Turkey Time—U.S.A. by Martha Logan



No need to limit your enjoyment of turkey to only one or two times a year. Today turkey is a year 'round dining favorite that is easy to fix and serve.

The best known bird in the U.S.A. is available frozen and ready to stuff with your favorite stuffing. A real time-saver is the frozen already stuffed bird. It is stuffed with an old-fashioned bread stuffing that is sure to please.

There is a size turkey to suit everyone's need. The ready-to-stuff bird is available in weights from 4 to 30 pounds. The already stuffed turkey ranges in weight from 4 to 16 pounds and is especially nice for smaller gatherings.

The major leg tendons in the turkey have been pulled to make carving easier. The drumsticks are tucked into a strip of skin at the base of the breast cavity to eliminate the need for trussing.

Roasting time schedules that have been carefully developed in the Martha Logan Test Kitchens are found on the wrapper of Butterball Swift's Premium Turkeys. The times are given for both open pan and covered pan roasting. Time schedules are a guide for putting the turkey into the oven. The best guide to doneness is a roast meat thermometer inserted into the thigh muscle next to the body cavity. The temperature should be about 185° F. Another test for doneness is to protect the thumb and forefinger with paper or cloth and pinch the thickest portion of the drumstick. If done, the meat should feel soft.

Traditional favorites for serving with turkey such as cranberry, pumpkin pie, and sweet potato are available at all times of the year. So why not plan turkey for your family soon!

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Santa has 'Zip'

Postmaster T. E. Gilbreath says Santa Claus has a zip code number this year. He promises all letters addressed to Santa Claus, North Pole, 99701 will receive replies from that jolly gentleman. It may take several days to receive a reply, but girls and boys must not get impatient for Santa will answer the letter.

Gilbreath has some instructions for mailing Christmas packages and letters: Put zip code numbers on all mail. Postal workers will give them to you. And put the Iowa Park zip code number—

76367—on with your return address. This gives an opportunity for everyone to advise his once-a-year correspondents of his zip code number.

It is okay to place instructions such as "Do not open until Christmas" on the outside of the package. Also a letter may be enclosed but it must be so stated outside the package and appropriate postage paid in addition to the parcel post rate.

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

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Hints Help Hunters;

About this time every year, I make it a point to remind my two youngsters of two lessons I taught them long ago—there are hunting hints that can help a hunter increase his take of game, and there are also rules of conduct that can help all of us find more places to hunt.

Every hunter can help himself by remembering these hints: Living fences and windbreaks provide excellent cover and food, especially for rabbits, ruffed grouse and squirrels. Grassy waterway edges make fine nesting places for quail and pheasants. Farm land which has been strip-cropped

attracts pheasants. Mulches and crop residues make ideal locations for mourning doves.

Every hunter can help himself and all other hunters by observing these rules: Always ask a landowner's permission before hunting on his property. Offer him a card bearing your name, address and telephone number. Never do any shooting close to, or in the direction of, farm buildings or stock. Thank the landowner for his courtesy before leaving.

Good hunting sense builds up the hunter's bag. Good conduct lets down fences to farm-lands that are too often closed to hunters. The true sportsman attaches equal importance to the practice of both.

HOW TO HIT A FLYING TARGET



Shotgun shooting has become an all year sport—hunting game in season and breaking clay targets the rest of the time. Chief reason for failing to hit flying targets is stopping the muzzle of the gun. This can be overcome easily by training and practice.



To get hits consistently, keep the gun moving, swing past target, pulling the trigger as you do so, and continue swinging in a follow through motion after you've touched off the shot.



Anticipated shotgun recoil and actual kick can also handicap the shooter. Apparent recoil has been reduced by 40 to 50 percent in the new gas operated Remington Model 1100 automatic. It is now easier for any shooter—novice or expert—to shoot better.
