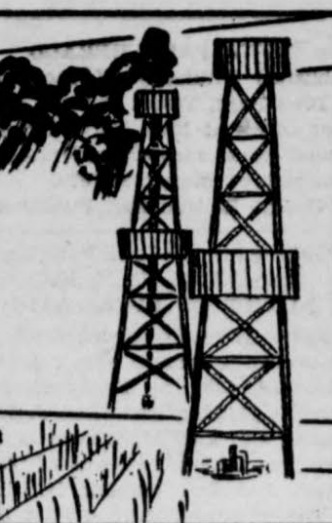

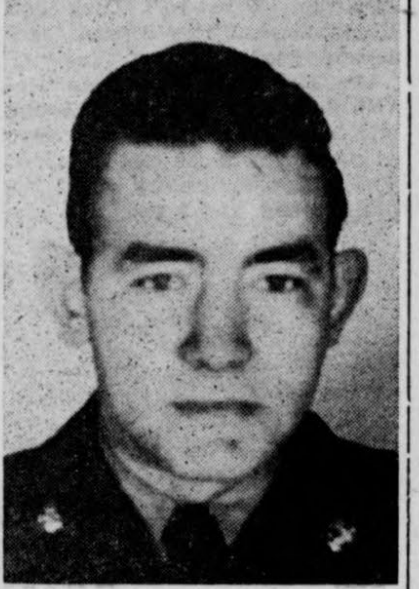

Hawk Thinclads Win Seven School Meet

Iowa Park won a seven-way track meet here Tuesday, scoring 71 points. The Hawks were trailed by Seymour with 41, Valley View 16, Burk Burnett 15, Chillicothe 5 1/2, Holliday 4 1/2 and Henrietta 1.

Robert Nolen and Paul Burns led the Hawks, scoring 27 points between them.

The Hawks will go after the district championship at Quanaq next Saturday, starting at 10:00 a.m. The district is composed of 10 teams including Quanaq, Seymour, Burk Burnett, Electra, Crowell, Chillicothe, Holliday, Archer City, Olney and Iowa Park.

The Hawks attended the Possum Kingom relays at Graham last Saturday, placing sixth in a field of 15 teams. Diamond Hill was the only AA team to place above Iowa Park, the others being AAA and AAAA teams. In this meet Jimmy Martin placed 3rd in low hurdles, Kendall Hill 3rd in 220, Robert Nolen 2nd in high jump, Paul Burns 3rd in pole vault and tied for 3rd in high jump.

Seven Seek Three Trustee Positions in School Election Here

Election of three trustees for the Iowa Park school district is slated for Saturday, April 5, at the school building. Voters will have plenty to choose from when they find seven names on the ballot, with three places to be filled.

Candidates for the places now held by Burk Scott, Herman Mitchell and Rollins Woodall are C. E. Birk, H. A. Hensley, Herman Mitchell, Albert May Jr., Burk Scott, Lowell Short and Miles Thompson.

All the men are well known here and have children in the school system.

There has been some question in the minds of some voters as to the eligibility of Miles Thompson and Lowell Short to serve on the board, since both are working for Sheppard Air Force Base under civil service. This has been cleared up by consulting a manual prepared for civilian personnel. The regulation specifically sets forth a ruling that school board membership is allowed to government employees.

The election is to be held in the Iowa Park school building from 8:00 a.m. until 7:00 p.m. All qualified voters living in the school district are eligible to cast a ballot.

Weldon Bailey Enters Race for Sheriff

Weldon Bailey of 2206 Shepherd street, Wichita Falls, has made a formal announcement as a candidate for sheriff of Wichita county.

Bailey is 40 years old, married and father of a 14 year old son Bob. He is married to the former Mozelle Stephenson and they both grew up in Midlothian, Ellis county. He served 8 years with the Highway Patrol at Tyler and since 1944 has been the sergeant of the Wichita Falls district of the patrol. He is a member of the board of stewards of the First Methodist church in Wichita Falls, a 32 degree Mason and a member of Maskat Shrine. He is a member of the Rotary club and has been active in civic and religious activities since coming to Wichita Falls.

Weldon Bailey states that he will co-operate with all law enforcement agencies in order to inaugurate and maintain an honest, courteous and efficient law enforcement program. He further states that he would co-operate with the Commissioners Court and all other elective officials of Wichita county to insure the taxpayer's getting maximum service and results from the minimum tax dollar.

He will make a formal statement for publication at a later date. In the meantime Weldon Bailey solicits the active support of his friends throughout Wichita county.

Migrant Workers To Be Discussed by Guest Speaker Sunday

Miss Charlotte Collins of Fort Worth, missionary to Texas migrants, will be speaker for a union service Sunday evening at 7:30 at the Presbyterian church. She will discuss "The Texas Migrant—the Churches' Opportunity."

The public is urged to attend the service which is being sponsored by the Iowa Park Council of Church Women.

The migrants constitute one of the greatest challenges that face Texas church people, since 170,000 migrants call Texas their home. This state has more migrants than any other state except California.

Ninety thousand persons follow the cotton cycle within the state. Eighty thousand others travel the Texas highways each spring, summer and fall as they go into other states in search of ripening crops and work.

Texas needs her migrants because they harvest half the cotton and more than half the vegetable and citrus crops.

The migrants need the churches to send Christian workers into their temporary homes to conduct family counseling, education in child care and transportation of mothers and babies to medical clinics.

The churches must face the responsibility of bringing the migrants into fellowship with Christ and His church. Migrant children need recreation under Christian leadership. They experience the same joy as all children in playing games, learning new songs and crafts or just holding a real doll in their arms.

Programs are being carried on by the National Council of Churches staff in the Rio Grande valley and West Texas area, but tens of thousands still remain unreached by these programs.

Miss Collins will describe the needs of migrants and further opportunities for Christian service in her talk Sunday evening.

Lost Two-Year Old Found Asleep After Six-Hour Search

An intensive search by about 3,000 men ended successfully when Swan Reeves found little Rickey Don Cope asleep in the pasture near his parents' home, at about 11:00 Thursday night.

The two-year-old son of Mr. and Mrs. Raymond Cope wandered off after his dog in the late afternoon. Mr. Cope was working on his car and thought the youngster was in the house with his mother. Mrs. Cope believed he was with his father.

When the young couple discovered the baby was gone and searched a while and then put in a call for help. Iowa Park Firemen, Boy Scouts, the Highway Patrol, and thousands of anxious friends and neighbors joined in the hunt.

Mr. and Mrs. Cope live on the Wigley ranch southwest of Iowa Park. The Wichita river runs thru the place, so naturally the hunt was first concentrated along the banks of the river.

As the hour grew later, more calls were sent out for additional searchers. Sheppard Air Force Base sent a large group of men, who arrived at about the time Rickey Don was found.

About 10:30 the child's dog was seen coming to the house from the north. A group of Highway Patrol men and others began searching in that direction. First they found the youngster's hat, and a bit later the baby, fast asleep on the ground.

Many of the searchers reported they routed out rattlesnakes while making their search for the baby, but apparently he was not harmed.

The Wichita county 4-H Dress Review for 1952 will be staged in Iowa Park High School on Saturday and Monday, April 12 and 14. Judging will start at 9:00 a.m. Saturday.

Wagoner Wins Places in City Election

Two new faces will be seen at City Council meetings in the coming year, as result of the city election held Tuesday. R. E. (Bert) Van Horn succeeds Fenton Dale as mayor and L. Lavere Thompson replaces M. L. (Boss) Smith as alderman. Neither incumbent was a candidate for re-election.

Alan W. Berry and W. G. Steele were re-elected aldermen and Miss Dossia Smith retained her position as city secretary with only two opposing votes.

In the heavy balloting Tuesday occasioned by a write in campaign for Mr. Smith, 487 votes were cast, of which 14 were mutilated and not counted.

Miss Smith received 471 votes; Mr. Van Horn 296; and Mr. Smith 164.

Choices of voters in the alderman races was: Mr. Berry 355; Mr. Thompson 338; Mr. Steele 317. Fred Widmoyer with 223 and Dr. L. A. Crawford with 168 were the losing candidates.

Mr. Van Horn and the other successful candidates will be sworn in at formal ceremonies early next week and begin the city's new administration.

In a statement to the Herald this week Mr. Van Horn expressed great appreciation for the support and confidence expressed by voters in Tuesday's election. He solicits the suggestions and full co-operation of all citizens of Iowa Park in order that his administration might be successful and that the town will continue the progress so well started by his predecessors in office.

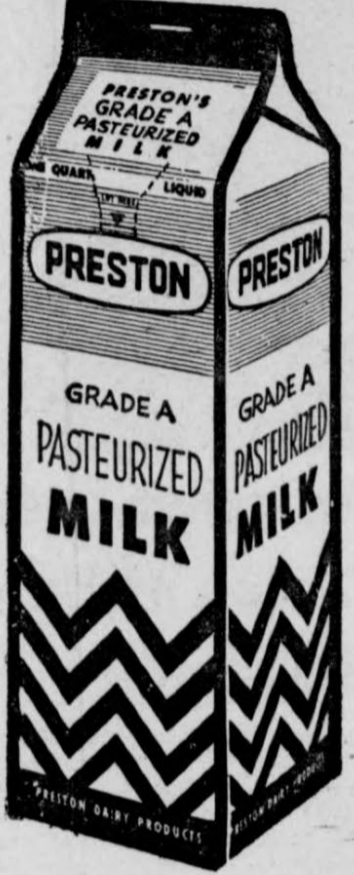

... Following is an extract taken from Chapter C2-15 Federal Civilian Personnel Manual:

"State or local positions exempted for Federal employees generally.—The general restriction stated above does not prohibit Federal officers and employees from holding the following State and local offices: Justice of the peace, notary public, commissioner to take acknowledgment of deeds, of bail, or to administer oaths; positions and services on boards of education, school committees, public libraries, religious or eleemosynary institutions incorporated or established or sustained by State or municipal authorities; positions in colleges or universities as professor, assistant professor, assistant lecturer in an evening school, teacher, or instructor; positions as teacher or instructor in schools; officers in the militia."
