## Water for Sale

It was voted in City Council meeting Monday, Sept. 12, to begin furnishing water to Wichita Valley Farms, Valley View, Karmay and Kadane Corner. The water was turned on Wednesday, Sept. 14.

As result of the almost 4 inches of rain last Saturday, Buffalo Creek Reservoir has risen another 30 inches, says Jim Keiningham, city water superintendent. Lake Iowa Park rose another 30 inches and the Old City Lake now lacks about 20 inches running over the spillway.

## Hawks 27 Eagles 0

An overflow crowd of rabid fans watched Iowa Park Hawks manhandle Decatur Eagles last Friday evening on Bobb's Gilbreath Field here. Final score was 27-0.

The first play from scrimmage broke Decatur's back. Robert Watson heaved a perfect aerial which Harry Price took in stride and carried almost to the goal line. Two plays later Webb made a 1-yard run for the score. Watson's kick was perfect.

The Hawks' next score came on a 51-yard sustained drive with Webb applying the heat with a 10 yard run. Again Watson made a successful kick for the bonus.

During the first quarter the IP hardnose defense yielded only one yard to Decatur's offense.

This type of defense put up by the Hawks held throughout the evening. Decatur made two first downs and only 72 yards in the whole encounter.

No players can be singled out as best, all were unbeatable. We must mention, however, the stellar defense put up by Mickey Patterson, Mike Overbey, Harry Price, Mark Brubaker, Mike Skinner, Glenn Britt, Greg Webb and others.

Watson did a superb piece of masterminding, mixing his air and ground attacks in such way as to leave the Decatur defense severely off balance. Rushing, he got 184 yards out of his runners. Passing the Hawks amassed a total of 189 yards with only one heave intercepted.

With 6:18 left in the second quarter, Iowa Park had another 7-pointer, bringing the total to 21. This counter also came from a short run by Webb and good kick by Watson.

The final scoring drive included three big plays: an 11-yard run by Webb sandwiched between a 10-yard pass to Price and a scoring 15-yard pass to Price.

Decatur showed a bit of life in the final few minutes of play, but each drive was blunted by the strong Hawk defense which forced 3 Eagle fumbles.

The Decatur coach said this week he thought his team had enough speed to run outside the Hawk defenders. He has changed the whole style of attack and expects to send his players into the line in future games.

## M-Sgt. and Mrs. Ronald Jordan Enjoy Living in Iowa Park

"Mababait ang tao dito," Mrs. Ronald Jordan says, speaking the Tagalog dialect of the Philippines, to describe how she feels about the people of Iowa Park. Translated, she said, "The people here are very nice."

Mrs. Jordan, née Esther Abellanosa of Manila, Philippines, and her husband T-Sgt. Jordan and daughters—Sharilyn 8, Ronda 6 and Carolyn 5—live at 1118 Louisa. He is stationed at SAFB.

Mrs. Jordan is a combination of beauty, charm and poise. She is an interesting conversationalist and an immaculate housekeeper. Her mother-in-law Mrs. Ben Munson of Lawton, Okla., referred to her as "a model wife, mother and housekeeper" in a tone denoting how delighted all the relatives are to have Esther in the family.

Mrs. Jordan is a graduate of St. Teresa high school in Manila. She and Ronald, a native of San Antonio and graduate of Childress high school, were married Nov. 21, 1954, when he was stationed at Clark AFB in the Philippines.

Esther got her first glimpse of the USA when she arrived in San Francisco in 1957. "I thought it was beautiful there, and everywhere I go it is beautiful," she says. "Texas is so wonderful, and I can't get over the large watermelons here," she said, as she tried to describe a long melon she had seen a few days before.

Sharilyn was born in Childress; Ronda, in the Philippines; Carolyn in Japan.

Mrs. Jordan and her five sisters own a plantation near Manila. They grow coconuts, rice, vegetables and mahogany. One sister is a dentist; one has completed study for a law degree; one runs the plantation; another owns a grocery; and the other is a beautician.

From every perspective the decor of the Jordan residence is Philippine. On the walls hang numerous oil paintings by Ben Sotto, an artist on the island. One of the most significant paintings is a replica of the family plantation done on black velvet. Raised bamboo figures are used to depict more realistically plantation life.

Living room is furnished with handmade rattan furniture. A tall mahogany china closet in the dining area is highlighted with carvings on the base symbolic of farm life in the Philippines. One of the most striking pieces of furniture is a hand-polished rattan snack bar and stools in one corner of the dining area.

The household has novelties galore. Among the most fascinating is a balancer made of monkey pad. No matter where or in what position one places the miniature man, he balances perfectly.

A carved rice bowl, tiered cigarette case, buffalo horn vases, elegantly dressed Japanese dolls in cases, are just a few of the novelties which lend an exotic atmosphere to the home.

Mrs. Jordan collects miniature china animals, and her daughters have a varied collection of dolls. The family attend the Catholic church at SAFB.

Due to reduction of the state refund there is an extra charge of 3 cents for milk in the school cafeterias. Prices are 30 cents for elementary students, without milk; 35c cents for junior high and senior high students and adults, without milk.






