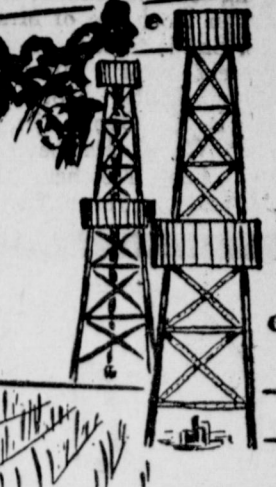

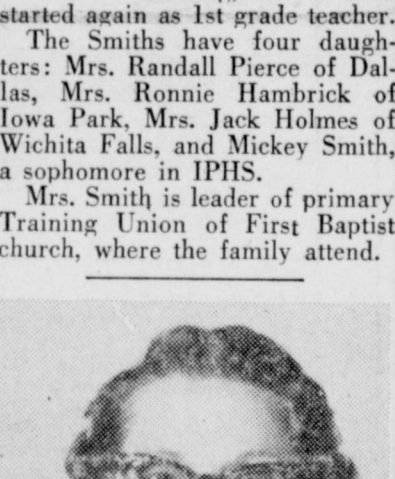

Underdog Iowa Park knocked off Jacksboro last Friday night on Bobby Gilbreath Memorial field 25-12.

Early in the second quarter the Hawks began a drive. Terry May took a hand-off from QB Robert Dawson and slammed the left side of his line for a 4-yard scoring thrust. Dawson added a point with a perfect kick.

Jacksboro came to life and put on a scoring drive despite the defensive efforts of Ronnie Walters, Carson Crume, Carlton Wells and Harry Moore. The 2-point conversion try fell incomplete.

Hawks took the next kick-off and Larry Thompson, Billy Jackson and Terry May drove into Tiger land. With time running out Dawson shot a pass to Thompson good for 7 yards and 6 points. Halftime score was 13-6.

In the 3rd quarter both teams slugged it out in the middle of the field. Rick Rowntree, Phillip Green, Danny Tarbet, James Moore, Gordon Parkey and Ronnie Berry opened the way to the Tiger 10. Then Drew Sawyer got that 10 with a fine run.

Waters put the pressure on the Tiger punter, forcing him to kick short. Hawks marched down the field with runs by Jackson and Thompson. May made the last 2 yards to kill Tiger hopes of pulling out a victory.

Late in the final quarter Jacksboro scored another 6 pointer.

ANSWER BOOK
The US department of commerce, bureau of the census, has released the nation's fact book, "Statistical Abstract of the US," containing the latest on social, political and economic aspects of the nation. Samples:

27 per cent of all fallout shelters in the US are in New York state. There is fallout shelter space for only 103 million.

About 21 per cent of the males and 66 per cent of the females over 30 have never smoked. Almost 50 per cent of the men who smoke and 72 per cent of the women who smoke use filter tips.

More than half the women who work are also housewives.

Half the men examined for the draft were rejected in 1962.

From 1950 to 1962, the federal government debt increased to 266 to 340 billion dollars; the total debt of private persons and organizations from 276 to 755 billion dollars.

Since World War II, more than 100 countries have received foreign aid amounting to 91 billion dollars from the USA. France has received more military aid from US since 1950 than any other nation.

Sweden leads the world in the amount of steel used per capita; the USA is fourth behind Czechoslovakia and West Germany.

There were more than 86,000 non-farm real estate foreclosures in 1962 in the US, highest figure since 1940.

Of the 42 states in which executions are legal, California with 11 and Texas with 9 led in the number of civil executions in 1962.

Although 90 per cent of all households have tv sets, twice as many books are being sold as were sold 15 years ago.

Iowa Park Hawks of the Little League American Conference took the season opener from Wichita Falls Rockets this Tuesday night at Burnett Field, 46-0.

Hawks, coached by Dan Barnes and Lloyd Harris, showed their strength in the first quarter when Dick Cutler scored. Bill Bickley added the PAT and the Hawks had an 8-0 lead.

Our 90-pounders contained the Rockets on defense and scored 2 touchdowns in the second period. Jim Clapp passed to Bickley for a 57-yard play. Bill also added the PAT. Hawk defenses were too tough for the Rockets.

Bickley picked off a Rockett pass and raced 20 yards to pay dirt; Cutler added the conversion points with a run, and the Hawks had a 24-0 margin at halftime.

Bickley scored with a 25-yard crossback and Jeff McDonald added the 2-point conversion.

Still in the 3rd quarter, Fullback McDonald ran end for 18 yards and the Hawks' 5th touchdown. Cutler added 2 points to bring the score to 40.

Coach Barnes added some reserves so they could get some experience. Bickley broke loose in the 4th stanza to bring our total to 46 points.

Coaches and parents are proud of our team. The boys who must weigh less than 90 pounds have lost only two games in the past three years. They won the state title two years ago. Last year they lost one game and finished second in the American Conference.
