**New City Hall  
To Cost \$75,000**

Talk of a new City Hall has now gone beyond the talk stage, with action to follow soon. The City Council has authorized a contract with First of Texas corporation of San Antonio, to handle

a bond issue for \$75,000 to be used for construction of a new City Hall and Fire Station.

Plans call for a city jail, living quarters for a paid fireman, assembly room with seating capacity for 50 persons, firemen's recreation room, Chamber of Commerce office, office space for the police department, three extra offices for future expansion, fire truck storage to accommodate four trucks, storage room for equipment.

Plans call for incorporating all the present building in the new structure. The entire building will have a central heating and air-conditioning system.

In discussing the plans this week Mayor Bert Van Horn pointed out that the bond issue will not call for raising the present tax rate. Funds to retire the bonds are expected to come from increasing revenue because of the constant growth of Our Town.

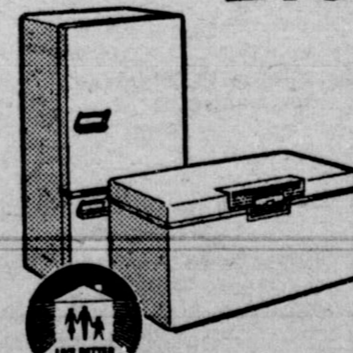

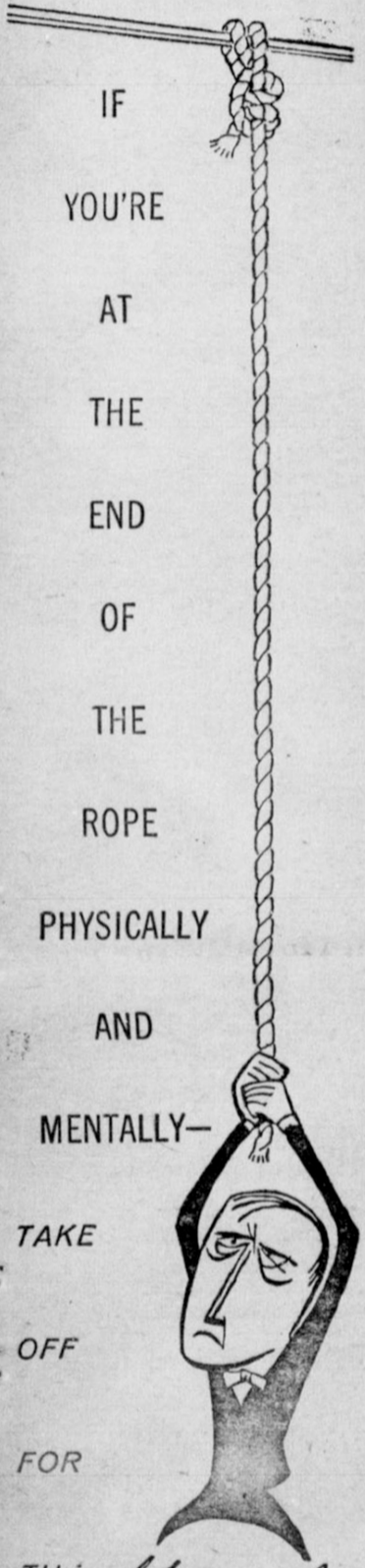

April issue of the Quarter Horse Journal had a feature article on "Leading Jockeys" which included a short biography of Kenneth Brittain, son of Mr. and Mrs. E. E. Brittain of Iowa Park. The portion devoted to Kenneth follows.  
 Kenneth Brittain, who resides at Iowa Park, Texas, recalls that he won his first race at the age of 11 years. This original win happened on a Quarter Horse.  
 The first recognized win recorded by Kenneth was on She'll Go at Kremmling, Colo. The horse was owned by Hank Wilson and trained by Walter Merrick.  
 Kenneth, a native of Apache, Okla., is self-employed. Riding below his normal weight of 120 pounds, he follows Southwestern tracks. His favorite race course is Ruidoso Downs "because Ruidoso Quarter racing is getting better each year and I think it will soon be the Capitol of Quarter Horse Racing."  
 Vanetta Deeg by Vandy, out of Garrett's Miss Pawhuska by Leo, is Kenneth's choice as the best Quarter Horse he has ridden to date.  
 His greatest thrill in Quarter racing came when he set a new world record for two-year-olds on Burke's Bars. "This was the best two-year-old horse I ever rode and I never lost a race on her," Kenneth declared.

**Plan Ahead For Carefree Trip**

**PART OF THE FUN** of a vacation trip is planning it. Frequently, however, too much time is spent pouring over maps and tour books, while certain annoying—but important—details are left for the last minute.

And, in the final rush to "get going," some of these details are bound to be neglected. A handy checklist of such items has been prepared by AAA. Using it, you'll eliminate any frantic worries when you're 500 miles from home about whether you left the stove on or let the car insurance lapse.  
1. First, prepare a list of things to do around the house before you leave. Stop delivery of newspapers and milk, and shut off all home utilities. Arrange for someone to take care of your pets and plants and to pick up your mail. Leave a forwarding address if you plan to be gone any length of time.  
2. Discourage rodents by asking someone to mow your lawn periodically so that your house looks "lived in." Lock all windows and leave the shades only partly drawn. Notify neighbors and the police that you will be away.  
3. Have your car thoroughly checked. Are brakes and tires safe? How about the electrical, cooling and fuel systems, as well as the motor, transmission and steering mechanism? It's a good idea, too, to have the oil changed and wheel bearings, transmission and differential lubricated.  
4. Do you have emergency equipment—tool kit, good spare tire, tire jack, tire wrench, pliers and flashlight? How about insurance? Is your car covered for theft, collision, property damage and public liability?  
5. Before leaving, map your itinerary carefully. Limit each day's driving to about 400 miles. Check ahead on accommodations. Schedule early stops for the evening.  
6. Be sure to take your car registration and your driver's license. And don't forget camera and film, first aid kit, thermos bottle, sunglasses and other personal effects. Arrange your luggage in the trunk so that the bags you'll be needing most frequently are easily accessible.  
Finally, start off on the right foot: use a light foot on the accelerator.
