## Telephone Co. Rural Service to Be Better

A new service which will make  
a significant improvement in rural  
telephone service for people living  
within a three-mile radius of Iowa  
Park will be introduced here July  
25, Vern Allen, manager for the  
Southwestern Bell Telephone Co.,  
has announced.

The new service, called Sub-  
urban Telephone Service, will  
mean there will never be more  
than four parties on any line  
within the three-mile area. At  
present there can be up to eight  
parties on any rural telephone  
line.

"There will be a small increase  
in monthly rates to help offset  
the cost of providing this im-  
proved service," Allen said. Resi-  
dence service will increase from  
\$4.25 to \$5.30 per month for these  
customers.

Letters have been sent to all  
customers in the three-mile radius  
explaining the improved service,  
the manager added.

"We have long been aware that  
eight-party service does not ade-  
quately serve the needs of our  
suburban customers. At the same  
time, we have known that good  
business practices make it impos-  
sible to extend enough plant into  
all the thinly populated areas to  
make a substantial reduction in  
the number of telephone customers  
served on one line. The new Sub-  
urban Service plan seems a prac-  
tical beginning to solution of this  
problem," Allen said.

## Pipeline Completed to Irrigation Ditch to Supplement I.P. Lakes

About a 2-inch rain descended  
on Iowa Park and vicinity Sun-  
day morning and saved the water  
starved vegetation. It was not  
enough to put water in Iowa Park  
lakes, but it gave a big boost to  
the morale of citizens who have  
waited helplessly for moisture to  
save trees, shrubs, flowers and  
lawns which were suffering from  
the voluntary water conservation  
program.

Water Superintendent Jim C.  
Keeningsham and his helpers had  
worked during the past week at  
breakneck speed to complete an  
8-inch line from the irrigation  
ditch to the old lake.  
This week has been devoted to  
installing a pump at the ditch to  
force water to the lake, where  
it is to be blended with lake  
water, treated, and pumped into  
service lines.

Mayor C. L. Metz has issued a  
statement declaring the emer-  
gency over and thanking citizens  
of Iowa Park for their spirit of  
co-operation which has made this  
difficult time more pleasant to  
deal with. He says water custom-  
ers may now resume normal use  
of city water.

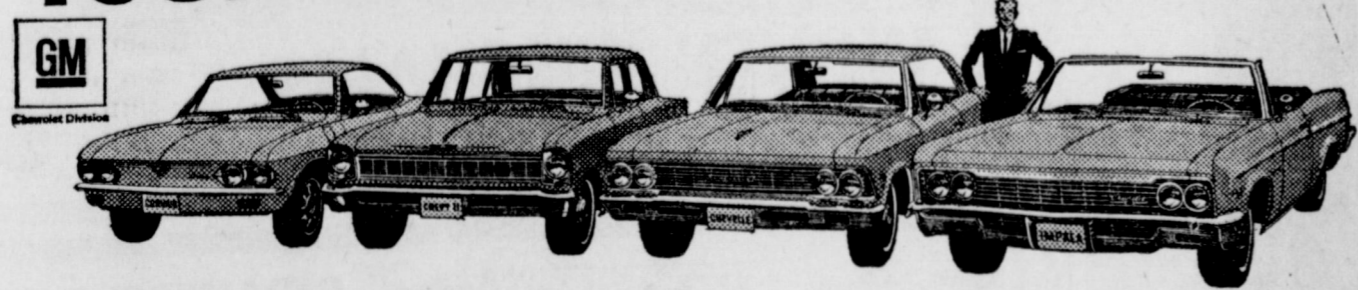

### Burk's Marker

Official Texas Historical Marker for Boomtown, USA, has arrived from the foundry and will be erected at 3:00 p.m. July 15 near the Red River bridge on Highway 277-281. This is the first official marker to be erected in Wichita county. It reads:

BURKBURNETT ("Boomtown, U.S.A."; 1 mi. SW)  
 One of the most famous Texas towns. Name was given to post office at request of President T. R. Roosevelt after his 1905 wolf hunt with rancher Burk Burnett in this area. Townsite was laid out in 1907 by Joseph A. Kemp and Frank Kell, surveyors and promoters of Wichita Falls & Northwestern railroad.

First oil discovery was Chris Schmoker No. 1, in 1912.

A 2200-barrel gusher was brought in on S. L. Fowler farm about a mile from this site, July 29, 1918, by a company formed by Fowler, his brother W. D. Cline, and J. I. Staley. In three months 200 wells had been completed in Burkburnett townsite—a forest of derricks. Money and oil flowed freely. A bank capitalized at \$25,000 got monthly revenue of \$10,000 from a well drilled at its back door. The town's population jumped from 1500 to 15,000 in a year. Boom area was extended by finds on properties of Burk-Waggoner company and Kemp-Munger-Allen operations to the southwest.

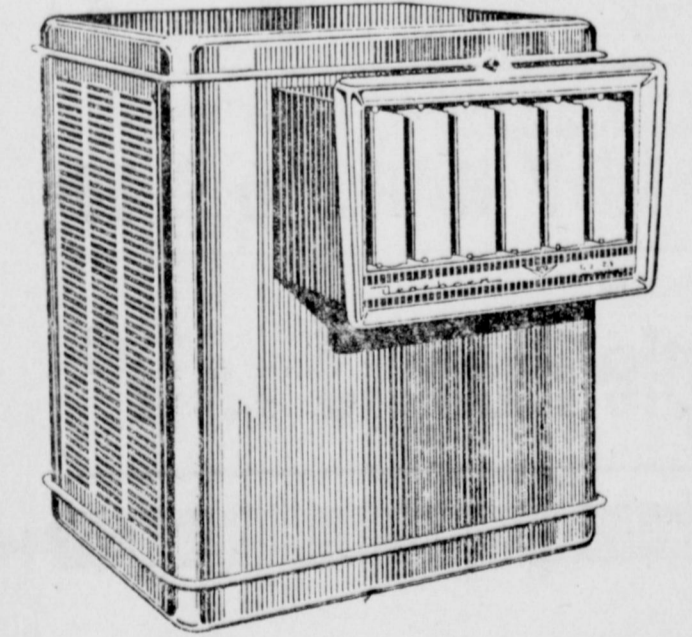
Town was made world famous in 1941 by the movie "Boomtown," filmed from a popular story entitled "Lady Comes to Burkburnett."
