Interest in the program was enhanced by the recent announcement of the Women's Finance Forum which will begin in Wichita Falls in the near future.

The meeting was held at the home of Mrs. C. W. Coppock with Mrs. R. A. Tanner serving as program chairman and leading the panel. She was assisted by Mrs. Herman Mitchell and Mrs. H. W. Weaver.

Mrs. Tanner defined money as the medium of exchange for necessities and pleasure. She stated that since women owned 77 per cent of security investments and 79 per cent of property investments it behooved them to know how to handle money wisely.

Mrs. Mitchell and Mrs. Weaver gave profitable discussions on "Financial Planning," "Investments" and "Life Insurance." They also discussed stocks and bonds, mentioning U. S. bonds, savings banks and Grade Triple A as the safest and most certain money investments.

In showing the wisdom of investments it was brought out that it meant security for emergencies and old age and it was a step toward hedging inflation, since income and cost do not maintain a balance at present.

The panel was followed by a question and answer period.
