Twenty-three Study club is sponsoring a Christmas safety program and makes the following suggestions:
Choose a tree with springy rather than dry, brittle branches. When you get the tree home, keep it standing in snow or water until you are ready to take it indoors.

Before setting it up in the house saw off the trunk at least one inch from the original cut, and at an angle.

Place the tree in a sturdy, water-filled stand away from heat. Be sure the fresh cut is always under water. Remove the tree before its needles begin to drop.

Use only electric lighting sets. Check old sets for frayed or bare wires. Always unplug the lights before going to bed or leaving the house. Never have them on unless adults will be near the tree.

Keep all combustible decorations—paper, tree boughs, ribbon—away from lights, candles and fireplace. Do not operate electric trains under the tree.

In choosing toys for a small child, avoid those with sharp or pointed edges and gifts which are small enough to be swallowed or too large for him to handle.

Mrs. James A. Sewell, safety chairman of the club, urges everyone to take precautions so his and his family's Christmas will be a safe, merry one.
