ANIMALS—ORDINANCE No. 17

Section 1. Be it ordained by the City of Iowa Park, Texas, that it shall hereafter be unlawful for any person to keep any horses, cattle, hogs, fowls and any other livestock within the City of Iowa Park, Wichita County, Texas.

Section 2. As a definition for "any person" in the above Section, this shall include persons, firms, associations or corporations and such keeping shall consist of owning, keeping or harboring any such livestock.

Section 3. Any person violating any of the terms or provisions of the preceding Sections of this Ordinance, shall be deemed guilty of a misdemeanor and shall be fined in a sum not to exceed two hundred dollars (\$200.00).

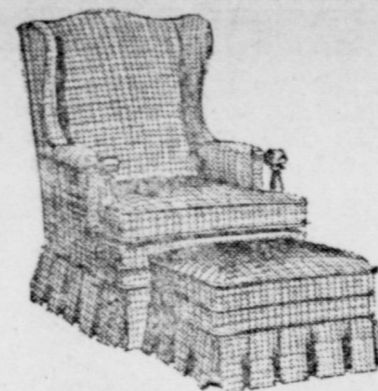
Philia Club

Reader Writes P.E. Tests

To the Editor:

A member of the Citizens Committee which was formed last summer to study the educational and building needs of the Iowa Park School District, I want to express my appreciation for the informative article printed in your May 4 issue of the Iowa Park Herald. It is true that the fifteen member did devote much time and effort in obtaining information for the Trustees. We also surveyed proposed building sites and made our recommendations.

Outside of the following two minor changes I find the Trustees are proceeding along lines which are entirely in agreement with the original report of the Citizens Committee approved by every member of that committee. The first change is that the Trustees are recommending an increase of \$50,000 over the \$900,000 suggested in the report. The second change regards the site. The first choice of the committee approved by all members was later proved unsatisfactory in the thinking of the great majority of the members of the Citizens Committee for these reasons: (1) It would be at least two years before the school Trustees could acquire clear title to the land, and (2) because many landowners would be involved, some of whose addresses are unknown, a great deal of money would have to be spent in legal fees to acquire a clear title for the School District.

It was an honor to be a member of the Committee and I trust that working together we have served to help forward the public educational facilities in Iowa Park. I can't help imagining that 45 years ago when the present high school building was being proposed that several folks, who are still living here, took great pride then in working with others in planning that building, and were elated with the thought that their children and grandchildren would enjoy brand new classrooms. These same folks, although now they won't have children or grandchildren to enter the halls of a new structure in instruction, will continue to take pride in being able to help the younger generation provide for its own.

Iowa Park is a great community! I am thankful for being a citizen of it and look forward to its continuous growth, physically, educationally, and spiritually. Please lend your prayers with ours that through this vote on a new bond issue and down the months and years ahead that the spirit of real co-operation may prevail in our community of "friendly living."

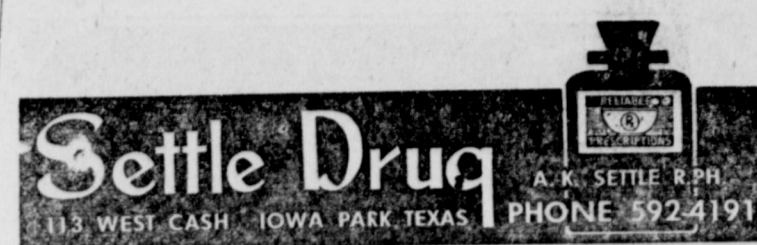

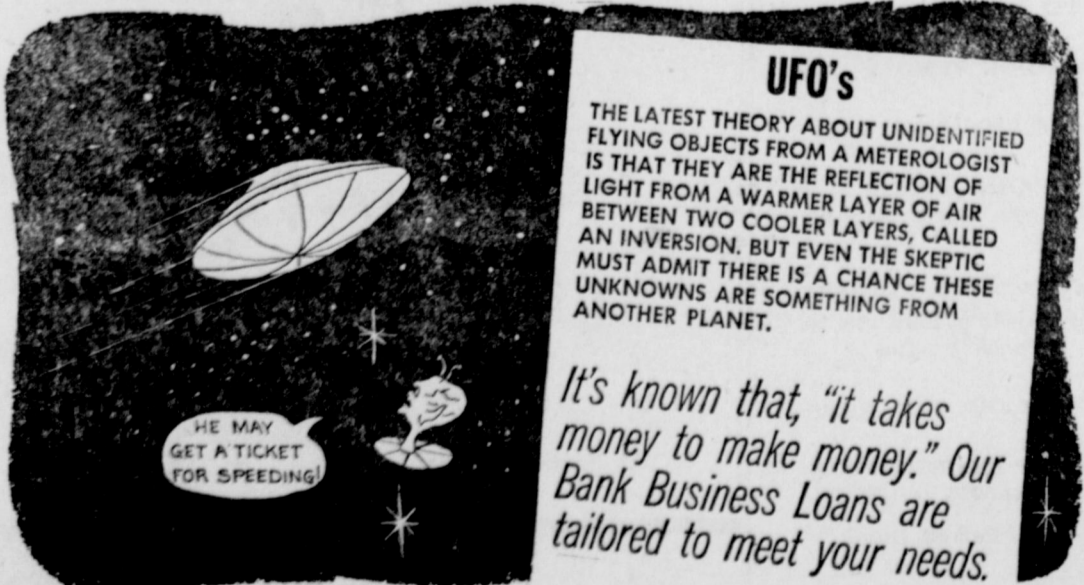
