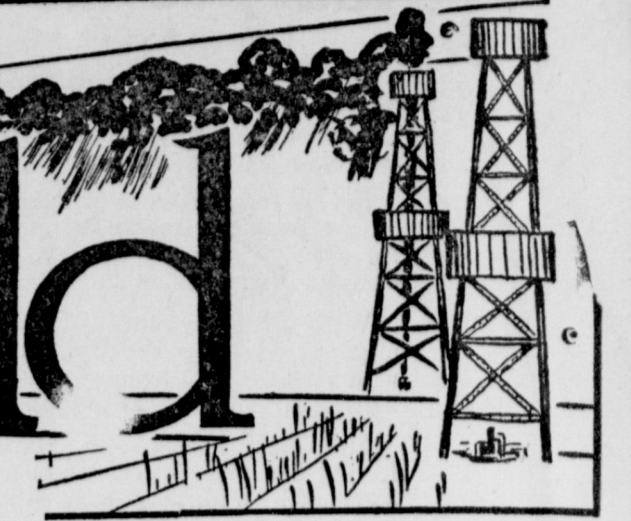

Service Held for Mrs. Brubaker

Mrs. Robert R. Brubaker, 76, prominent church and civic leader here for half a century, died in a Wichita Falls hospital Monday afternoon. She had not been feeling well for about a week but kept insisting she was feeling better each day. Last Saturday she was discussing plans for observance of her 50th wedding anniversary Sunday Dec. 27.

She became seriously ill Sunday and was admitted to the hospital.

The former Bess Sherrod was born Aug. 20, 1890, in Lewisville. She was graduated from Denton high school and attended North Texas Teachers college. She came to Iowa Park in 1913 after having been elected principal of the high school.

She and Bob were married Dec. 27, 1916. She continued teaching another three years and served as superintendent of the school for a short time. She served as substitute teacher many times during the subsequent years.

Mr. and Mrs. Brubaker have been recognized as pillars in the First Baptist church. She co-operated to the fullest extent during the 38 years he served as Sunday school superintendent.

She has served as WMU president several times and held practically every other office in WMU. She worked regularly and faithfully in Sunday school and training union.

At time of death, Mrs. Brubaker was secretary of Junior 1 Sunday school department. The church was dear to her and had first place in her life.

She approximated self-forgetfulness in her devotion to family and friends. In her neighborhood she was the first to learn when someone was ill or facing a problem, or on the brighter side, observed a birthday or anniversary. She was also the first one there with a cake, food or gift.

When the Brubaker daughters were in school, their mother was active in PTA and held a life membership in the Iowa Park unit. She was interested in the school and coveted for Iowa Park the best and most modern buildings and equipment. She encouraged young people to get the best education possible.

Mrs. Brubaker was past president of 23 Study club and member of Lioness club. For many years she was director of a division of the women's department of Texas-Oklahoma Fair.

Survivors are Mr. Brubaker; two daughters: Mrs. Otis Martin of Lake Charles, La., and Mrs. Roy W. Dickey jr., of Wichita Falls; two sisters: Mrs. M. E. Banks of Iowa Park and Mrs. Frank W. Smith of McKinney; one brother Howard Sherrod of Dallas; and seven grandchildren.

Funeral service was conducted at 10:00 a.m. Wednesday in First Baptist church by Rev. Donald Wood, pastor. Burial was in Riverside cemetery of Wichita Falls under direction of Tanner Funeral Home of Iowa Park.

Pallbearers were R. A. Williams, Loyd Bell, Gilbert Stebbins, Buck Voyles, Milton Brubaker of Wichita Falls and Jack Strickland of Burkburnett.

Meeting was opened by singing Trust and Obey, class song; and prayer by Pres. Joyce Hallum.

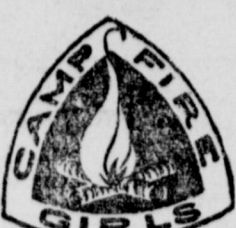

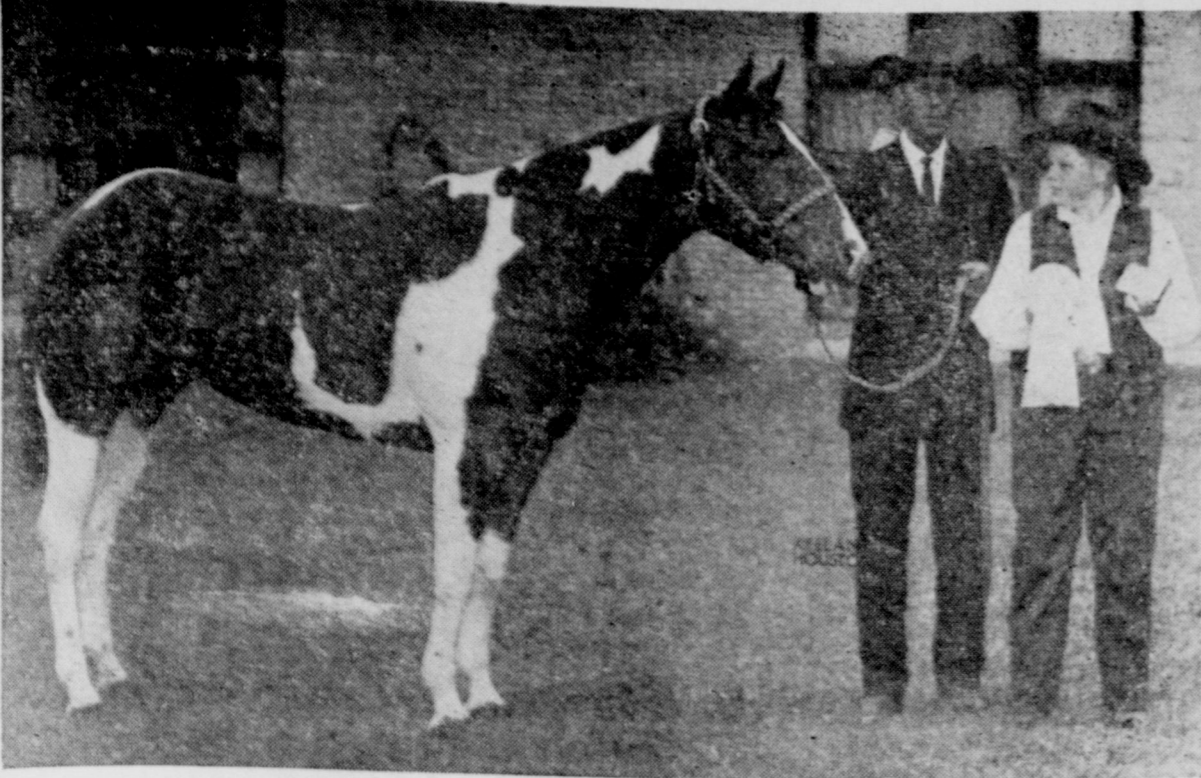

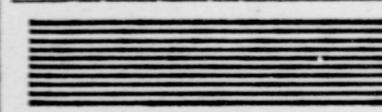
