**Jimmie Joy George Wins Valedictory Honor, With 96.680, Ben Huckaby Is Salutatorian**

Honor graduates for 1952 were announced this week by Supt. W. R. Bradford, as follows:  
Jimmie Joy George, valedictorian, whose average for the year's study is 96.680.  
Ben Huckaby, salutatorian, 96.638.  
Mac Lucy, girtorian, 93.952.  
Helen Birkman, historian, 93.093.  
Eddie Watson, prophet, 92.338.  
Rose Mary Grundy, will, 92.119.  
Jimmie Joy, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. Taylor George, is a native of Iowa Park, and with the exception of one summer's study in Wichita Falls, has done all her school work here. Her grades have been uniformly high all through her school career.

Besides winning valedictory honors of the class, Jimmie Joy has the distinction of completing the four year course in three years and a summer. She will graduate with 17 1/2 credits.  
Books and lessons have not shut out other activities for Jimmie Joy. She has been majorette of the Hawk band this year. Last year she played the bell lyre and contributed much to the band's marching appearance.  
In her freshman year the valedictorian was a football duchess and served on the annual staff. She is vice-president of the 1951-52 band, and was named all-around girl for the Who's Who of the current school term.  
Jimmie Joy was in the midwinter senior play and has a part in the spring play yet to be produced.  
Jimmie Joy also teaches in the primary department of the Baptist Sunday School.

Ben, son of Mr. and Mrs. George R. Huckaby, was born in Norman, Oklahoma, where he attended his first four years of school. After three years in Marlow, Okla., he moved to Iowa Park, and is completing his fifth year here.



Graduating with the eighth grade class in 1948, Ben has always maintained a high scholastic average while taking part in three major sports. He will graduate in May with 19 units of high school work and 12 letters in sports.  
In football, Huckaby has been named on the all-district team in his junior and senior years. As a track man, he has won the right to represent Iowa Park and the district four years straight in the regionals at Dallas. Last year he was regional champion 440-yard dash man and went to Austin for the state meet.  
Ben was voted most representative boy in 1951 and was selected who's who in English this year.

**Iowa Park Facing Expansion Expense**

For several meetings of the city council, representatives of the Southwestern Bell Telephone company have been present to discuss the problems confronting the company, and have presented a request for certain rate increases needed, indicated by the added cost of material and expansion of the system within the city limits of Iowa Park.  
Increases of rates are figured on the gross investment, and a net investment figured in per cent is allowed by the POC and other Federal agencies which require any municipality to be obligated to grant a fair return on money invested. The council has had this situation under advisement for approximately three months and this question must be settled before May 1, 1952.  
It is realized by the mayor and the city council that we cannot have the best of service offered by a utility company without granting sufficient rates to justify the expansion that is before us now.  
The expansion of building homes constitutes an outlay of expenditures never before encountered or anticipated by the city. The rate increases asked for by the utility companies servicing our city is an indication of the problems now before the city in its own budget problems because of the necessary expansion of sewer and water lines within the city limits.  
Since this increase in rates will affect the entire citizenship of Iowa Park, the added service will be an inducement for people to purchase homes and businesses and make the Town of Friendly Living a better place in which to live.  
The service heretofore offered by the Southwestern Bell Telephone company in installing and maintaining a dial system in a city of this size, has been and will in the future be, of immeasurable value to the citizens of Iowa Park during times of emergency and conditions existing by labor disputes whereby the service of a manual system would be disrupted.  
The mayor and city council ask your indulgence and co-operation on the problems such as this that are before us now. Watch this column for further articles and information that might be of interest to the citizens of Iowa Park.

Mrs. Donald Hill, chairman, with the aid of Mrs. A. L. Reed and Mrs. Joe Baxter, will use the same procedure for the north side of town.  
E. E. Wallis and Bill Sawyer are assisting Mr. Sewell in connection with the hauling of trash.
