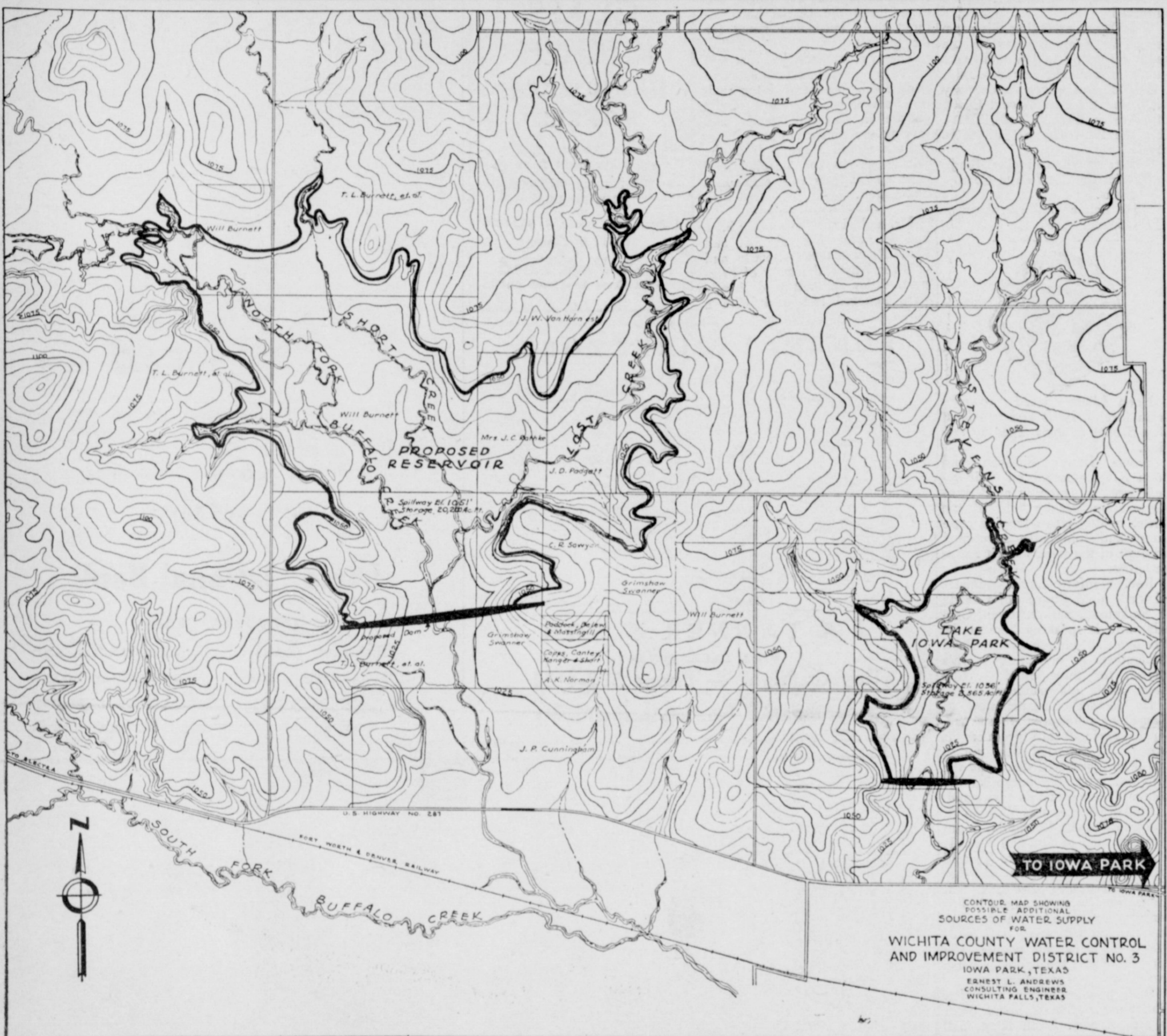




# Iowa Park Herald

On August 11 the qualified, taxpaying voters residing in Iowa Park and in Water District No. 3 will vote on the proposition of an additional water supply.

Present supply — Lake Iowa Park and the old City Lake—was built to furnish good water for a town of about 3,000 persons.

Board of directors of the water district have been considering a possible source of additional water for several years. Of the various sites considered it is believed the North Fork of Buffalo Creek about five miles northwest of town offers the best possibilities.

Water District started action on the North Fork of Buffalo in 1958 and has held prior rights on this site almost continuously ever since.

In 1961, due to the influx of new residents and additional housing being constructed, the present board took action to see if the people of Iowa Park were desirous of assuring themselves an adequate supply of fresh water.

Studies and surveys of the site have been made, probable costs determined and sale of bonds to finance the project have been made. It is the belief of the City Council of Iowa Park and of the Directors of Water District No. 3 that additional supply of good water is essential for the growth and well being of Iowa Park.

It has been due only to timely rainfall in the past two summers that there has been adequate water supply. The eight-inch line between the present lake and the City water plant would be unable to carry sufficient water if there were a long dry, hot summer. Plans for the new water supply also include construction of a new 16-inch line from the proposed lake which could also be tied in

with the present water supply of Lake Iowa Park.

The \$700,000 bond issue would be used to pay the \$60,000 still outstanding of the original \$200,000 voted in 1949 for construction of present facilities. It is believed that with payment for water at a rate agreed on tentatively between the City and the District, the obligations for interest and amortization of the new bond issue could be met without an increase in the City water rates to those living within the City, and without an increase in the tax rate of the District.

After retirement of \$6,000 of the present \$66,000 now outstanding the Water District will have a cash balance of approximately \$29,999 in addition to the money derived from the sale of new bonds. It is believed this reserve will be useful in meeting obligations during the near term of the project.

The new bonds are to run for a period of 33 years unless paid before that time. After 15 years the district would have the option to renegotiate the interest rate in case the rate is lower at that time. Average rate on the new bonds would be in the neighborhood of 4.25 per cent, initially.

To answer the questions asked by an advertiser in the July 19 edition of the Iowa Park Herald:

a. At spillway elevation of 1051 feet above sea level the lake would cover approximately 1,810 acres and would impound 20,200 acre feet of water when full. Average depth would be 11.1 feet, maximum depth 31 feet.

At 1045 feet above sea level, or six feet below spillway level, there would be 11,195 acre feet of storage.

b. As to the number of years this lake would supply the City at its present rate of growth is

problematical. Sufficient to say, that if there is not an adequate supply of good water, growth will stop.

The proposed lake will have a capacity of more than seven times that of Lake Iowa Park. Drainage area of the proposed lake is 21,000 acres, or 32.8 square miles as against 5,500 acres for Lake Iowa Park. It could be expected to produce annually 3,045 acre feet of water, after allowing for estimated 2,205 acre feet annual evaporation loss.

It is not the desire or intent of the Board of Directors of the Water District to sell the people of Iowa Park "a bill of goods," but only to do what they believe is their duty, to provide the City with an adequate supply of good water.

Iowa Park must meet its water problem now, according to members of Wichita County Water Control and Improvement District No. 3, L. C. Hill, president, said this week.

The following information has been presented to support the board's recommendation for a new lake:

Mr. Hill further stated that the Water Board has considered several plans as a water supply for Iowa Park and after due consideration of the facts are recommending this plan and are urging the citizens to vote August 11 for water and Iowa Park.

Mrs. Robert Bryan and helpers will direct kindergarten pupils through learning by stories, music, activities and Bible verses as they study "We Have a Bible."

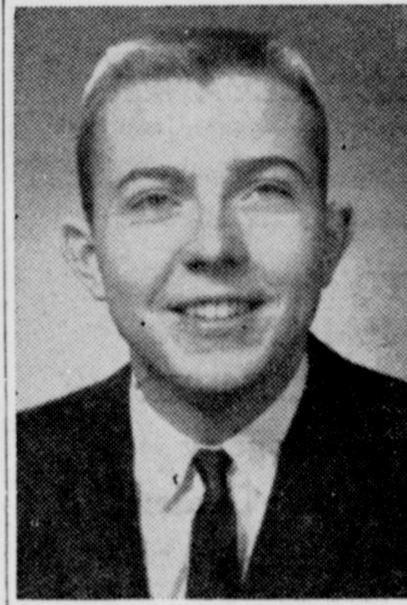

## Christ and a Faith for Our Day

There is always much talk by ministers about the Christian Witness. It is the thing Christians are supposed to do simply because they are Christians. We speak of witnessing to the Faith, witnessing to Christ, witnessing to the Gospel—and so forth. But really, when all is said, what actually does it mean: The Christian Witness?

Authorities in human communications tell us there are three bases of communication among human beings. First there are common words and symbols. When people share the same symbols and words and they signify the same things, then there is possibility for communication.

But this really is impossible in the final analysis for the Christian Witness. How can you speak of the things of the Faith if they find no relation in the common vocabulary of the person to whom you are speaking (in this case the non-Christian)? It's like trying to describe a rainbow to a person who has always been unseeing. How would you do it? "Well, a rainbow is long and curved, like a well; well, it has many flashing and splashing colors, like red, green—well." You see the difficulty in describing a rainbow to a person who has never seen.

Second there is in the world of communication a common referent, in other words a common experience. If people have shared the same experience then there is the possibility for communication. But here again we are stumped. The non-Christian has not had the same experience as the Christian; otherwise the non-Christian would also be a Christian. It is extremely difficult, yes impossible, really to communicate our relation to Jesus Christ with a person who has had no such relation or experience.

What then is left? What IS the Christian Witness? Well, there is the third form of communication, and that is *rapport*. Rapport ultimately is the only possibility. Rapport is what we are. Or perhaps to put it a little better, whose we are. This is a revelation of our real selves. And this does not mean that we must be perfect; none of us could live up to that. By our lives we communicate to those about us that we are not living our lives for ourselves. And when we do sin and make mistakes we admit them, we confess the fact that we are not God ourselves!

It is by this that a non-Christian says to himself, "That person has something. I don't know what it is, but I want it." And the door has been opened for real communication and real witness.

And so it is by what we are that we convey whose we are; in this way we begin to lead others along the narrow and tricky but

glorious road of Christian faith. Turn then with me to the words of St. Matthew: "You are the light of the world. A city set on a hill cannot be hid. Nor do men light a lamp and put it under a bushel, but on a stand, and it gives light to all in the house. Let your light so shine before men, that they may see your good works and give glory to your Father who is in heaven."
