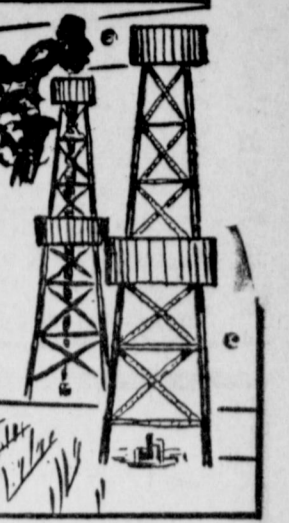

### Wilson Family Home Features Items from Many Countries

Among the interesting newcomers to our city are Mr. and Mrs. Ramey Wilson and children Paul 17, Tanni 9, and Ted 7, who reside at 202 Karen Lane.

Paul moved here with the family but left shortly for Annapolis, where he entered the naval academy June 30. He finished Altus (Okla.) high school this spring and was appointed to Annapolis by Congressman Victor Wickersham.

There is a deep feeling of loyalty to the army, navy and air force at the Wilson home. Ramey retired from the army at lieutenant colonel and is now a civilian employee at Sheppard AFB. With a son in the naval academy, it does not divide their loyalty, it enhances their patriotism.

Mr. and Mrs. Wilson are native Oklahomans. He is son of Mr. and Mrs. A. F. Wilson, pioneers of Devol, now residing in Littlefield, Texas. After graduation from high school he attended Texas Tech, OBU and Southwestern State college, Weatherford, Okla. He entered the army in 1942.

Mrs. Wilson, the former Miss Iris Savage, is daughter of Mrs. E. B. Savage and the late Mr. Savage, pioneer residents of Hammon, Okla. She was graduated from high school there and received the BA degree from Southwestern. She met Ramey Wilson while they were students in Weatherford and they were married in 1942. She has taught school in Hammon, Kitigala school at Katura, Japan, and the Canal Zone schools in Panama.

The Wilsons and son Paul, who was born at Ft. Bragg, N.C., went to Japan in 1948. When the Korean conflict broke out in 1950 the wife and baby returned to the States and Capt. Wilson was sent to Korea.

The family made the second trip overseas in 1952, spending three years in the Canal Zone. Tanni was born in Panama in 1955.

They were stationed at many camps in the U.S. and when Lt. Col. Wilson retired he was a reserve adviser in Bryan, Texas.

Many of the furnishing and accessories in the Wilson home are from overseas. In the den are mahogany table and black palm lamps which the family made for themselves in Panama.

A touch of the Orient is felt as one enters the house and sees the Hakata dools on the divider between the entrance hall and living room. Exciting curiosity and interest are Persimmon Man and Pearl Man on bamboo bases. Mrs.

Wilson says the dolls have become a part of the family.

A low bamboo mahogany room divider acquired in Japan catches the eye. Inside one section is a collection of ivory gods. Among them are the Happy God which is supposed to bring many children and much happiness, and the intriguing intricately carved fishermen. No little attraction is the sterling silver vase inlaid with gold, acquired in Korea.

One of the outstanding pieces of furniture in the living room is a teakwood hand-carved chest, the beauty of which is almost overwhelming.

A nest of bleached teakwood hand-carved tables is an interesting addition to the room. The Oriental atmosphere is also noted in a Maruni table bought in Japan which has 13 coats of lacquer over metal, Japanese lamps, hand-painted chop plates and pictures.

The piece of furniture which is Mrs. Wilson's pride and joy is a walnut pump organ which belonged to her grandmother the late Mrs. E. S. Savage. When Mrs. Savage taught in Missouri at \$20 a month she bought the organ. She married a railroad contractor and the couple moved often. Frequently they lived in tents. Regardless of how often they moved or where they went, the organ was taken along. The proud owner created a parlor somewhere in their living quarters and the organ was the center of interest.

Mrs. Wilson said that on one occasion the parlor area was designated by gunny sacks spread on the tent floor.

Mrs. Wilson acquired the organ when her grandmother died, and it is evident she intends for it to occupy a prominent place in her home.

The Wilsons attend the Methodist church.
