Miss Sarah Carol Thomas and Malcolm Tim Dobbins were married in a candlelight ceremony at 8:00 p.m. Saturday, June 9, in First Baptist church. Rev. Homer Thompson, pastor, performed the double-ring ceremony.

Carol is daughter of Mr. and Mrs. J. W. Thomas of Iowa Park and Tim is son of Dr. and Mrs. T. M. Dobbins of Wichita Falls.

Vows were recited in a white satin-covered space centered with a sunburst arrangement of white stock flanked by identical arrangements. Candle trees holding lighted cathedral candles stood at either side of the nuptial area. In the choir loft votive lights in spiral candelabra ornamented with plaques of white stock and greenery provided illumination.

Potted palms completed decorations in the choir loft. The rail was draped with white satin and featured garlands of salal greenery roping. Church pews were marked with votive lights and miniature arrangements of white stock and greenery.

Marcos, vocalist, and Mrs. O. E. Lochridge, organist, presented traditional wedding music.

The bride, given in marriage by her father, wore an original gown of peou de soie accented with re-embroidered lace. Designed with dome silhouette, it featured sweetheart neckline and long fitted sleeves that tapered to points over the hands. The basque bodice was fastened at back with tiny French buttons.

The dome skirt was traced in floral design with appliques of re-embroidered lace. Inverted pleats added fullness at the side toward the back. The chapel-length train was divided at the sides of the skirt, giving the effect of two separate trains. From a wide Dior bow at the deep pointed waistline in back twin panels extended into the train. The bride's waist-length veil of illusion fell in tiers from a queen's crown of seed pearls. She carried a cascade bouquet of white orchids and stephanotis.

Iowa Park school board met Tuesday night with John Clapp jr., president, directing proceedings. Plans were made for bids on a new elementary school to be opened and let Tuesday, June 26, at 4:00 p.m.

The building will cost in the neighborhood of \$200,000 and is to be located in the south part of town. Property on South Texowa was purchased from Ruben Parish.

The structure will have eight classrooms, a cafeteria and a boiler room large enough to care for another wing if it should become necessary to add it.

Work will begin on the building as soon as possible after the contract is made, so it can be used by mid-term of next school year.

The board also voted to redo completely the library and science department with all new furniture and new equipment. Enlargement of the football field seating is already underway.

Present for the meeting Tuesday were Dewey Spruill, Stanley Williamson, Harry Moore, T. E. Gilbreath, Clapp and Supt. Keith Swim.

Clapp has announced plans for the building are on file in Swim's office and bidders are invited to study them.

Plan to attend and have lots of fun, besides donating to a good cause.

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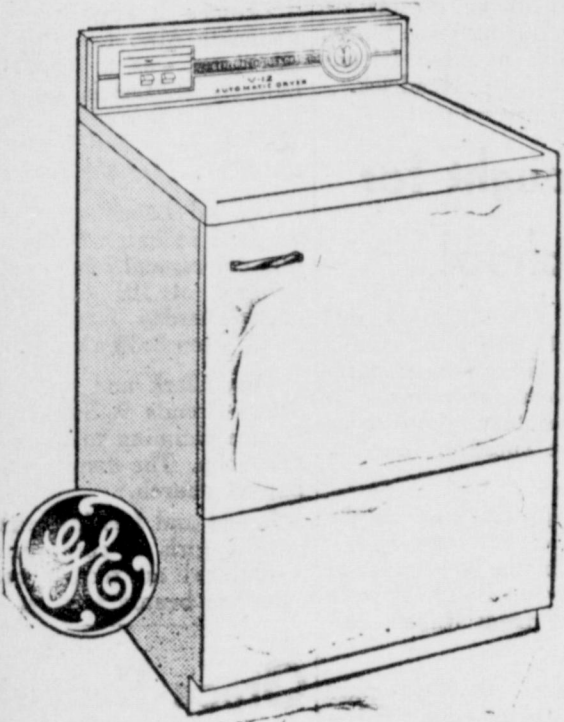
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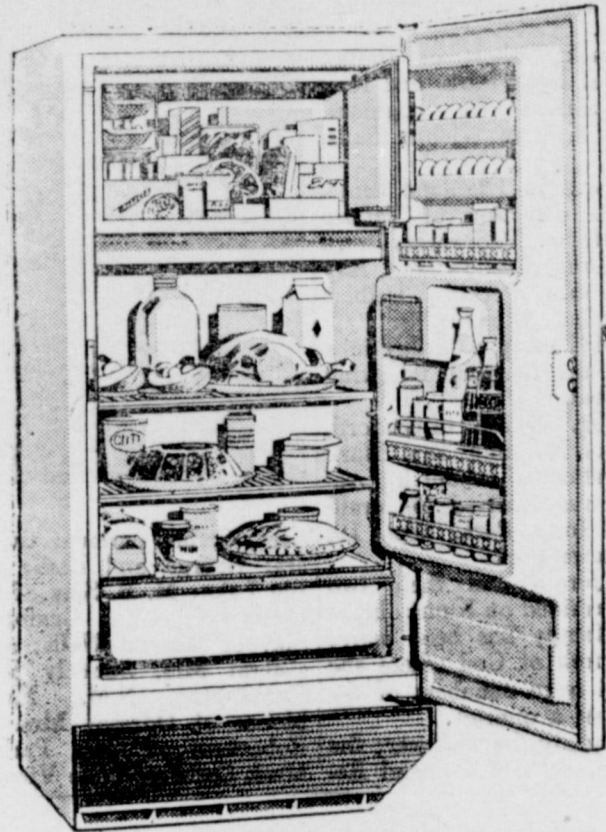

Last week our roving reporter dropped in to inspect a new millinery supply shop in Wichita Falls, and got the following information. Forgive the first person report, but it worked out best that way.

I am Mrs. F. E. Warfield, jr., housewife. My friends call me Francine. I enjoy all the arts of homemaking—cooking, sewing—and it was through this interest that I first became involved in hat making. I have always liked beautiful and unusual hats. By learning to make my own I could have more and better hats.

When my mother and sisters learned of my hobby, all wanted custom made hats. Consequently for several years I have been a "hatter" to all the female members of the family. It is a fascinating pastime because there is always something new—a new material or a new style with which to experiment.

Last fall several friends asked me to teach them to make hats. Interest grew and number of students increased so we conducted two classes a week. Most of the ladies became so fascinated they continued past the number of sessions we originally scheduled. It was difficult to find sufficient variety in supplies, and I eventually made several trips to Dallas where I tried to make selections I thought each hatmaker would like. When more asked me to start new classes, I decided to expand and obtain a complete line of supplies so my friends can make their own selections during their instruction.

For the friends who occasionally have me make a hat specifically for them or to remake an old hat, the choice is almost unlimited as to type of material or trim to complete a beautiful chapau.

I would like to invite the women of the area to come by or call whenever they have need of a new hat, an old one made like new, or lessons to learn how to fashion their own creations. At FRANCINE'S they will find the only complete selection in north central Texas.

You can see just how far my hobby has grown. In addition to my family and hats, I find many varied activities to occupy my time. For the first time in 15 years I am not a member of any PTA. I enjoy gardening—both growing things and flower arranging. As an active member of University Park Garden club, I have served in several capacities such as the annual Christmas home decorating contest and as president of the club for the 1960-61 club year.

I am a member of Wichita Falls Garden club and just served as chairman of one of the flower arranging study groups. I belong to Woman's Forum. My family are members of the Church of Christ and attend the Faith Village con-

gregation. I share an active interest in one of my husband's hobbies—flying. Although I have not completed my training yet, I did solo last summer. I love to fly almost as much as I love pretty hats.

My interest in hat making is shared by the family. My husband Cotton assists in many ways especially in construction of unusual blocks. His latest handiwork was two old-fashioned hat trees to display my hats. Our 20-year-old son Frank has just completed his sophomore year in Williams college, Williamstown, Mass. Although he is away during the school year, he does his bit by suggesting new ideas and passing along his observations as to trends in the East. A big girl, my pretty 15-year-old blonde Patricia is an excellent model for my creations and assists with the chores of keeping shop. Even Dutchess, our 8-year-old Dachshund gets into the act by greeting callers at our door, 4503 Wynwood in Wichita Falls.

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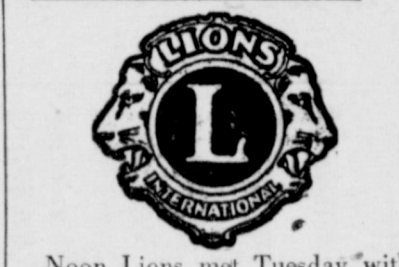

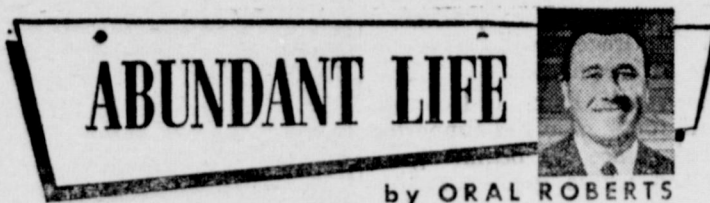

• FEAR IS A TERRIBLE THING •

A little girl woke up from a nightmare, screaming from her terror and fear. "Oh, help me, save me! Two big bears are going to get me!" she cried.

Her parents rushed into her room to try and calm her, but no amount of reassurance and comfort could soothe the little girl. She had become thoroughly terrified and neither dad's strong arms around her nor mother's loving words could convince her that two ferocious bears were not about to get her. Her parents tried every way they knew to calm her, and still she kept screaming, "Oh, help me. The bears are about to get me."

But her older brother came to the rescue. "What's wrong, Sis?" he asked.

"The bears are about to get me," sobbed the little girl.

"Where are they?"

"Over in that corner," she pointed.

Pulling an imaginary revolver from his pajama pocket, her brother shouted, "Bang, bang. I got both of them!"

The next time you are afraid and the world seems to be closing in around you, remember that fear does not come from God. God has given you power to overcome fear, love to lift you and a sound mind to deal with your problems. His words to you are, "Fear not, only believe."

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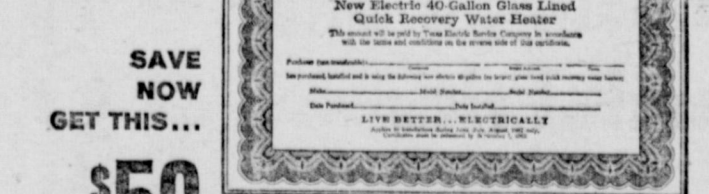
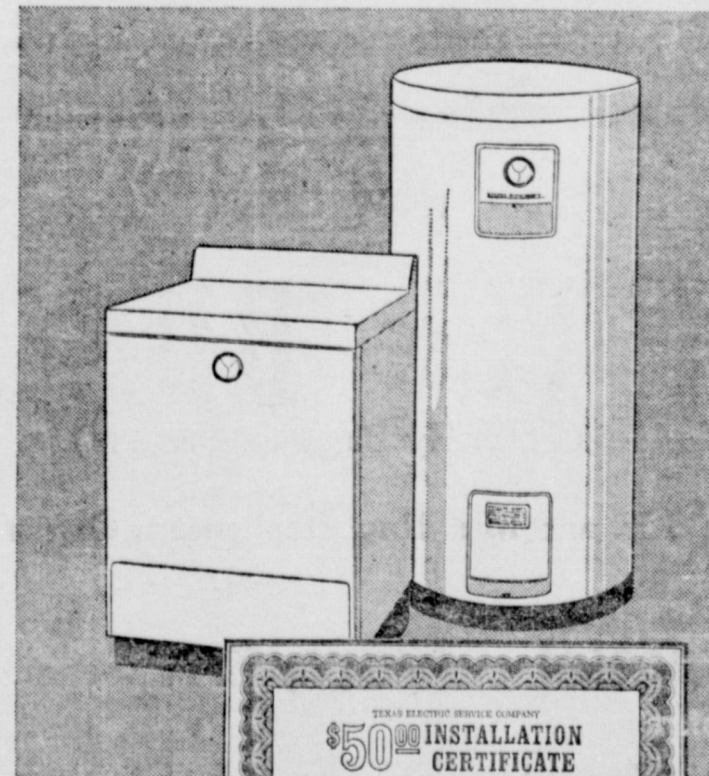
