Farmers Union speaks

Saturday, March 15, was the concluding day of the National Farmers Union Golden Jubilee. 1500 members representing 28 states gathered in Dallas to celebrate 50 years of Farmers Union progress.

Farmers Union was started at Point, Texas, in 1902 and by 1906 the membership in Texas was 100,000. Since that time membership has declined. Fred Haldick, president of the Texas FU, said in his opening address, "This time we will build in Texas a stable and permanent organization of family type farmers. We are determined that Texas shall resume her place in the Farmers Union."

James Patton, president of the National FU, predicted a pile driving attack on government supported farm prices. "This will come about on January 1, 1954, the expiration date of the so called dual parity provision formula of the Agricultural Act of 1949. Basic commodities then will go on the new parity formula. Calculations at this time indicate that cotton will go down 1 1/2 per cent, parity for wheat will drop 32c per bushel and corn about 15c lower. In addition, the sliding scale formula will drop parity from 90 per cent to 75 per cent, which can easily add to the already burdensome problems of the farmer."

Wednesday afternoon, Secretary of Agriculture Charles F. Brannan spoke of the need for improved price supports and for a long time planning for the agricultural program that begins with the grass-roots, which is the American farmer and ranchman.

Patrons Study Needs Of Schools, To Meet Again March 29

The first move in an effort to study the Iowa Park school system and recommend ways to improve it, was made Saturday night in a town meeting at the high school building.

Some 50 patrons, including three board members, attended and developed the following topics:

Iowa Park's school population is growing and soon the district will be faced with the necessity of enlarging classroom facilities all thru the system. This means a probable bond issue. No committee was appointed to make an investigation, but all were awakened to the fact that Iowa Park is growing, and with it the needs of the school will grow.

Mrs. Doyle Koonce and Mrs. Lowell Short accepted responsibility for inquiring into the need for cleaning and painting certain elementary school rooms and the need for better lighting. They will report to another town meeting Saturday night, March 29.

The safety of children coming to and leaving school was discussed. Ray Herrington, Bert Van Horn and Hubert Hensley will study this problem and make a report.

The transportation problems of the school will receive study by Ed Patterson, and the possibility of helping early bus riding children in the first and second grades to get home earlier will be reported by Mrs. Hubert Hensley.

The advantages and disadvantages of having a student council in the high school will come in for special study by Mrs. Sam Payne and Mrs. T. C. Scott, who will also make a study of the curriculum offered in high school.

George R. Huckaby was appointed chairman at the town meeting last Saturday and will call the meeting to order at its second session at 8:00 p. m., Saturday, March 29. All patrons of the school are invited to the meeting and are asked to take an active part in helping the school meet its problems.

Trustees Arch Hughes, Herman Mitchell and Burk Scott attended the meeting and took part in the discussions.

Luecke Seeks District Court Judgeship

Ed Luecke, Wichita Falls attorney, filed Wednesday with Eugene Sherrod Jr., county executive committee chairman, as candidate for Judge of 8th District Court.

Luecke is 45 years old, and is the second youngest of the nine children (six sons and three daughters) of Henry C. Luecke, pioneer blacksmith, who established business and residence in Wichita Falls in 1892, where he lived and worked until his death in 1937. Emma Luecke, Ed's mother, continued to reside at the family homestead at 903 Brook until her death in 1950.

Past-president of the Wichita County Bar Association and the only lawyer in Texas appointed to the advisory board of the American Bar Association Journal, Ed Luecke has long been active in the progress of his profession, the courts, and their relation to the general welfare of the public, and has filled many positions of honor and responsibility within the gift of his fellow lawyers.

For the State Bar of Texas, Luecke has been chairman of its Local Bar Activities Section and vice-chairman of its program on Continuing Legal Education. He has been a frequent contributor to the Texas Bar Journal, the official publication of the State Bar of Texas, and the American Bar Association Journal, the official publication of the American Bar Association.

He is one of a group selected from lawyers and judges in Texas, Oklahoma, Louisiana, New Mexico and Arkansas for the advisory board of the Southwestern Legal Center (Dallas). He is currently heading a committee to study the need and means of providing for legal assistance for persons unable to pay any attorney's fee, and low cost legal service for persons of moderate means, in Wichita county. He is a member of the Wichita County Bar Association, State Bar of Texas, American Bar Association, American Judicature Society and Southwestern Legal Foundation.

Ed Luecke was born, reared, received his elementary school, high school and junior college training in Wichita Falls, and additional academic and legal education at the University of Texas. Admitted to the bar in 1933, he has practiced law in Wichita County for 18 years; except for 44 months (including overseas service) while in the forces during World War II, where he rose from private to First Lieutenant.

In addition to working in his father's blacksmith shop and on his father's farm, Luecke engaged in many types of employment while saving for and working his way through college, including: grocery clerk, service station attendant, roughnecking, pipe-lining, surveyor's chairman and rod-man, geologist's instrument man, and as craftsman.

Luecke, as a member of the Lutheran church, a director of the Wichita County Tuberculosis association, and other religious and civic groups, has given much attention to the needs and development of religious and civic affairs.

He will make a formal statement concerning his candidacy for publication at a later date. In the meantime he solicits the active support of his friends throughout the county.

Christians to Hear Veteran Missionary Wednesday Night

Dr. O. J. Goulter, missionary to China since 1923, has recently returned to the U.S. and will be guest speaker at the March Fellowship Supper, Thursday the 27th, 7 p. m. at the Christian church in Iowa Park.

Mr. Goulter will also be guest of the East "5" Area Missionary meeting of Christian churches in Henrietta, April 1. His visit here is sponsored by the 12th district convention committee on missions.

Mr. and Mrs. Goulter have served almost 30 years under auspices of the United Christian Missionary Society for Disciples of Christ. Except for the last few years, they were at Hefei, west of Nanking. His work was in religious education and evangelism. He was particularly active in villages outside the city from which he brought young men for short courses in agriculture and religious education.

The Goulters were on furlough when the Japanese invaded China in 1937 but a year later they were able to return to China. She and their daughters stayed in Shanghai while he went to Hefei where relief work took much of his time.

Mr. Goulter stayed at Hefei after his family returned to the U.S. in 1941. With the entrance of the U.S. into the war, he was interned, first at his home in Hefei and later at Shanghai where he continued throughout the course of the war.

Mr. Goulter was born in Australia. For his training he first entered a Bible school in Australia, then came to America and attended Phillips university, Enid, Okla., where he continued to study during furloughs. In 1945 Phillips honored him with a doctor's degree after his return from China.

Formal Openhouse Set for Park Clinic's New Building, Sunday

The Park Clinic, owned by Dr. Gordon G. Clark, has been moved into its new home at 820 West Alameda, one block west of its old location.

Openhouse will be held Sunday afternoon, March 23, from 2:00 until 5:00, with a dedicatory service and presentation of gifts for the clinic from friends, Rev. Guy Perdue and Rev. Chester Gleason will conduct the dedicatory service, with C. E. Birk presenting the gifts.

The building is a low 16-room structure, with redwood siding and a brick apron. The roof is of crushed marble.

On top the building is a weather vane of a horse and buggy, representing the country doctor.

The entrance has a picture window with a built-in flower box underneath it.

The reception room and office is finished with glazed birch and features a large picture of an ocean scene on the south wall.

Dr. Clark's office is of natural birch. The rest of the interior is decorated in a light chateau.

The offices of both Dr. Clark and of Dr. John L. Steele, assistant, open into the reception room.

There is a long hall with all rooms connecting with it. There are three treatment rooms, utility room, two recovery rooms, physiotherapy room, laboratory room, operating room, x-ray room, dark room, central heating unit and two rest rooms.

The doors are of glazed birch. Floors are covered with gray asphalt tiling and windows are fitted with vertical bamboo blinds.

Parking space in the rear of the building will soon receive an all-weather surface.

Staff of the Park Clinic consists of Dr. Clark and Dr. Steele, Mrs. Floyd White, R.N., assistant; Miss Dama Adams, laboratory technician; Mrs. J. H. Hatten, receptionist; and Mrs. J. C. Ralston, bookkeeper.

The new building is a longtime dream of Dr. and Mrs. Clark. He has practiced in Iowa Park and surrounding territory more than 30 years. His father Dr. Frank Clark, known here as "Dad" Clark, was a typical country doctor in the Iowa Park area and was loved by everyone near and far.

Dr. and Mrs. Clark have two sons Gordon Duval of Houston and Randolph of Dallas.

Low Rent Housing Sought for Iowa Park

Mayor Fenton Dale and the city council of Iowa Park have taken the first step toward securing low rental housing units in Our Town, if a survey by the new Housing Authority of the city reveals the need of such units.

Machinery for securing the units for Iowa Park was set in motion Monday evening in a regular meeting of the city council when members adopted a resolution finding and declaring that there exists a need for the housing authority.

All councilmen were present for this important session except W. G. Steele, and all voted for the resolution. The housing authority will have five commissioners appointed by the city officials, who will be charged with responsibility of securing and administering the business of the low rental housing for Iowa Park.

The meeting Monday was the last regular meeting of the city council as it is presently made up. With the city election coming on April 1, the new administration will have taken office before a regular monthly meeting is scheduled.

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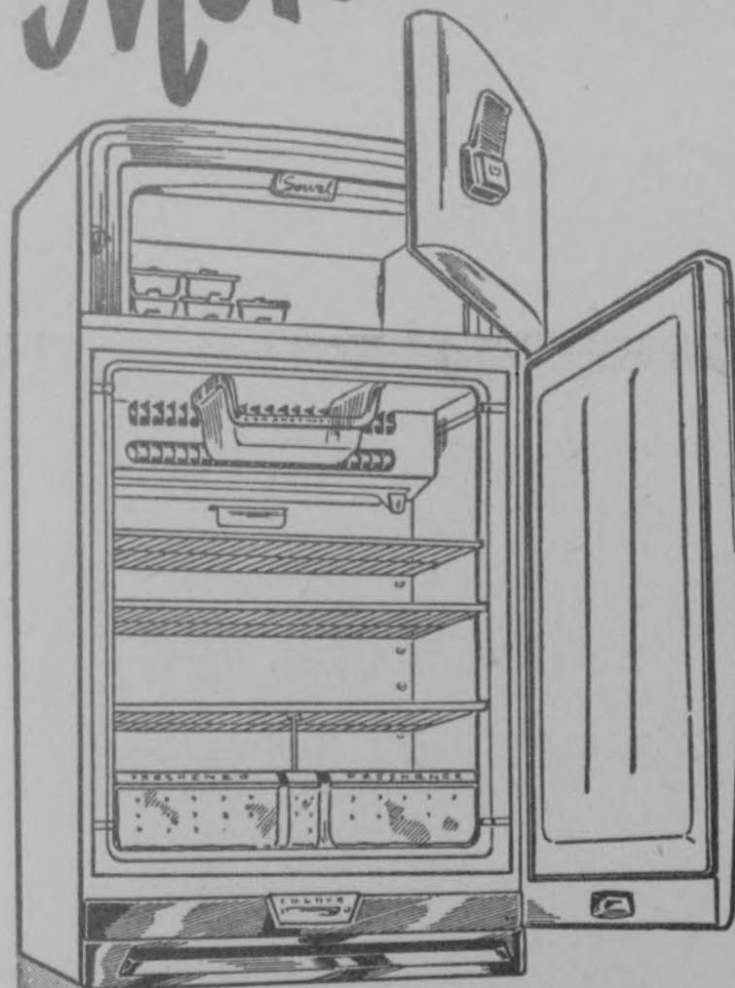
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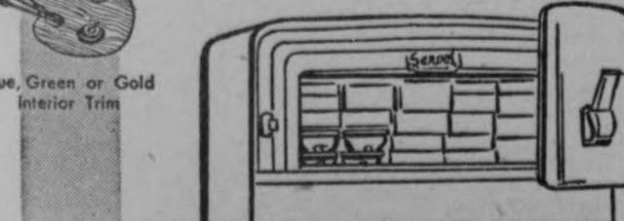

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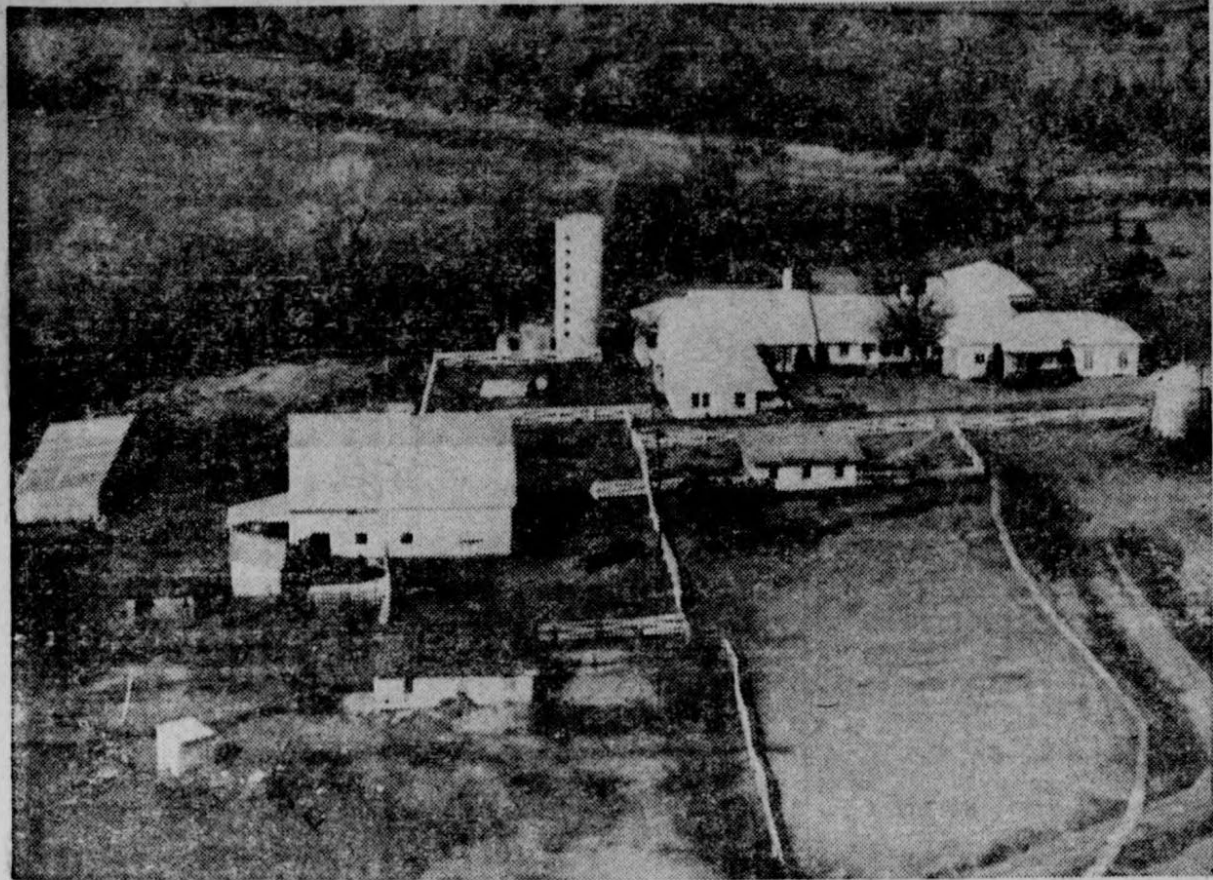
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Which Farm Is This?



A beautiful farming area is the way the Zekan-Robbins aerial photo company describes the country surrounding Iowa Park after taking 52 aerial farm photos here. These photos were taken for the Iowa Park Herald and the cost of the photos and the engraving from which they are printed is paid for by the Herald.

In so doing the Herald is recognizing farming as the big business it is today, and also, creating friendly guessing contest among the readers of this newspaper.

Nobody knows whose farms the photographers snapped with their big aerial cameras. It is up to readers to let the Herald know whose farms are published. The publishers do not know whose farms will be printed—even the photographers do not know.

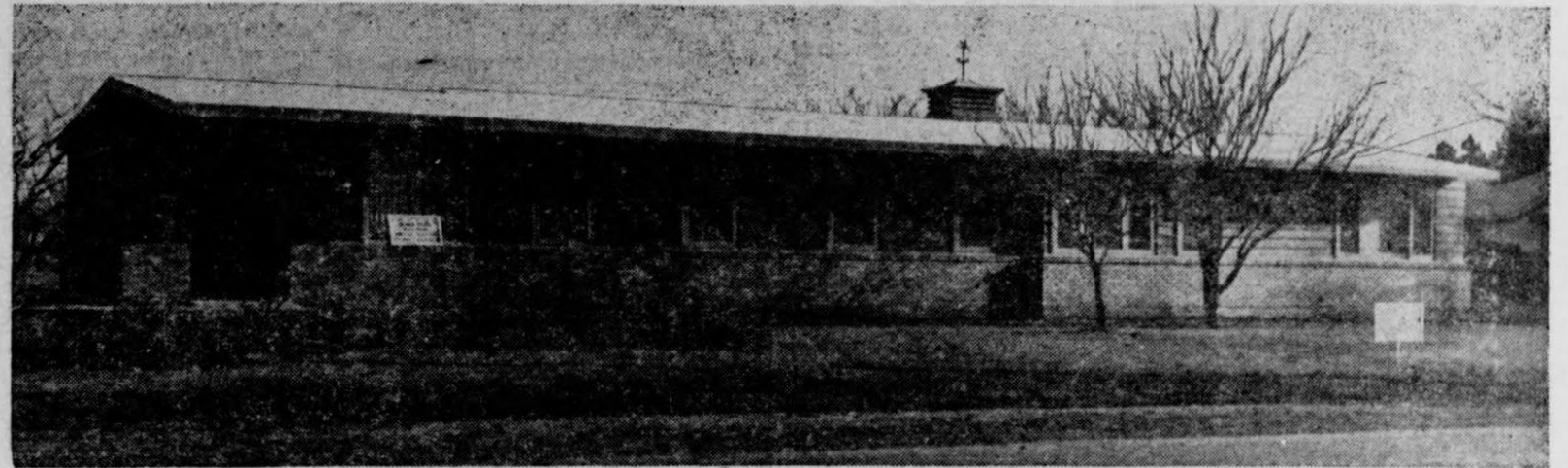
