard to the revival and most thankful to God for the seeming success that it was at a time we desperately need to carry forward the work of the Church in our community. The letter of J. Penwright Pensive should be a clear example to each of us Christians that there are pagans within our community who need desperately to hear the word of God. The writer of Pensive Notes may answer this letter but this writer will not answer him with a reply.

However, it will be my daily prayer that J. Penwright Pensive will presently come into the midst of a minister of our community to speak about the true nature of the Church and the need of his to accept Jesus as the Christ, son of the living God. We Christians believe in prayer. Prayer is what has brought this great spirit of revival into our community. God grant that each of us who are praying Christians and read these lines will pray for the soul of J. Penwright Pensive.

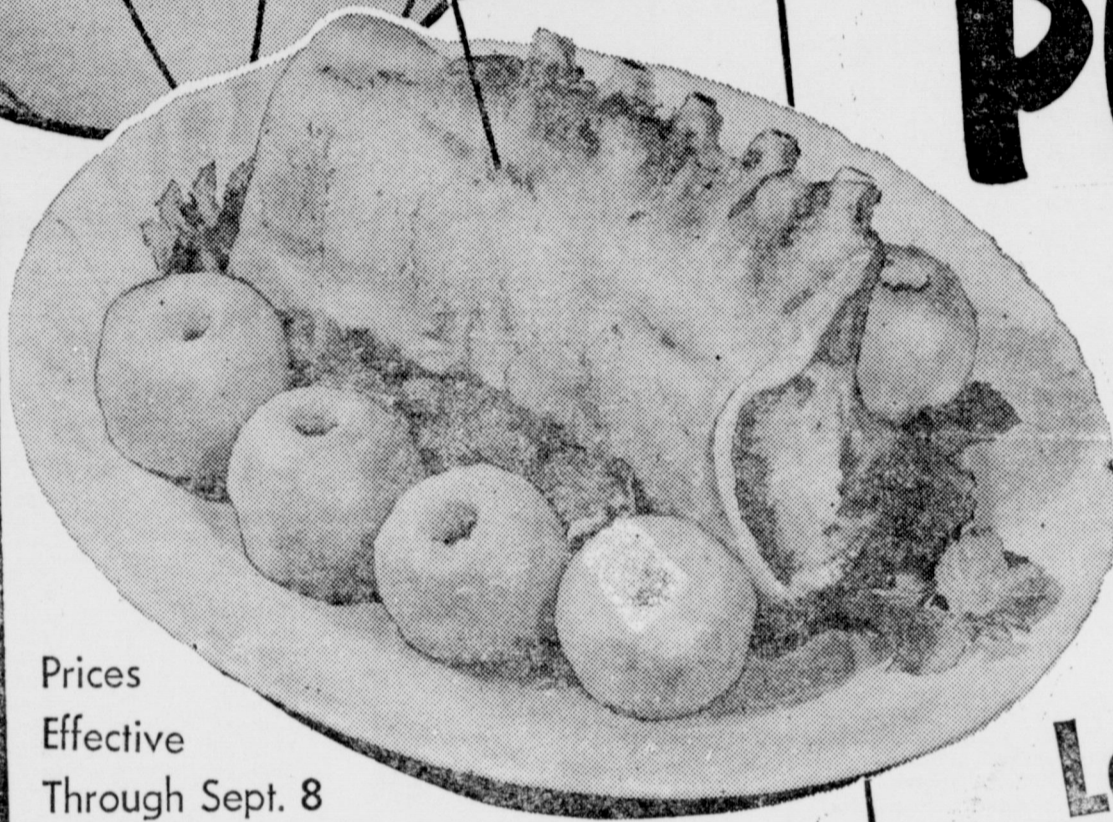

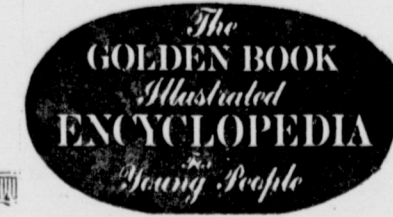

SHUCKS

Three decades ago there was hardly a Texas county that did not annually report numerous cases of smallpox, diphtheria, typhoid and scarlet fever. Today we rarely hear of these diseases. Records show that good medical and public health programs have saved the lives of many mothers and infants. But other records ask: "Have we really saved them? What about the annual home accident toll?"

Is it more terrible to die from diphtheria than from burns? In 1960 only 20 Texans died from the former while death came to 465 from the latter.

Is it more terrible to die of smallpox than from poisoning? Not a person died from smallpox in 1960, but the year's toll from accidental home poisonings totaled 74.

Is it more terrible to live with a leg crippled by poliomyelitis than with a leg, back or hip severely injured by an unnecessary home fall? During 1960 there were 14 paralytic polio deaths in the state, whereas there were 82 deaths from falls in homes.

Is it more terrible to die of typhoid fever than from accidental gunshot wounds? Typhoid took the lives of 4 Texans in 1960. Accidental gunshot wounds inflicted in Texas homes took 102 lives.

Is it more terrible to die of scarlet fever than from suffocation? Scarlet fever killed 14 while 92, mostly children under four years of age, died from suffocation in the home.

The tremendous home accident toll has received far too little attention although it is a big problem, a great menace to life and limb. Home accident injury cases totaled 193,079 of which 5,116 were of a permanent nature and 1,279 were fatal.

Death toll from diphtheria and smallpox and polio and typhoid fever and scarlet fever was 52.

Hints from Western Auto

GOOD SPORTSMANSHIP . . .

Makes the world a better place in which to live. If every hunter would follow the Golden Rule of treating his farmer friends as he himself would like to be treated, the results would surprise him. Most hunters are pretty decent fellows and will ask permission to hunt a field, but a few still have to learn this first lesson in courtesy.

Stamp out your cigarette butts and "kill" every burnt match. Fire destroys crops, game nesting areas, ruins hunting for you and everyone else, puts an end to good farmer-hunter understanding.

THE WARDEN . . .

Many hunters regard the game warden as an enemy. Sometimes it is a guilty conscience that prompts this thinking. Actually, if hunters could realize that the warden's job is to preserve and make possible the very thing they want most in the world—good hunting—a new day would dawn in sportsmanship. Let's first obey the game laws scrupulously, then do everything we can to make the life of this hard working friend of good hunting a little easier.
