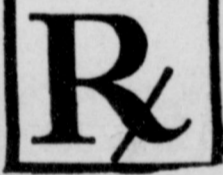

## S-Sgt. and Mrs. Ransbottom Are Much Traveled U.S.A.F. Family

S-Sgt. and Mrs. F. C. Ransbottom and children Sharon 10 and Carl 6, are among the interesting newcomers to Iowa Park. They moved here from California, where he was stationed at Edwards AFB.

The couple met in the Philippines when Ransbottom was stationed at Clark AFB.

Mrs. Ransbottom, the former Elisa Caccam, was born in Luzon. Before World War II the family spent the summers in Baguio. She attended school at Banang La Union and Baguio. She speaks the Ilocano and Panpango dialects and Tagalog, the language of the Philippines, and English, which is taught in the schools there.

Following the death of her father, who worked for the Benquet Auto Line, a major bus line con-

nected with the Manila Railroad, she went to work at Clark AFB to help her brother support their mother and the six children. It was there that she met her husband, a native of Kansas.

The couple married June 14, 1950, and when he received his orders to report back to the United States for duty, they immediately started to make arrangements for her to precede him because she was apprehensive about coming to the States by herself after her husband has left the country.

The fear was so great it caused her to assert emphatically that she simply would not come. They had to pay her fare by boat on the American Presidential Lines, and she arrived in San Francisco in May 1951. Imagine her consternation when she arrived in a

strange country and there was no one to meet her!

Her husband had written to his brother and wife and asked them to meet Elisa and to care for her until he arrived. But the letter did not reach its destination before the couple left for Independence, Kans., to visit his parents.

However, a neighbor who had been asked to take care of the mail until they returned felt the urgency to open the letter from the Philippines, and he could not rest until he had. He called the couple in Kansas and they immediately headed for San Francisco.

In the meantime, Elisa had contacted an uncle and he had come to her rescue. When her in-laws finally located her she was dubious of them. The brother-in-law had all the markings of a cop and she was afraid. In trying to account for the fear, she suddenly remembered that she failed to report to the Philippine embassy upon her arrival in the United States.

The brother-in-law and his wife tried in vain to convince Elisa of their identity. She saw no resemblance between her husband and the man who claimed to be his brother; but she told them if they would come to San Francisco the next day she would believe them and would not be afraid to go home with them. They were patient and made a 65-mile trip back the next day, and by that time her fear had subsided. She willingly returned home with them.

Ransbottom reached San Francisco in June, and he took his wife to Independence, Kans., to meet the other members of his family.

They returned to California and remained for 13 months while he was stationed at March AFB in Riverside. Then they were sent to Ellington AFB at Pasadena,

Texas, for 23 months and to Miami International Airport for two months before he received orders to go back to the Philippines.

He left in August 1954 and she went in January 1955. There followed a happy reunion with her family which terminated in August 1956 when they were sent back to the U.S.

They were stationed at Homestead AFB, 30 miles from Miami, and at Mather AFB, Sacramento; and as though it were planned to satisfy Elisa's nostalgia for her "home," they were sent back to the Philippines in 1961 and stayed there until 1963. They were at Edwards AFB, Calif., until they were sent to Sheppard in May of this year. The family lived in Burkburnett for a brief time before moving to Iowa Park.

Ransbottom has served in the air force continuously since 1947. He had spent 3 years previously in the air force and did not reenlist immediately upon his discharge. He graduated from high school in Independence, Kans.

Sharon Ransbottom was born in the Philippines and will be in the fifth grade this fall. Her brother Carl was born in Sacramento. He will be in the first grade.

A touch of the Philippines is noted in rooms throughout the Ransbottom home. Some of the novelties which typify the islands are: Ipil wood wine dippers and unique nut crackers carved with figures of the Igorot tribe, a salad bowl set and huge spoon and fork made from the monkey pod tree, an antique clay water pot.

Mrs. Ransbottom has replicas of the weapons used by Igorot and Moroland tribes mounted on wall plaques. The weapons have strange-sounding names such as gaman, Bal-Big, kalasak, capapautak, kambnlulu, binakoko, bulog, susuat, and many others.

In discussing foods of the Phil-

ippines and the United States, Mrs. Ransbottom said she misses the fresh coconuts of her country most of all. By the time they reach here they are not fresh as she was accustomed to on the island.

The recipe for Fried Rice is popular in the Philippines:

1 chicken breast or 1 lb. pork steak or 1 to 1½ lb. chopped ham, pork, chicken or shrimp  
1 small onion, chopped  
4 or 5 stalks of green onions  
5 tablespoons soy sauce  
eggs  
1/3 cup cooking oil or bacon drippings  
6 to 8 cups cooked rice

### Method

Beat eggs and make egg omelet. Chop omelet and green onions, part of leaves included. Set aside.

Put oil or bacon drippings into hot, heavy skillet, add onions and brown slightly. Add meat and cook until done; if cooked meat is used, stir until heated; add steamed rice. When hot, sprinkle soy sauce and mix.

Before serving, add chopped omelet and green onions. Serves 4 to 6 persons.

Pork Adobo goes well with the rice:  
3 lb. pork roast  
2 small bay leaves  
Pinch of pickling spice (optional)  
1 doz. whole peppers or cloves of garlic  
¾ cup vinegar  
1½ cups water

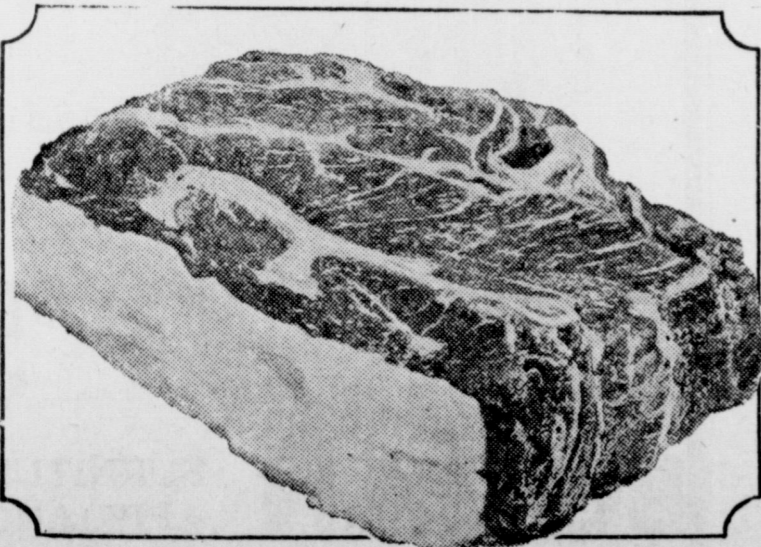
Cut pork into chunks, rinse slightly. Then add all ingredients and cook until dry; about 45 minutes to an hour.

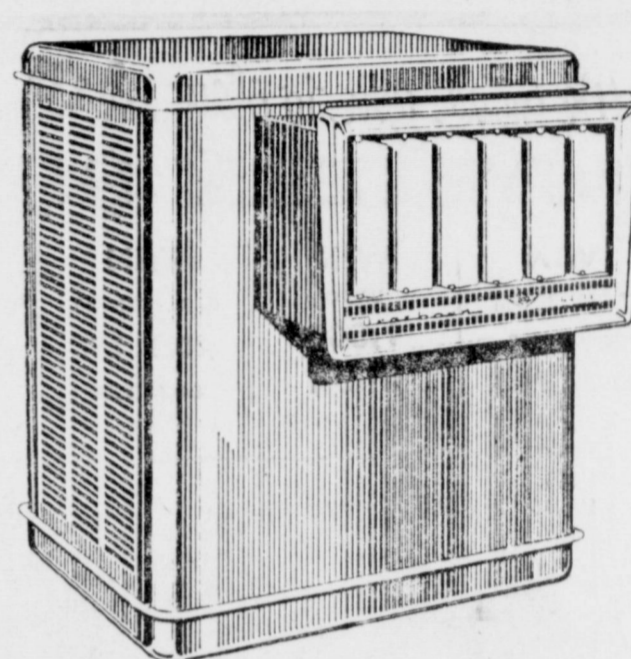

**PUBLIC NOTICE**  
Proposed CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT  
NUMBER NINE ON THE BALLOT

PROPOSED CONSTITUTIONAL AMENDMENT TO BE VOTED ON AT AN ELECTION TO BE HELD ON NOVEMBER 8, 1966.

SENATE JOINT RESOLUTION NO. 26 proposing an Amendment to Sections 4 and 5 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas to provide for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members; prescribing their qualifications; elections, appointments, tenure of office and compensation; and prescribing the term of court of said court.

BE IT RESOLVED BY THE LEGISLATURE OF THE STATE OF TEXAS:

Section 1. That Section 4 of Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

"Section 4. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall consist of five Judges, one of whom shall be Presiding Judge, a majority of whom shall constitute a quorum, and the concurrence of three Judges shall be necessary to a decision of said court. Said Judges shall have the same qualifications and receive the same salaries as the Associate Justices of the Supreme Court. They shall be elected by the qualified voters of the state at a general election and shall hold their offices for a term of six years. In case of a vacancy in the office of a Judge of the Court of Criminal Appeals, the Governor shall, with the advice and consent of the Senate, fill said vacancy by appointment until the next succeeding general election.

"The Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and continue in office until the expiration of the term of office for which each has been elected or appointed under the present Constitution and laws of this state, and until his successor shall have been elected and qualified.

"The two members of the Commission of Appeals in aid of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall become Judges of the Court of Criminal Appeals and shall hold their offices, one for a term of two years and the other for a term of four years, beginning the first day of January following the adoption of this Amendment and until their successors are elected and qualified. Said Judges shall by agreement or otherwise designate the incumbent for each of the terms mentioned.

"The Governor shall designate one of the five Judges as Presiding Judge and at the expiration of his term and each six years thereafter a Presiding Judge shall be elected."

Sec. 2. That Section 5 of the Article V of the Constitution of the State of Texas be amended so as to hereafter read as follows:

peals may sit for the transaction of business at any time from the first Monday in October to the last Saturday in September in each year, at the State Capitol. The Court of Criminal Appeals shall appoint a clerk of the court who shall give bond in such manner as is now or may hereafter be required by law, and who shall hold his office for a term of four years unless sooner removed by the court for good cause entered of record on the minutes of said court.

"The Clerk of the Court of Criminal Appeals who may be in office at the time when this Amendment takes effect shall continue in office for the term of his appointment."

Sec. 3. Said proposed Constitutional Amendment shall be submitted to a vote of the qualified electors of this state at an election to be held throughout the state on the first Tuesday after the first Monday in November, A.D. 1966, at which election each voter opposing said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot with a pen or pencil the following words printed on said ballot:

"FOR the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

Each voter favoring said proposed Amendment shall scratch off the ballot in the same manner the following words printed on said ballot:

"AGAINST the Amendment to the State Constitution providing for a Court of Criminal Appeals of five members, and prescribing the term of said court."

If it appears from the returns of said election that a majority of the votes cast are in favor of said Amendment the same shall become a part of the Constitution of this state.

Sec. 4. The Governor shall issue the necessary proclamation for said election and have same published and said election shall be held as provided by the Constitution and laws of this state.
