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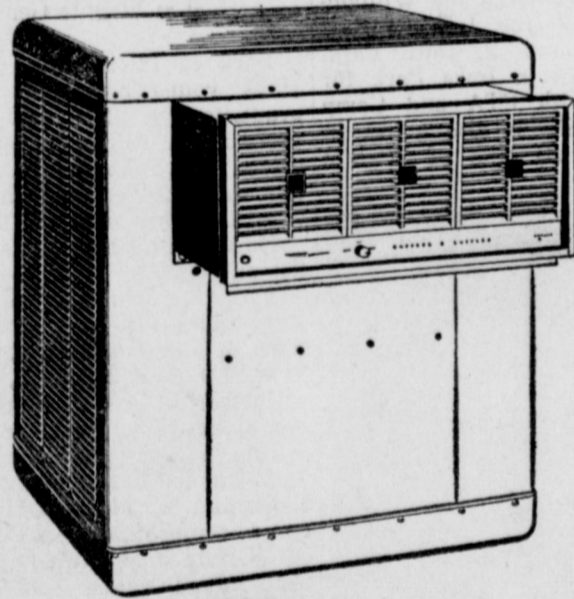

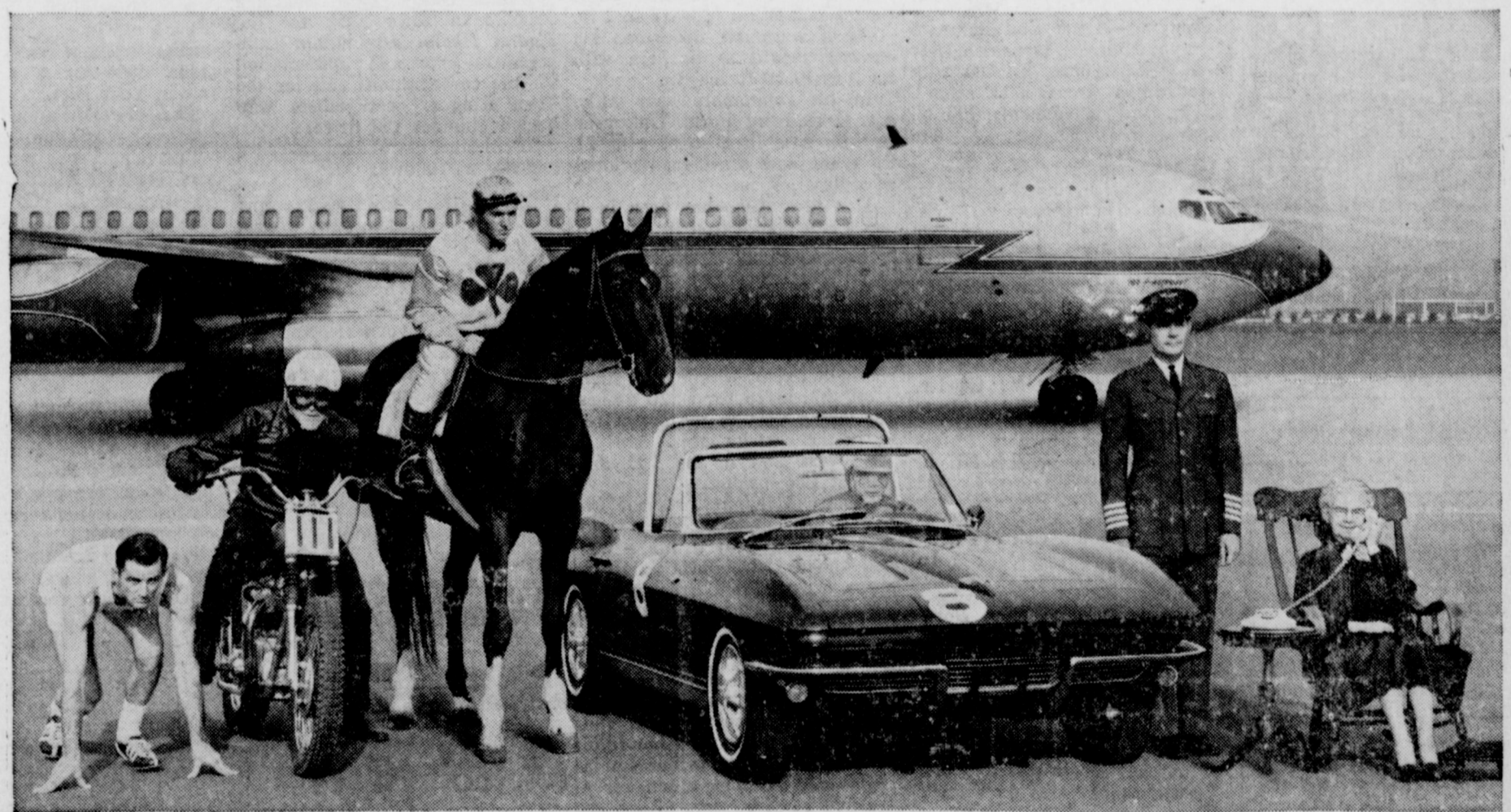

## The 1964 Wheat Referendum

This is the sixth in a series of articles on the upcoming national referendum by Bob Crocker, county office manager, ASCS.

For the 1964 wheat program to become law, two-thirds of farmers voting in the May referendum must vote "yes."

If less than two-thirds vote approval, we will still have a wheat program, but in the opinion of six land-grant economists, "for all practical purposes we will have no program at all."

That will be substantially true unless Congress enacts new legislation to take its place.

At this point, let us remind farmers that in May they will be voting only for a 1964 program that will pertain to wheat and nothing else. They will have a chance later to vote whether or not they want it in subsequent years.

Now, what will happen if the program is disapproved May 21?

Here is the conclusion of the six aforementioned economists who analyzed both sides of the issue: If the program is approved, farmers nationally will be allotted 49 to 50 million acres, or some 10 percent less land than they were allotted in 1963.

If they vote disapproval, they will still have an allotment of from 49 to 50 million acres, but they will receive no diversionary payments and receive no price support if they overplant.

By approving, they will receive 30 percent of the support level times normal yield on 10 percent mandatory diversion, and 50 percent of support level times normal yield on voluntary diversion.

And they will receive price supports per bushel of \$2 (national average) on 80 percent of normal production on acreage allotment.

If the program is not approved, there will be no farm marketing quotas nor marketing allocations.

What will be the probable results? According to the land-grant economists, the national gross income from wheat, if the program is approved, will amount to \$2.3 billion. If disapproved, the national gross income will amount to only \$1.6 billion.

According to their figures, this means disapproval will cost American farmers roughly 700 million dollars.

According to the economists' analysis, the national production under the program would be 1.1 billion bushels, compared with 1.5 billion without it, or if the farmers vote "no" in the referendum.

Wheat and grain stocks will be increased substantially without the program, but reduced by 150 million bushels under the proposed program.

Here is how the program will work for a Wichita county farmer with a 90-acre allotment, 10-acre mandatory cut, normal yield of 25 bushels and actual production of 25 bushels.

Under the proposed program, he could expect a gross income from the 90 acres of about \$4,335. Without the program, to achieve the same gross return, he would need to plant 108 acres at \$1.60 per bushel, 144 acres at \$1.20 per bushel, and 17 acres — almost twice as much — at \$1 a bushel.

If more than one-third of the growers vote "no," wheat price supports will drop to 50 percent of parity, about \$1.20 per bushel, but even that only for those who plant within their acreage allotment. Growers who plant more than their allotment will not be eligible for price support loans.

What's more, a "no" vote, in the opinion of the experts, would have repercussions felt throughout the world. For the first time in many years, US prices could be lower than the minimum under the International Wheat Agreement.

Mr. Wheat Farmer: May 21, 1963, spells out a day farmers of the United States may long remember. It spells out a day on which farmers may go to the polls and vote "no" and gain back some of the lost freedoms, or they can go to the polls and vote "yes" and help pull the government noose tighter and tighter until the last flicker of individual freedom is extinguished.

As we go to vote let us be reminded that it is not just a matter of dollars and cents. Not as the Secretary of Agriculture says — either \$2 wheat or \$1 a bushel. If what he says should be true, which we do not believe, would you want to sell your freedom for the dollar difference?

But let us be reminded that if the '64 plan be defeated, the acreage allotment now in force would remain in effect, and the Secretary of Agriculture under the existing law must support loans to co-operators at 50 per cent of parity, which would be approximately \$1.25 a bushel, and that would be on all the wheat you produce.

Furthermore let the wheat farmers remember that Congress is in session and still has Congressional power, notwithstanding the Secretary would like it otherwise. Our congressmen as our elected representatives are not going to let our segment of agriculture exist under difficult financial conditions but would hasten to bring the wheat situation into balance, should the need arise.

Under the wheat certificate plan we know the program is for 1964, but it carries many had implications which do not show up on the surface. Most certain thing about the plan is that we place our agricultural future in the hands of the Secretary of Agriculture, and we must be reminded that neither the farmers nor their representatives and Congress have

choice in whom he shall be. He is an appointee of the President of the United States.

As has been stated this is not a vote for a year program, this is a vote for testing whether or not the American farmer will submit himself to a totally planned economy. If supply management will work as conceived by the agricultural secretary then all commodities would have to be brought under the same plan. Then if this be true who will be the manager of your farm?

Under the free enterprise system, 8 per cent of our population raises enough food to supply all our population with plenty to spare. Under government controlled system as used by the communist countries 40 per cent work at producing food, yet thousands go hungry, with none to spare.

Under government control strict penalties are imposed. Should the referendum pass, penalties as much as 10 years of imprisonment could be imposed on violators who produce, sell, buy, manufacture wheat or its products. It means wheat handlers in any form must keep strict records, and for many handlers it will be a heavy expense.

It is a New England editor who said: "Should wheat farmers vote in favor of this program it could open a Pandora's box and spill all the evils of this program into the area of other agricultural commodities, milk, corn, feed grains, and almost any other crops one could think of." One strong farm leader says the outcome of the refer-

endum may very well determine the outcome of all agriculture, and possibly of our American way of life.

We cannot too strongly stress the word "freedom." We dare not trade it for dollars and cents. Our forefathers could have lived a few years longer under British (government controlled) tyranny with probably less sacrifices than war, but they chose to shoulder arms and fight for that freedom, which they won and passed on to us hoping we would keep it secure.

Let's go to the polls and vote!! Vote right and your future is in your hand. Vote wrong and it is in the hands of others.

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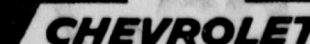


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## Christ and a Faith for Our Day

I will be smiled at for being a sentimentalist, but the day I wrote this was the wedding day of Princess Alexandra Helen Elizabeth Olga Christabel to the Hon. Angus James Bruce Ogilvy.

Just seven hours before, I "became a Britisher," pressed together in a department store before 10 "tellies" in a crowd which was using lunch-hour for watching their royalty in a magnificent Westminster Abbey wedding.

During that hour I secretly abdicated my American citizenship so that I might experience what the men and women and young people about me were experiencing.

It's hard to pin down. Queens and princesses and trumpeters and horse-drawn carriages with footmen are just meant for fairy-tales or perhaps a dark, misty past that has faded forever. But there they were! Alive and serious they were—right before my eyes (with the help of the telly).

It was a gorgeous ceremony in brilliant colors. (Here I must admit I was daubing colors onto the back of my mind.) But it really took little imagining! The professional and recessional were not the usual pieces borrowed from operatic music with no relation to the Christian faith. It was the music of the Church, with the enormous congregation singing Reginald Heber's splendid hymn of praise "Holy, Holy, Holy! Lord God Almighty!" One of the anthems was Henry Walford Davies' lovely setting of "God Be in My Head."

At the end of the recessional, as the couple emerged from the sanctuary, the soaring organ music fading away, they were greeted by two pipers of the Scots Guard who "bagpiped them" to their carriage.

Now we may wonder, "Why the fuss? Why all the pageantry for a princess when no one really cares?" Ah, but that's just it! People do care!

Perhaps this is the real genius of the British constitutional system (with no written Constitution, if you remember your history).

The Britisher can rant and rail at the politicians in London. He can "bless out" his governmental representatives perhaps even more than we do (can you believe it?)

But when it comes to the Queen and activities which surround her, he is proud. Here is a symbol of the nation, the Empire.

Here is a ruler with actually no power to rule—except in the heart and admiration of her subject. Perhaps we give something of this kind of allegiance to our flag, but a flag is not alive and human.

In the Queen the British find a symbol of their unity which can give the kind of determination that saw this people, during the dark days of the second World War, when their situation looked absolutely impossible, somehow cowering to survive—and surviving.

Many Americans in Britain are surprised when they first hear the British national anthem. "Why, it's 'My Country, 'Tis of Thee' they say! Interesting story behind that was the oversight of the author of "My Country 'Tis of Thee." Samuel F. Smith of New England wrote the song about 1832 and set it to a familiar tune. Only later did he discover the familiar tune was that of the British anthem!

"God Save the Queen" has a long and complicated background which we have not time to look at here. One of its early stanzas was:

*O Lord our God, arise,  
Scatter her enemies  
And make them fall!  
Confound their politics,  
Frustrate their knavish tricks,  
On her our hopes are fix'd,  
O save us all.*

Personally, I'm afraid all our politics are confounded enough without asking God to add to the confusion. Perhaps a stanza more fitting is this:

*Lord God, our monarch bless;  
Girded with righteousness  
Long may she reign!  
Her heart inspire and move  
With wisdom from above;  
Throned on a nation's love,  
Her power maintain.*

The day of the royal wedding draws to a rather melancholy close. Tomorrow we will waken to the hard realities of a rough-and-tumble world. But I hope that there will be many more days like today when loyalty to royalty will send a strange tingle and sensation up and down the spine of a nation, and a People's devotion will be so evident.

When Britain's day comes to an

end, just as every nation and individual must finally come to an end, it will be a sad day. The decline of Britain will not be Britain's decline and fall only, but of all the best things for which she has stood. I, at least, am not of the opinion that humanity, justice, freedom—no, nor Christianity, will be the gainers in that fall.

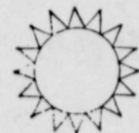
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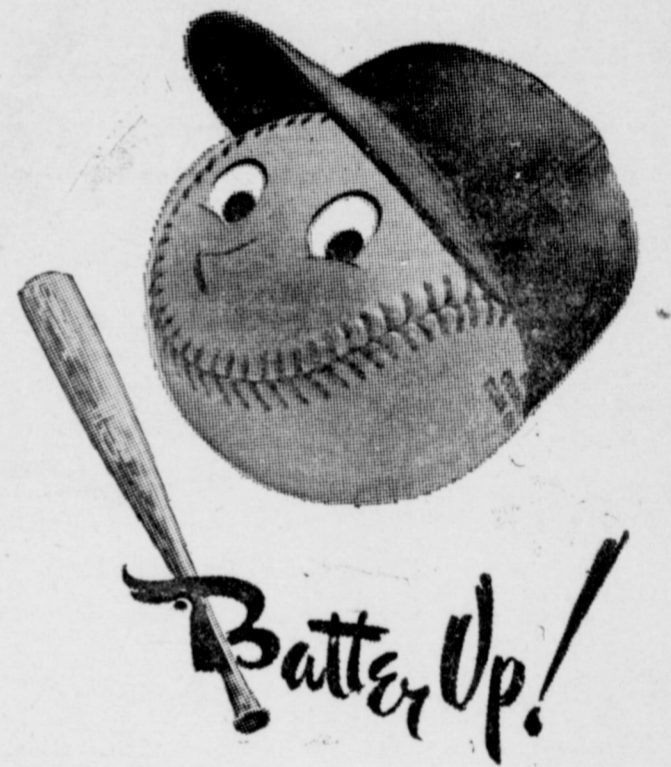
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## Iowa Park Little League

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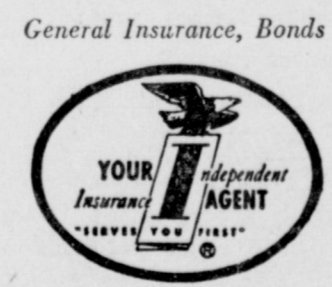
