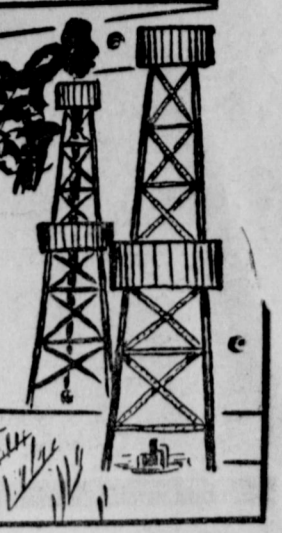

On cultivated land where terraces are needed to combat erosion and no pasture land is handy to empty terrace water onto, establishment of a permanent waterway becomes necessary, says W. F. Fleming, SCS technician of Iowa Park.

Waterways should be established well in advance of terrace construction to allow seeded grass time to develop good root system. Indetermining the size of a waterway, it must carry peak runoff from rain of an intensity to be expected in 10 years without overflowing. It must be so wide the water will not scour the soil out of the bottom.

Most desirable location for a waterway is down a natural course in the field. This requires less shaping and top soil removal, and establishment of grass is easier. Where waterways are to be established other than a natural draw, sufficient width should be used to prevent the necessity of excavating below top soil.

Ordinarily waterways should be from 50 to 65 feet wide with total depth of approximately one foot. Disposal should be onto an area protected by good growth of vegetation.

SCS technicians are available to assist farmers in locating, designing, constructing, seeding or sodding waterways.

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
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

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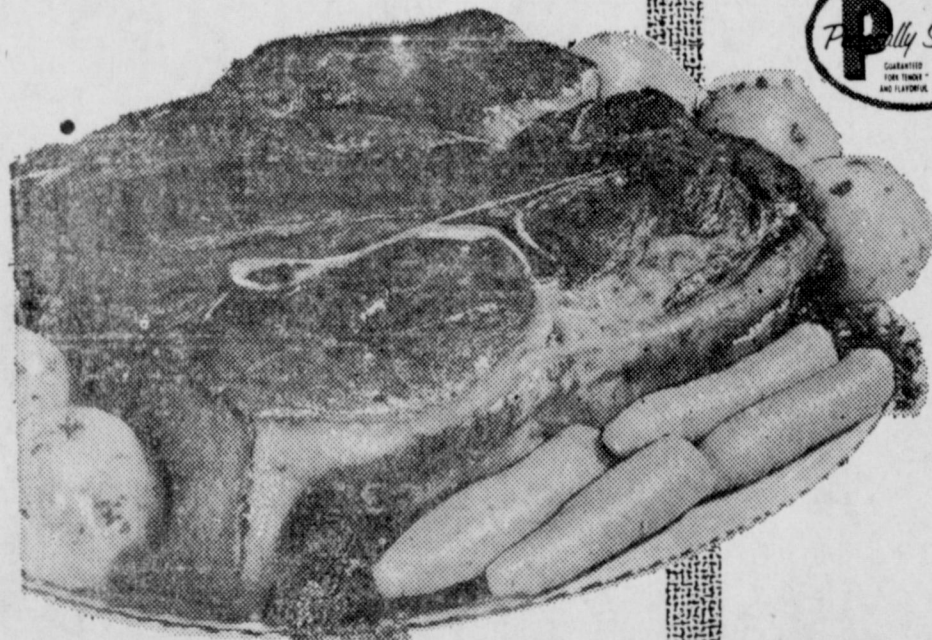

Christ and a Faith for Our Day

Editor of the Herald has been kind enough to ask me to write a monthly article for the paper, at which invitation he knew I would leap. It is easy for the person studying to lose close contact with those real people and things that go on leading their lives in the world of normality. When the student is on a misty isle, plopped into the historic and almost legendary city of Edinburgh, it would be easy to plan a disappearance from the human race.

Aside from any possible value then, that these articles will have for the readers, they certainly will be of great benefit to the author, who will covet the opportunity to keep alive a contact with the "land of the living" in America, of which of course there is no better example than Iowa Park! You will forgive any self-indulgence, then, I hope.

Edinburgh is the continuing mecca of the Scottish people, although since 1707 Scotland has been part of Britain. Although representatives sit at Westminster in London in the House of Commons, the Scots do not forget that Edinburgh is their "capital."

Here is where the law and the church have their centers. Here is where truly incredible libraries bespeak the heritage of learning that is written into every chapter of Scottish history since the days of the Reformation.

As I look out my study window, I peer right up at the castle, the predominant feature of the whole city. From the castle you can walk "The Royal Mile" to the Palace of Holyroodhouse—where kings and queens centuries ago carried on strange and fas-

cinating intrigues. You'll walk past the Heart of Midlothian—which Scott made famous in his novel. All you'll see now is a heart outlined in the brick of the street, but it is here where the tax house stood two centuries ago in the heart of Lothian county.

If you look up from the pavement you find you are standing before St. Giles, the High Kirk of the Church of Scotland. It is from here that John Knox held forth during the turbulent years of the Scottish Reformation (1550's and 60's). And several blocks down you'll come to Knox's House, from which he would often preach to citizens gathered in the street. Then finally down to the Palace, that place where Mary, Queen of Scots lived her sad life during these same rough days.

And all up and down the Royal Mile: shops. Dozens and scores of little shops, busily selling and trading. Butcher shop, the green vegetable shop, the candy shop, the tobacco shop, the chemist's (drug store, Mr. Settle and Mr. Hays), and more and more; and ah yes, the bagpipe shop!

The people? They are just people: industrious people, and some not so industrious. Friendly?—yes. Happy with Americans?—well, that just depends on whom you meet. We can't deny that our "image is a bit blurred. People don't really seem to know what to make of most Americans. Are we really like the folk they see in movies and television?

Are we really so drunk with freedom that we can forget that a people have a history and a tradition? This is what most Europeans seem to want to know

of us. Sometimes they are simply wondering what we're up to: unfortunately that is a question we haven't begun to answer ourselves. I want, in the future, to look at some of the different aspects of life here, and perhaps draw some comparisons with "back home." Especially will we be interested in the political, economic, cultural and church life of these people called Scottish. But I haven't forgotten my calling, and just so this article will seem to have something to do with our title, let me give you "the thought for the day," as some people like to do: "An atheist is a person with no invisible means of support!"
