Falls.





Customs of Iran told by Local Air Force Couple

S-Sgt. and Mrs. Billy Gene House and children Gary, Alan and Cynthia are glad to be home in Iowa Park following a two-year stay in Tehran, Iran, where he was connected with the Military Assistance Advisory Group USAF.

Billy Gene is son of Mr. and Mrs. W. N. House. He was graduated from IPHS before entering the air force.

Mrs. House is daughter of Rev. and Mrs. M. C. Yeargan of Sulphur. Yeargan was formerly pastor of Iowa Park Presbyterian church and Mrs. Yeargan was secretary-manager of the Chamber of Commerce. Cecelia is a graduate of Austin college, Sherman.

The couple knew each other casually here and their romance started when they met in Paris while Billy Gene was stationed in Fontainebleau, France, with the Headquarters Allied Forces of Central Europe, and the former Miss Yeargan was touring Europe. They were married several months later in Sulphur.

Sgt. and Mrs. House and children reached Tehran in Dec. of 1960. They took up residence in a small two-story compound, occupying the lower floor while the landlord and family lived above. The compound was surrounded by a 12-foot wall it was heated with kerosene and had electricity and running water.

To people in the southern part of the city running water is a luxury. Water for household purposes is secured from ditches in the streets.

Most Tehran buildings are flat-roofed; beautiful mosques with dome-shaped mosaics are the exception.

In Tehran the gendarmerie, a military type police force, is used. It is not unusual for passers-by to stop and tip the gendarmes on duty with bakhshesh. This is especially noticeable on New Year which begins March 21. Holidays usually commemorated sad events. About this time of year the natives observe a month of fasting when they do not eat during daytime. It is permissible for them to eat at night. Pork is never on the natives' diet, and Americans are invited to hunt wild boars because they are destructive to garden and field crops.

Sgt. and Mrs. House did not take their car to Iran but were furnished a three-quarter-ton truck and an Iranian chauffeur. His salary was only a few rials per month, but the Houses gave him extra money for after-work

men were and sat in a chair in center of the room. Chair was in front of a rug on which there were a mirror, candles, dishes of food, honey, eggs and a loaf of sugar. Bride was attired in waltz-length gown of white lace over white satin.

Holy Man was in an adjoining room with the men. He read from the Koran and the bride followed along with her copy. Eventually the groom entered and sat down beside the bride. Purpose of the mirror is for the bride to see the groom.

After he was seated, sisters and cousins of bride held a cloth over her head and crumbled the sugar upon it. Bride ate a spoonful of honey to signify her words would be sweet. When the Mullah finished his words, men entered the room and congratulated newlyweds. Men cry at weddings but women are supposed to be less emotional.

Large hosts of friends come to wedding reception which starts at sundown and continues until midnight.

In Tehran a man can divorce his wife by telling her three times "I divorce thee" and then "Now go."

While the Houses were in Tehran their landlord died. It is the custom to bury the dead quickly with only men attending last rites. Mrs. House went up to express sympathy and found all furniture had been removed from the room where guests were received. All members of the family were clad in black and women were shoeless. People sat on a rug and drank black coffee instead of the usual tea. Relatives of deceased wore black and were in mourning 40 days.

When the earthquake hit last September, the Houses felt the tremors. Billy Gene had to go to Athens and Paris the next day. While he was gone a false alarm was sounded and people sat on rugs in streets to avoid getting service. He accompanied Cecelia on shopping trips and helped her bargain with the merchants.

The couple attended a Moslem wedding in Tehran and rank it as a memorable experience. The bride was daughter of their landlord. Her marriage was unusual in that she and the groom had been permitted to date, chaperoned, for about two months. In most cases the bride does not see her intended husband before the ceremony.

Marriage took place in home of bride's parents at mid-afternoon. There were no feminine at-

tendants but Mrs. House was permitted to stand close to the bride. There was no music. The bride entered the room where only whit by debris. Cecelia and the children sat outside until the all-clear signal was given.

Mrs. House was pianist and Sunday school teacher in the interdenominational church there.

Among souvenirs brought back are: a brass samovar intricately designed and carved metal, two oil painting by an Armenian, a lovely hand-woven dinner cloth, donkey bells, enamel-over-copper vase, olive-wood vase, a camel saddle from Beirut, hand-stamped cloth made in Isfahan featuring Persepolis design.

Billy Gene recently received the air force commendation medal for his work in Iran.



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

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
