Iowa Park received the first kickoff and promptly lost the ball during the first series. Henrietta started from 36 yards out and worked the ball across with runs and a pass.

Henrietta made its second TD on straight ground play, and before the first stanza was completed had a 12-point bulge. But that was all for the Bearcats.

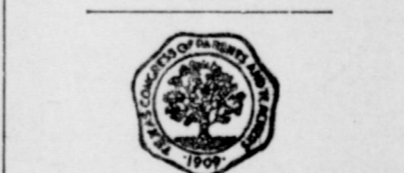
Early in the 2nd quarter Harry Price snagged a pass on the Bearcat 40 and carried 10 more yards. Barry Jackson made it to the 21 and then to the 12. James Eke reached the 4 and Jackson made the first tally of the season on a pass from Jim Clapp. Halftime found the Hawks lagging six points.

After the customary pep talk from Coach Watkins, the Hawks were ready to play. Two nice passes from Clapp were caught by Rocky French and Price to sack up a TD in short order. Kick for extra point was good, and the Hawks had it 13-12.

In the 4th stanza, the Hawks made an 2-yard sustained drive. After three first-downs reached midfield, Clapp hit Price with a pass which netted the final TD. A successful PAT try brought the score to 20-12.

To the Parents and Citizens of Iowa Park

Within the last few days I have had several pastors and many citizens to ask about trouble our young people are in, if it is true, and what can be done about helping and preventing it. The following statement I wish to make is for the purpose of letting you know the truth, where the blame lies, and what you can do to help.

First of all I will not deny about the trouble. We do have a large number of our teenagers in trouble. They are not small troubles, but are serious ones. Within the last three weeks, I have talked to a large number of young people involved in shoplifting, auto thefts, theft from autos, and most of all, burglaries, such as home, business places, and school houses. After talking to each child and their parents, I was able to form a good opinion of the reasons behind each one. It seems like the average age is fourteen, that summer time (out of school) is their worst enemy, and their parents work. They are not old enough to get a steady job, but they think they are too old for a baby sitter, or their parents do not furnish one. They all claim to be looking for excitement, because of nothing to do, no games to play unless they invent one, and usually it winds up in destruction of someone's property. They have a like feeling that the people are against them.

I found that almost all the parents are well off and their children do not suffer for anything, unless it be for love and understanding. I whole heartedly believe that the community is about twenty per cent to blame, parents about seventy per cent, and the remaining ten per cent lies on the child itself.

Following, you will find a list of suggestions that I feel would help in helping our young people.

1. Don't think your child is an angel and cannot do wrong. Everyone is capable of this.
2. Learn to know and understand your child. You will be surprised how much you don't know.

It will be a pleasure to help anyone, at any time if I or this office can be of service.

3. Find something responsible for him or her to do, even if it is only a small one, then see that it is carried out. Everyone needs this.

4. Some of the churches are already forming some kind of activity in it for young people. Find out about it and then help them in carrying it out.

5. Know where your child is at all times, whom he or she is with, and what they are doing. Ninety-five per cent of the parents do not know this.

6. Have him or her home each night and off the streets at a reasonable time. A very large number of parents do not seem to care what time their children come in.

7. Make sure your child goes to school each day, and not pretend to go.

8. Work with the ones who are trying to help and not against them, such as your police department, schools, churches, and friends.

9. Punish your children when they are wrong and praise them when they are right.

10. Don't send them to church, take them. You will benefit from it, also.

A closing reminder—This town is small with only a few thousand people, but it is time for eyes to be opened and our teenagers helped both in the home and away. If you would start in your own home and work outward, we would have less traffic problems, thefts, burglaries, and misdemeanor cases. Please keep this in mind if your child has been in trouble, is in trouble, or may get into trouble. Don't use the excuse that he doesn't have anything to do. It is your place as parents to find him something, such as small jobs, activity in church work, school, and properly supervised recreation.

Iowa Park Couple Know and Love Antiques of Many Kinds

Mr. and Mrs. Lester Watson seem to have intuitive recognition of the beauty and value of an antique, whether it be a piece of furniture, tableware, kitchen accessory, farm implement or clothing. Wherever they go, they are on the lookout for things that belong to a much earlier period. As a result, they have a number of conversation pieces.

They possess several antiques which are heirlooms. They have also bought some beautiful items and others have been given to them by friends who knew they would appreciate and treasure them.

Lovers of antique furniture would probably say a three-piece walnut bedroom suite, identified with a much earlier period, is the most interesting of the Watsons' collection. The furniture is put together with square nails and the dresser has three marble-topped sections, and the washstand is also covered with marble. The dresser has a long center mirror that rests on a base of marble. On either side of the mirror about midway are a small shelf large enough to hold an antique accessory, and below that a larger marble-covered shelf. The dresses has small and large drawers with contrasting wooden knobs.

The matching bed has tall headboard and footboard and is covered with a very old crocheted spread. The washstand holds the requisites for cleaning one's face and hands before the advent of the bathroom. Probably used in the parlor, the five-piece china set is accented with violets and touches of gold and has been so well preserved that one wonders if it ever has been used. According to the Watsons, the set is over 100 years old, and they own another plain white pitcher and bowl set which is 112 years old.

To complete the vesteryear setting, the Watsons use an old oak rocking chair which has been in motion for approximately 100 years. This was given them by the late Nate Zink, who brought it from Kansas 1890's and it had previously belonged to his parents.

Mrs. Watson has a black silk two-piece dress, still in excellent condition, which belonged to a

sister of Nate Zink. She also has a black "Sunday" bonnet and black velvet purse.

Some of the smaller antiques owned by the Watsons are a china "sawt pincher," used before the days of the salt shaker by his great-grandmother's family; a coffee grinder over 100 years old; a wood pounder used to pound kraut into jars; a preserve compote in vogue years ago.

They also have a very old dough bowl, a beer stein with pewter top from Austria, which is reputed to be one of the few remaining with its particular design; a "Perfescene," patented in the US in 1895; a low brass lamp with a handle; and numerous other articles.

Mrs. Watson works at Bradford school, and he works at Wichita Foundry and Machine Shop in Wichita Falls.

They have one daughter Mrs. V. Farmer of Omaha, Neb., and one granddaughter.

Dovie Yarbrough displayed her KOPS pin.

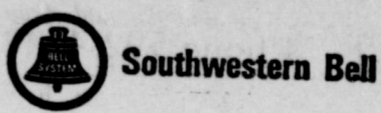
Following the meeting, members went to Park Manor and took a bag of cookies to each resident.

Speed Kills

This hard fact is accepted by the officers who are charged with making Texas highways safe, just as it is ignored by many drivers.

Because speed kills, the Department of Public Safety has started a more intensified effort to cause motorists to stay within a legal speed limit.

During daylight hours, a 20 per cent increase in accident involvement at 70 miles per hour occurs, compared with 65 m.p.h. At 75 m.p.h. the motorist risks a 50 per cent increase in accident involvement; at 80 the risk jumps to 90 per cent.

Night driving is even more risky. At 55 m.p.h. the accident rate is nearly two and one-half times as great as driving the same speed in daytime.

Studies show that injuries sustained in motor vehicle accidents are more severe as speeds increase.

Department of Public Safety is placing more patrolmen on the roads and more radar units beside highways, in an effort to control speed.

Acreage Survey

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath announced this week that rural mail carriers will begin distributing Acreage Survey Cards to patrons about Sept. 14. The post offices assist USDA in making this survey each year. These reports, directly from farmers, are bases for official estimates for acreage of all crops harvested in 1967.

Gilbreath urges each patron receiving a card to fill it out and return it to his mailbox.

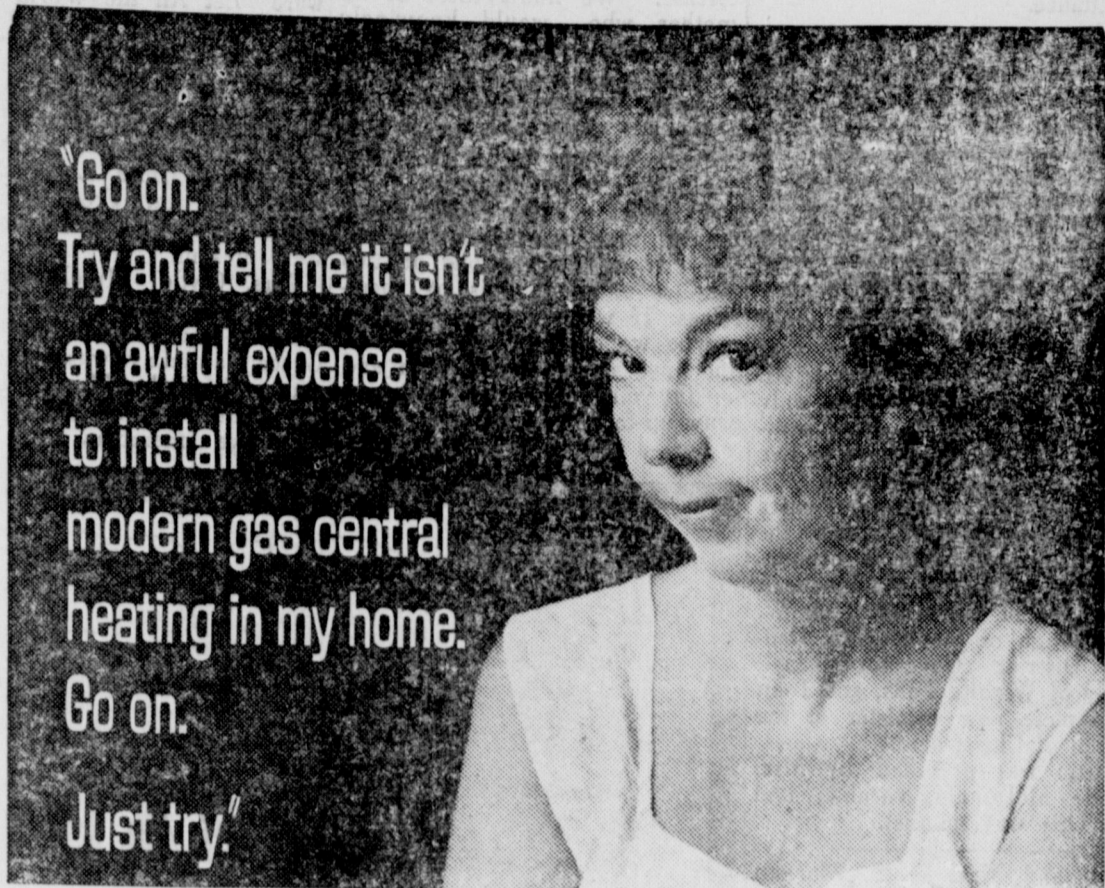

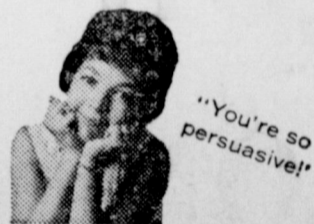
