Tigers 38

Starting with a touchdown and closing with a touchdown the Tigers of Jack county knocked the high flying Hawks from their perch last Friday night.

On the second play, Buddy Whately, halfback, knifed through the left side and dashed to pay-dirt. Wheelis' pass on PAT try was no good. Only 46 seconds were gone and the Tigers had a 6-point lead.

The Hawks ran three plays and Billy Jackson kicked. Terry May made the tackle and along with Jim Gillispie became the second casualty in the Hawk starting lineup.

Jacksboro marched to another touchdown with Robert Leach and Jim McCoy doing most of the ball carrying. Leach scored from 2 yards out with a thrust at left guard. Wheelis' pass was incomplete and the Tigers had a 14-0 lead.

The Hawks could not move, so Jackson again kicked nicely. The ball was blown dead on the Tiger 9. A 15-yard penalty on the Hawks got the Tigers rolling and Whately scored with a 19-yard run through the left side of the Hawk line. Gary Winton, No. 2 quarterback, tried his passing skill for the PAT, but the Hawks stymied it and the score stayed at 18.

The Hawks mounted a small offense just before the end of the first half when Mike Davenport reeled off 11 yards and Sam Archer tacked on 7 more with the wingback reverse. But the Tigers and the clock killed the threat.

On the 2nd half kickoff the Green and White gave fans something to cheer about when Davenport handed off to Billy Jackson and he reached the Tiger 49. The Hawks lost the ball on downs at the 38.

On the next play Robert Leach leaped through a hole in the right side and raced 62 yards for the 4th score. Tigers tried to ram the conversion but Brott and Jackson stopped Whatley.

Again the Tiger defense held the Hawks to three running plays and a kick, gaining possession on their own 41. Aided by a 15-yard step-off, the Tigers marched up the field and James Leatherwood scored to make it 30-0 at the end of the 3rd stanza.

In the final period both coaches threw in substitutions to get all their boys in the game. Jacksboro picked off a Larry Thompson pass and marched to the 6th TD. James Mustin and Dale Gideon attacked the Hawk line and used 8 plays to march 43 yards. Gideon rammed over with only 18 second left. Gry Winton scored the final 2 with a run.

Total score: 38-0. This Friday night the Hawks travel to Holliday and clash with the Eagles. Holliday is loaded with big boys who have plenty of speed. Let's all go to Archer county and get our boys back on the glory road.

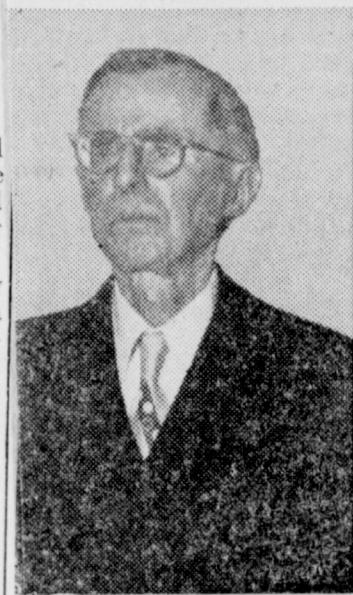
Cousin Dies

Funeral service was conducted for Aaron L. Brubaker, 90, arly day pioneer of this area, Monday afternoon in Tanner Funeral Home. Rev. Homer Thompson, First Baptist church, officiated.

Mr. Brubaker died in a Wichita Falls hospital Sunday afternoon following several weeks of illness.

Mr. Brubaker was born in Paris, Ill., Jan. 8, 1872, in Iowa Park in 1888 with his parents Mr. and Mrs. Chas. W. Brubaker. In Dec. 1909, he was married here to the late Mrs. Dora.

He resided in this area most of his married life, except when they moved to New Mexico to homestead. After returning from that he resided in Electra 13 yrs before moving back to Iowa Park.

It rained here Tuesday and the ground was damp, but the spirits of the pioneers were not dampened by the one inch downpour. Over 425 registered as pioneers of Texas and Oklahoma.

Congressman Victor Wickersham of Oklahoma, who was to be Pioneer Day speaker, was recalled to Washington, so Dr. J. B. Boren, his administrative assistant, spoke in commemoration of the 100th anniversary of the U.S. department of agriculture.

Mr. and Mrs. Oral Jones were honored during the celebration. The 34th annual T-O Fair is dedicated to Mr. Jones. He is a retired vice-president of the City National bank of Wichita Falls.

Jones has been a supporter of the Fair the past 34 years and has served on the Pioneer Day committee since its beginning. Mr. Jones was also honored by his church, his fellow workers in the bank, by Maskat Temple and by many other friends in various walks of life.

Mrs. Jones was crowned Pioneer Queen of 1962. A plaque was presented to the couple as well as a gilt crown for Mrs. Jones. She received many other gifts.

W. A. Hotchkiss and Ben Ludy served as masters of ceremonies and presented gifts to various pioneers.

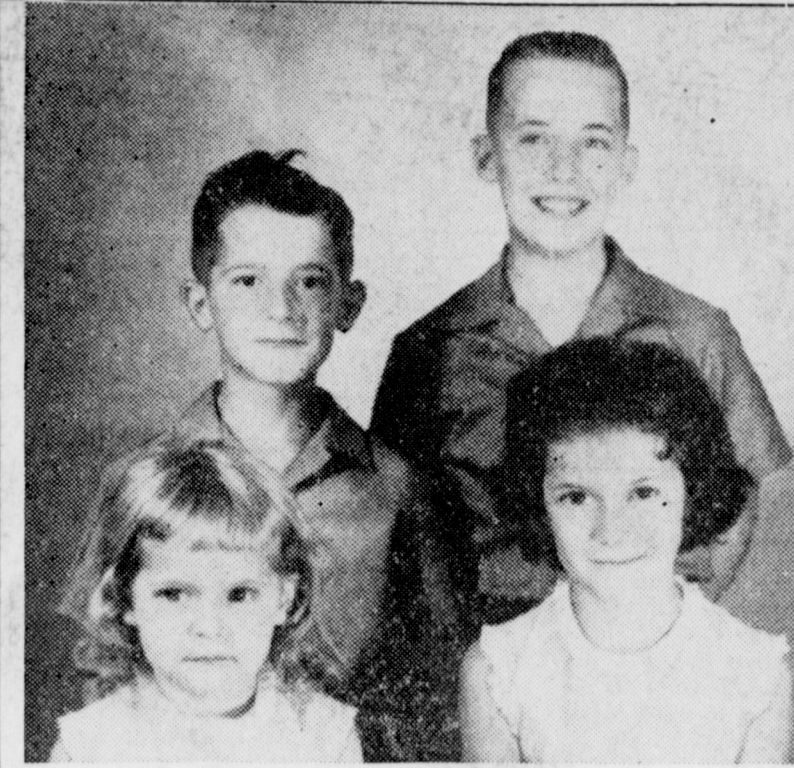

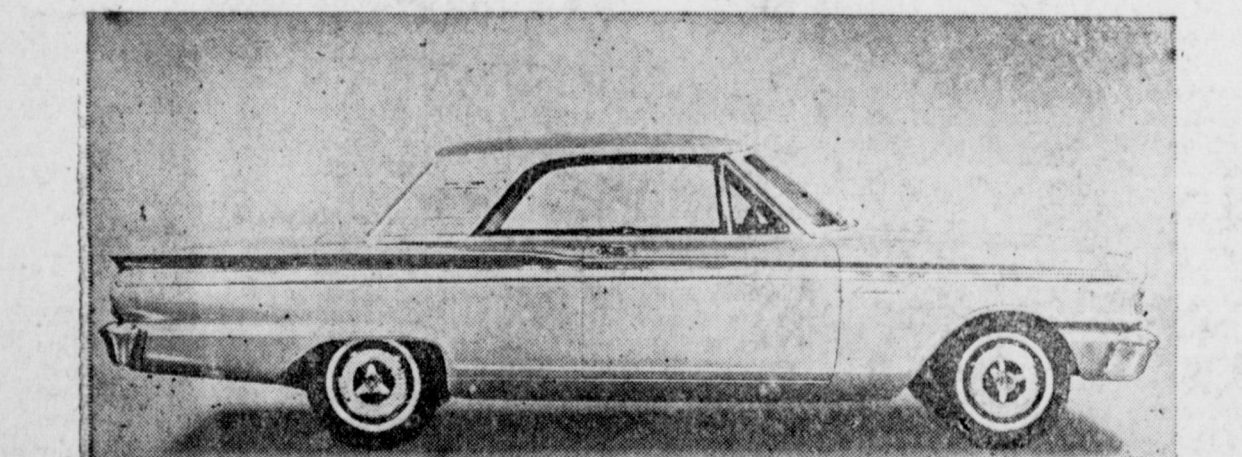

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Circulate Petition for Co. Hospital

Monday evening in Wichita Falls at a meeting of a citizens advisory committee named by the Wichita General hospital board of directors several months ago, it was decided to try and create a Countywide Hospital District as a separate taxing body and to place the issue on the general election ballot Nov. 6.

In this way voters of the county can approve or disapprove the hospital district.

Petitions are being circulated in all the county. Signatures of 1000 qualified taxpayers must be secured to obtain the election. In Iowa Park petitions are at Hays Rexall Drug, Settle Drug, Iowa Park Herald and several other places here.

All signers must be qualified voters and must own real estate or personal property listed on the county tax rolls.

Plans for calling a \$1,000,000 bond issue for construction of a 100-bed addition to Wichita General hospital soon after creation of a hospital district also were discussed Monday. This fund will be matched with federal money as authorized by the Hill Burton Act of several years ago.

Present board, headed by Dr. Gordon G. Clark of Iowa Park, would continue to administer the newly formed district until a special election can be called. Others on the board are W. B. Featherston, J. B. Jarratt, Joe B. McNeil and Dr. Steve Powers of Wichita Falls and Dr. Philip Carpenter of Burkburnett.

Dr. Edwin Bebb, chief surgeon of Wichita General, explained the need of this project. He said the county has 124,000 residents and a drawing area of 1,411,900 persons. Only 400 hospital beds are available and 500 more are needed. Both General and Bethania are kept filled to capacity and sometimes have beds in hallways.

Petitions seeking the election read: "Shall there be created in Wichita County a hospital district to be known as Wichita County Hospital District, with boundaries co-extensive with boundaries of Wichita County for the purpose of operating the hospital facilities now known as the Wichita General Hospital, and such additional facilities as may be provided in the future, and to set up a procedure to furnish medical and hospital care to indigent persons residing in said hospital district?"

The petition must have been signed by 1000 persons by Thursday, Oct. 4.

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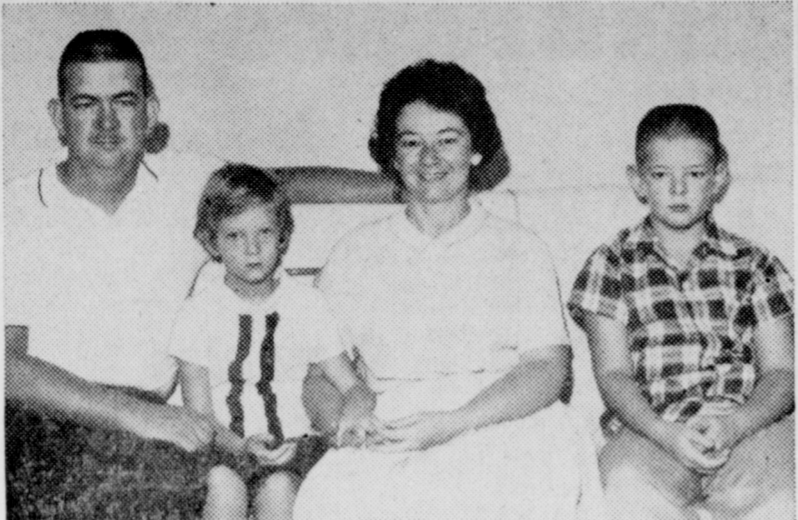
