Required Americanism program was presented through a symposium "Where American History Lives" for a meeting last Thursday evening of the 23 Study club. Mrs. T. M. Clark was program leader.

Mrs. Noel Troutman and Mrs. Carroll Duke were hostesses in the Troutman home.

After the pledge to the flag, Mrs. C. W. Coppock led the group in singing a medley of patriotic songs. The meditation was contributed by Mrs. Dave O. Harbour.

The symposium stressed six states in the union where American history lives.

Mrs. Earle Denny described Lexington, Mass., where a battle in 1775 was really the beginning of the Revolution.

Mrs. R. R. Brubaker gave a data concerning events in Independence Hall, Philadelphia. She recalled that the 23 Study club worked through local schools a few years ago to secure money for restoration of the Liberty Bell. The name of Iowa Park school is on a plaque in Independence Hall because of the \$100 contribution.

Mrs. Taylor George discussed the Alamo, a monument to the courage of men, in San Antonio. She said efforts to restore the mission were begun in 1903 and that more than 600,000 persons visit the shrine each year.

Mrs. Sam Hill reported on San Carlos Mission in California. It was built by Father Serro and was to be a place of spiritual beauty.
